Neighborhood Assoc. "Restore Bayshore" committee meeting Thursday, November 13 at 7:00 pm at the Rec. Hall. This is not a "gripe" session, this is a "DO" session and we are having participants from the County come and work with us.

By now, we should all know the issues facing us; your complaints have been taken into consideration through the Town Hall meetings, BGNA meetings, the Bayshore Banner, and just conversations among people here. Now we want your ideas for solutions, and there are solutions!

The County has had numerous planning meetings, advertised in the paper, held numerous neighborhood work sessions, all through the past year to get input from us and tell us their plans that focus on revitalizing older neighborhoods. Bayshore Gardens needs to get involved on this movement. Bayshore Gardens Small Boat and Launch Facility. You Now Have One!

Bayshore residents will now be able to keep a small sailboat or kayak or any other small watercraft down at the park and go boating at their pleasure. We have

Sarasota Bay at our doorstep and now we have an affordable way for more people to enjoy it!

At this juncture, the office will only be taking names and numbers for space reservations and type of watercraft. Completion details will still be underway into November.

Watercraft can only be 16 feet or less. Sorry, no motors allowed. You will be able to

rent a boat space or kayak/canoe rack storage. Owners can provide wood timbers to set their boats on or store kayaks and canoes on stands provided. This will be addressed prior to occupancy.

When ready for actual occupancy, on Saturdays or by

Been Out on the Bay Lately? After a 50-year wait, appointment, your boat can be taken into the enclosure by the District maintenance staff. (Of course you can assist!) No vehicles or trailers will be allowed inside the enclosure. You will have a key to the pedestrian

> gate on the north end and the south beachside gate. You will be able to port your watercraft to the water by way of boat dollies provided. This is how it's done at similar boating facilities. Gates must be closed and locked when not in use. Once the boat is deposited at the beach, you return the dolly to the station. When you set out on the Bay, the (beachside) gate

must be locked behind you. Upon return, the reverse operation occurs. There will be a spigot and hose to rinse off the boat before returning it to your space.

This recreational component has been a long time in coming and we hope to see people exhibit good sportsmanship and responsibly use this very special facility.

The Thanksgiving Feast

days of thanksgiving as part of their religion. But these were days of prayer, not days of feasting.

Our national holiday really stems from the feast held in the autumn of 1621 by the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag to celebrate the colony's first successful harvest.

There is only one written account of the first Thanksgiving, and turkey isn't mentioned. And cranberry sauce and mashed potatoes were not even invented yet! In addition to duck and venison, the diners likely enjoyed squash, seafood, cabbage, onions and corn.

The English colonists we call Pilgrims celebrated The 1621 feast was not one big sit-down meal. Meals were eaten throughout the colony, both indoors and out, for almost a week. Some meals the Wampanoag and the English ate together, and other times the two groups are separately.

> Between meals the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag played games. The Wampanoag might have taught the English the Pin Game, where a player tried to toss a small ring into a pin.

> In addition to games for the children and target shooting for the adults, there was also singing and dancing among both the Wampanoag and the Pilgrims.

Kathy made a motion to approve September minutes. Steve seconded. Motion Passed.

Kathy made a motion to approve September Financial Statements Don seconded. Motion Passed.

BGNA: Jeannette Sparrow No report.

Maynard asked to have Laine Boyce give a report on the Thanksgiving dinner for the Bayshore Gardens Residents. So far there are 13 people signed up for the dinner. The cost to sponsor this is \$300.00. The cost for adults is \$10.00 and children under 12 is \$5.00. We still have three unpaid boat slips left. There is now a \$25.00 late fee added to the invoice along with a dollar a day late fee for every day after the 15th. Joanne stated she sent out seven collection letters to customers for unpaid invoices for their Banner ads. The pool will be closing at 6:00 pm now. When the clocks go back the time will be 4:00 pm during the week and noon to 4:00 pm on Saturday and Sunday. This is until the water temperature goes below

BUDGET & FINANCE: Kathy Locos

Kathy stated she has gotten a tremendous amount of response for money wanted for projects for our next budget which is 2015-2016. Next meeting on

Don stated there was discussion on advertisers, pricing and the format of the Banner. There were no decisions made. Richard asked if we had information on the soil sample that was taken when we had the survey in the marina done. Maynard stated Joanne will be calling Reuben Clarson to find out the information needed to do the soil sample. The two boats in the Marina the district now owns will be advertised in the Sarasota Sailing Magazine and on Craig's list. Next meeting on November 12th at 5:30

HOUSE & GROUNDS:

Don Gassie for Bob King

Don stated he has three motions to present for Bob King. Don made a motion to accept the bid from Dehart Alarm for \$4,490.00 to install an IP based security camera system in the hall. Jodie seconded. A vote was taken. Motion failed. Don rescinded his motion, Jodie rescinded her motion. Don then made a motion to accept Dehart Alarm System bid for \$4,490.00 to install an IP based camera system in the hall. Work on this system will not proceed until the work on the outside system has been satisfactorily completed and accepted and approved by the Board. A vote was taken. Three are against the system and two are for. Motion failed.

