Mid-century modern in paradise: a case study for UF students

During the spring, you may see young people armed with clipboards and cameras in the neighborhood. These are graduate students from the University of Florida's Historic Preservation Program. This course is part of a new working relationship between the University of Florida's College of Design Construction and Planning, under the direction of Dean Christopher Silver, PhD and Manatee County. As part of their work for the Historic Preservation Practicum class, taught by Linda Stevenson, PhD, the students will be studying the characteristics that make the Bayshore Gardens community such a special place, and will be applying their skills to document and interpret the built environment. Bayshore Gardens provides a wonderful laboratory for this work, as it embodies several important historical themes from the period of the mid-1950s; selling the community as a "paradise" to newcomers, using a modern architectural expression that celebrates the mild Florida climate, and the design of a new, self-contained, automobile-based community, with residential, commercial, educational and institutional uses in close proximity.

An important part of the learning experience is community outreach and the dissemination of the research. Several meetings will be scheduled in the near future, and we welcome any information that the residents may have on historical data, old photographs and recollections of the history of Bayshore Gardens. We are looking forward to working with the community on this project.

The Marina doesn't have a great deal going on at the present but many things are in the planning stages. If all has gone as planned the range light will have been restored by now and new reflectors placed at the entrance to the Bayshore Gardens / Trailer Estates Channel. As of this writing there is one boat up in the North Work Area and two in the South. All should be nearing their return to the water with one more coming out for the South Area. I was thinking that with hopefully warmer weather coming up, I should pull my boat to paint the bottom once again. I was also thinking that with Valentine's Day approaching, I needed an ideal gift for my Special Someone. So, it made sense to combine these two goals. Answer: A gallon of bottom paint with a Red Heart and Ribbons on it. Unfortunately, independently conducted surveys for this idea were not favorable. Lantana – Naughty or Nice?

I was aware a common species of lantana (*Lantana camara*) was invasive and should not be planted, but little did I know how complex and confusing it could be to sort out native species and cultivars which were desirable to plant.


L. camara, the old butter-and-eggs lantana, originated in the West Indies and has been promoted for ornamental cultivation since the early 18th century. However, this species has hybridized extensively in natural areas resulting in altered habitats and threatening populations of native plants and animals, becoming the dominant understory in open forests and forming thickets in open sunny areas.

L. camara is a significant weed of which there are some 650 varieties in over sixty countries. It is herbicide resistant and it can tolerate fire by regenerating from basal shoots. It is a Category 1 on

the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council (FLEPPC) 2011 List of Invasive Plant Species and is legally prohibited. It flowers year-round and the seeds are dispersed widely by songbirds. It is a perennial shrub with spiny square stems and toothed simple opposite leaves which are fragrant when crushed and can reach a height of six feet or more.

The flowers are small and tubular and may be white, pink, or yellow, changing to orange or red as they mature, while the fruit is initially green, changing to bluish black when ripe.

There are three species of lantana that are native to Florida. The one typically sold as native is *Lantana depressa*, a low growing shrub with yellow flowers. It is endemic only to southern Miami-Dade County and is an



Many of the low growing lantanas with yellow flowers sold widely are hybrids of *L. camara*. Fortunately this hybridization often results in sterility and although they flower well they do not escape cultivation. Gold Mound, New Gold, Alba, and Patriot are cultivars not known to produce viable seed. *Lantana montevidensis* is a trailing lantana with soft purple flowers and is also considered safe.

Although lantanas are drought and salt tolerant, low maintenance, and have brightly colored flowers that attract butterflies, use caution in selecting them for ecological reasons. Homeowners can help prevent the spread of invasive lantanas by careful selection, removing invasive varieties from existing landscape and removal of flower heads prior to seeding.

Another caution with lantana is **that all varieties of lantana are highly toxic to grazing animals** and the berries have caused death in children and pets when eaten. Skin irritation or allergic reactions may result from handling the plant.





History of Valentine's Day

Saint Valentine's Day, also known as Valentine's Day or the Feast of Saint Valentine, is observed on February 14 each year. It is celebrated in many countries around the world, although it remains a working day in most of them.

St. Valentine's Day began as a liturgical celebration of one or more early Christian saints named Valentinus. Modern romantic connotations were added several centuries later by poets. Several martyrdom stories were invented for the various Valentines that belonged to February 14, and added to later martyrologies. One story states that he was imprisoned for performing weddings for soldiers who were forbidden to marry and for ministering to Christians, who were persecuted under the Roman Empire. Another story says that, during his imprisonment, he healed the daughter of his jailer, Asterius. Another story states that before his execution he wrote her a letter signed "Your Valentine" as a farewell.