We have four quotes for tenting the building for termites. One bid is \$6,265.00 with a 4 year warranty at \$877.00 per year. Another bid is for \$3,850.00 with a lifetime warranty for \$550.00 per year. Another bid is \$7,997.00 with a 5 year warranty for \$ 492.00. The last bid is for \$9,040.00 with a 4 year warranty for \$1,356.00. Don made a motion to accept the bid from Total Control for \$3.850.00 with \$550.00 annual maintenance fee. The contract must include a statement that requires the vendor to take photos or videos of the underside of the building. We do not know the current condition under the building and the photos/videos will allow us to ascertain what exists, establish a baseline and make informed decisions in the future. Richard seconded. Motion passed. Don made a motion to provide card keys for access to the marina to any board member that has a need to be in that area to perform their official duties. This would include, but not be limited to, the Chairman of the Board, the Marina chair and the Chair of House and Grounds. Kathy seconded. Motion passed. Next meeting will be November 12th at 5:30 pm

Maynard stated we had three interviews for the Assistant Manager position. The fourth interview

never showed up. We have one more interview at the end of the month. We could have an assistant by the beginning of December.

OLD BUSINESS: Steve mentioned the need for more banquet tables for his attic sales. This will be taken back to the committee for further discussion. Steve mentioned he had a metal cabinet in the woodchoppers building to store combustible product. These items are no longer stored in the cabinet. The woodchoppers building must meet the safety requirements of the NFPA. They are in violation of not following the code.

If we can get past this month the 2014 Atlantic Hurricane Season will officially come to a close. Hopefully I won't jinx us by saying that we have been lucky for yet another year. Hooray for us all. Things are starting to move in the Marina with regard to the dredging, replacing of the finger piers, and potentially the long awaited rehab for the boat launch ramp. Facts are still being gathered but it appears that the dredging itself may cost less than was anticipated. Potentially this will free up the money needed for the ramp project. Very exciting stuff since, with the completion of these projects, our marina's facilities will have enhanced safety, longevity, appearance and usefulness. The neighborhood will regain one of the gems of Bayshore Gardens, one which we can all be proud of. On that note I will wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving. I hope that you are able to enjoy the day.

Reminders – Gate Key annual renewals were due the first of October. If you have not renewed your key will no longer work. Vehicles with trailers attached must have a parking decal. Don't loan out your Gate Key. If you are bringing a guest that is towing a boat, you must remain with them at all times. Arrangements must be made for tow vehicles with trailers parked in the Marina without decals.

Improvements - The Marina Committee continues to work the dredging issues. Soil samples from the boat basin bottom are to be evaluated for contaminants. This will tell us if the spoil from dredging will be able to just go out as fill or if special handling will be required. Design drawings for the new finger piers and the dock reconfiguration are being worked up.

- A 16-week-old turkey is called a fryer. A five to seven month old turkey is called a young roaster



a part of it.



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Heritage Builds Community Pride!

Across the United States of America, more and Economic Development Officer, Jan Hawley, also more towns and cities are discovering the merits of strong action to preserve heritage as a means of strengthening the community. In some cases action has been taken to enact broad heritage preservation legislation at the local or state level. In some cases, where a site or an area has national significance, a federal designation process has been enacted.

To our north, dozens of Canadian municipalities have also latched on to this trend.

According to Goderich, Ontario, Mayor Deb Shewfelt, heritage preservation "fosters a great quality of life and strong pride by our citizens." He does on to state, "As mayor for over 22 years I have been proud to support the establishing of heritage districts and residential heritage programmes."

Goderich is a community of just under 10,000 in size in largely rural southwestern Ontario, along the shores of Lake Huron. It boasts three heritage districts in its commercial core and dozens of individually-designated properties throughout the community. Its quest to preserve its community character through heritage designation programs is typical of the efforts of hundreds of communities across Canada which have undertaken heritage

designation projects of some nature.

The trend seems to be towards the formal designation of 'heritage conservation districts', not unlike the concept of designating the Bayshore Gardens Community to try and preserve its nature and basic mid-20th Century architectural flavor.

Barry Page, immediate past-Chair of the Goderich Municipal Heritage Committee

offers the following comment: "In the historic community of Goderich, visitors can see at a glance that significant efforts have been made to preserve the town's built heritage. Not only are heritage residential properties carefully maintained, but the three downtown Designated Heritage Conservation Districts contribute to the municipality's prosperity, vibrancy and charm.

It has been a cooperative effort: "The local town council, together with its advisory Municipal and Marine Heritage Committee, make sure that such built heritage reflects the past character of the town," according to Page.

What are the outcomes and the benefits for the community and its heritage neighborhoods? "This stewardship is instrumental in sustaining property values and encourages community pride," says Page unequivocally.

In Mayor Shewfelt's words, "Preserving the past influences the future!"


In the nearby Municipality of Huron East, a little further inland from the shores of Lake Huron, sings the praises of heritage designation: "As we continue to explore opportunities to strengthen the local economy, there seems to be a correlation between the preservation of the community's heritage fabric and that of the overall vitality of its historic settlements."

Interestingly, 30 years ago the Town of Seaforth made a bold decision to designate its downtown business district and develop a comprehensive set of guidelines, which would govern heritage restoration over the next three decades....and the rest is history, so to speak. Seaforth, one of the oldest heritage conservation districts in Ontario, also boosts a healthy business mix with very low

The residential areas across the community include a large number of designated properties in various neighborhoods.

In comparison, the Village of Brussels, elected not to designate, and up until recently has suffered the complete opposite with many empty storefronts and a decline in building stock.

However, over the last few years there has been a movement by the municipality to help revitalize the area and galvanize the community.



Surprisingly, this has been done by recognizing and celebrating Brussels' rich history. As a result, there has been a renewed interest by the residents of Brussels in cultivating a stronger sense of pride.

The Village of Vanastra, former Royal Canadian Air Force Base, Clinton, is located in the southwestern corner of the municipality. Although the area has been in decline since the base closed in 1971, revitalization efforts began late last year and are already showing signs of promise. Property standards are improving, new investment is evident, but most importantly the attitude of those living and working in the community is positive. Through the exploitation of the base's history, a new movement is afoot within the community. People are showing tremendous pride in where they live and work. Of recent, a historic display of the former air force training base, showcased for an entire year at the London International Airport, has now been reconstructed at the newly renovated Vanastra Recreation Centre. To say it's been a hit, is an understatement. There's a buzz throughout the community.

Jan Hawley declares, with some considerable excitement, "People are PROUD! There is

renewed hope for the Village of Vanastra.

"Honouring the Past....Shaping the Future, is a tried and true route to follow," she claims.

The Bayshore Gardens Heritage Option

While the Bayshore Gardens proposal in large measure is aimed at preserving a residential area, the community is spotted throughout with business and commercial areas. At its hub is a comprehensive recreation center, park and marina operation. The combination residential, business and recreational service center is an ideal combination for systematic renewal and enhancement.

One way to pull it all together is to combine the potential benefits of a heritage conservation district with the already-established 'tax incentive fund' area established earlier this year by Manatee County. It is really quite conceivable that one program could feed the other. The overall benefits would accrue to the community at large.

It could supply the necessary shot-in-the-arm to restore community pride and the general wellbeing of a number of neighbourhoods that have experienced great deterioration in the past few decades.

> Bayshore has been repeatedly invited to partner actively with Manatee County in re-development issues. Manatee has already put Bayshore into a TIF area. Tax dollars are automatically being identified for use here at a future date. Decisions about how those dollars get used is up to the locals - if we choose to have that say.

> It will be necessary for us probably through the Bayshore Gardens Board of Trustees – to appoint official representation

to liaise with Manatee County. At this time there is a committee emerging to pursue the heritage designation question. The larger involvement in

the matters related to TIF has not yet been resolved, it seems, to my knowledge...

Setting up a heritage area or district within Bayshore is seen by many as a self-protective measure to support and sustain what we have, what we are, and what we might go back to be when we were a stronger community. If we choose to be active participants, we can set the parameters for what will be, what is permissible, what is not, and how it all gets funded. Yes, such designation will impose certain restrictions, but the major limitation is against big developers coming in and tearing down our way of life to replace it with condos, massive homes and the related kind of development that would make our generally more humble way of life impossible.

The choice is ours. We can sit by and do nothing – and just hope that things get better. Or we can take an active role, become directly involved, and be the voice that sets the direction for our community and its future.