Today, Saint Valentine's Day is an official feast day in the Anglican Communion, as well as in the Lutheran Church. The Eastern Orthodox Church also celebrates Saint Valentine's Day, albeit on July 6th and July 30th, the former date in honor of the Roman presbyter Saint Valentine, and the latter date in honor of Hieromartyr Valentine, the Bishop of Interamna (modern Terni). In Brazil, the Dia de São Valentim is recognized on June 12.

The day was first associated with romantic love in the circle of Geoffrey Chaucer in the High Middle Ages, when the tradition of courtly love flourished. In 18th-century England, it evolved into an occasion in which lovers expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, offering confectionery, and sending greeting cards (known as "valentines"). Valentine's Day symbols that are used today include the heart-shaped outline, doves, and the figure of the winged Cupid. Since the 19th century, handwritten valentines have given way to mass-produced greeting cards.

Easy and Quick Slow Cooker Recipes

Slow Cooker Chicken Chili

1 red onion, chopped, 1 8-oz can tomato sauce

1 16-oz can black beans

1 16-oz can kidney beans

10 oz package frozen corn kernels

2 14.5-oz cans diced tomatoes w/chilies (check the spice level- I used mild)

1 packet taco seasoning

Salt and Pepper to taste

4-5 boneless skinless chicken breasts

1. Combine beans, onion, tomatoes, corn, tomato sauce, chili powder, and taco seasoning.

2. Place chicken on top and cover with a thin layer of the sauce and beans.

3. Cook on high for 6 hours.

4. About a half an hour before serving, remove chicken and shred in a separate bowl.

5. Place shredded chicken into the slow cooker and stir in to combine with beans etc.

6. Cover and place slow cooker on "warm" setting for 30 minutes to allow chicken to soak in the chili flavor

This chili makes a lot, so freeze it in 1 cup servings to be enjoyed for later. Serve over brown rice, steamed broccoli, with chips, or on tortillas

Slow Cooker Coq Au Vin

8 boneless, skinless chicken thighs

3 tbsp all-purpose flour, 1 1/2 cup red wine

4 slices bacon, roughly chopped

3 tsbp unsalted butter, divided

1 (12-ounce) package white or baby bella mushrooms, quartered

2 carrots, chopped, Salt and pepper to taste

1 med yellow onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, chopped

1/2 cup low-sodium chicken broth

2 large sprigs fresh thyme

Arrange chicken on a large sheet of waxed paper. Season both sides with salt and pepper. Lightly coat chicken all over with flour and set aside. Heat a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add bacon and cook until golden and just crisp, 3 minutes. Drain bacon on paper towels and set aside. Discard drippings and wipe out skillet. Melt 2 tablespoons butter (or heat oil, if using) in same skillet over medium high heat. Add chicken and cook until lightly browned all over, about 3 minutes per side. Transfer chicken to a large plate as done and

set aside. Melt remaining 1 tablespoon butter or oil in same skillet. Add mushrooms and cook until edges begin to brown, 3 to 5 minutes. Add carrots, onions, garlic and salt and cook until vegetables just begin to soften. Transfer vegetables and broth to crock pot. Arrange chicken on top. Sprinkle bacon over chicken. Add wine and thyme sprigs. Cover and cook on low for 6 to 7 hours. Season with salt and pepper, then serve.

Slow Cooker Lasagna

1 pound lean ground beef

1 onion, chopped, 12 oz cottage cheese

2 teaspoons minced garlic

1 (29 ounce) can tomato sauce

1 (6 ounce) can tomato paste

1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1 tsp dried oregano

1 (12 ounce) package lasagna noodles

1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Deglaze the skillet with the vinegar, scraping up any browned bits from the skillet. Add the tomatoes, the tomato paste and the beef stock. Bring all to boil and place in slow cooker. Add lemon peel. Cover and cook on low 6 to 8 hours.

When ready to serve, remove beef and vegetables (onions may have melted into the saucethis is a good thing!) from cooker and keep warm in a serving bowl. Turn heat off cooker and, if possible, remove insert from heating element. Whisk sour cream and parsley into sauce. Pour over beef and serve