Knitted Knockers:

Manatee County knitters are creating prosthesis for women recovering from breast cancer

Breast cancer survivors may experience the devastating blow of losing one or both breasts to the disease. Many survivors face the proposition of wearing uncomfortable synthetic prosthetics or undergoing breast-augmentation

Now a group of volunteer knitters and crocheters in Manatee County are producing 100 per cent cotton prosthetic breasts or 'knockers' as the knitters call them from the web site, www.knittedknockers.com. The knitted cotton knocker is light weight, takes the form of a real breast, is soft against the skin and breathable. They are provided free to women who have undergone a mastectomy. The knitted prosthesis is so soft it can be worn immediately after a mastectomy operation and provides a comfortable alternative to other implants. Wearers have said they hardly know they are wearing them. With the silicone prosthesis, they usually can't wait to get them off.

The Manatee County Knitters and Crocheters Guild have delivered their first 20 prosthetic breasts to Blake Hospital. Several women are continuing to make Knitted Knockers for Blake at the request of the hospital. Most members of the Guild are knitting for Manatee County charities but making the knockers is especially gratifying as one woman's gift to another.

The Guild welcomes donations to the Manatee County Extension Service for the purchase of yarn. Kits are available for volunteers who offer to knit or crochet the knitted knockers. The kits ensure the necessary level of quality control and provide a level of consistency for the breast cancer survivor.

Horticultural Therapy

Those of us who enjoy gardening and being around plants and nature are not surprised to learn that scientific studies have shown significant health benefits from horticultural activities in many areas including physical, cognitive, social, psychological, and spiritual.

The American Horticultural Therapy Association (AHTA) defines horticultural therapy as the engagement of a client in horticultural activities, facilitated by a trained therapist, to achieve specific and documented treatment goals. This association was formed in 1973 to develop and promote the profession and provide training and professional regulation in the United States; degrees are offered at several major universities.

Horticultural therapy has a long history of being used in psychiatric hospitals, prisons, and with veterans. It is now widely used in hospitals, rehabilitation centers, schools, community gardens, hospices, and many other venues such as for children with special needs.

It is not surprising that many horticultural therapists are Master Gardeners or that many Master Gardeners work closely with horticultural therapists. Manatee County Master Gardener Rebecca Moreland, who has a professional background in public and occupational health, has a deep understanding of how our environment affects our health. She began volunteering six years ago with the Ellenton Tidewell Hospice House, helping tend the four gardens that are maintained for their

clients, families, and staff. These gardens include


a beautiful butterfly garden and rose garden along with an herb garden which is kept on the lanai to be enjoyed by patients, family, and friends. There is also an orchid house and the orchids are moved inside the house as they bloom. Shortly after starting to volunteer with hospice, Becky became a Master Gardener to learn more about the plants and how to care for them. One of her activities is making and delivering arrangements from the gardens. She finds that it stimulates patients and opens conversations about such subjects as gardening and cooking, and the recipients enjoy both the flowers and fragrances.

Patti Grant is a horticultural therapist who trained at Colorado State University through the Horticultural Therapy Institute. She also completed the Master Gardener training program through the University of California at Davis and was able to combine her background in international public health and love of gardening with horticultural therapy. She is now a consultant in horticultural therapy and provides customized horticultural activities, workshops about the benefits of engaging in horticultural activities, and consultation in therapy specific garden design. She loves sharing the benefits of horticulture and how intimately we are connected to nature and our world.

If you are interested in learning more, Patti will be conducting a workshop which includes hands-on activities on November 15 from 9:30-11:30 am.







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Delicious Thanksgiving Side Dishes

Grandma's Green Bean Casserole

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp butter
- 2 tbsp all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp white sugar
- 1/4 cup onion, diced 1 cup sour cream
- 3 cans French style green beans, drained
- 2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup crumbled buttery round crackers
- 1 tbsp butter, melted

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Melt 2 table-spoons butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Stir in flour until smooth, and cook for one minute. Stir in the salt, sugar, onion, and sour cream. Add green beans, and stir to coat. Transfer the mixture to a 2 1/2 quart casserole dish. Spread shredded cheese over the top. In a small bowl, toss together cracker crumbs and remaining butter, and sprinkle over the cheese. Bake for 30 minutes in the preheated oven, or until the top is golden and cheese is bubbly

Spirited Cranberry Sauce

Ingredients
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup port

4 cups fresh cranberries

1/4 cup orange liqueur

Directions:

Stir together sugar, port, and 3/4 cup water in a heavy 3-qt. saucepan until blended. Add cranberries; bring to a boil, and cook over mediumhigh heat, stirring often, 8 to 10 minutes or until cranberry skins begin to split. Remove from heat, and let cool 15 minutes. Pulse cranberry mixture in a food processor 3 to 4 times or until cranberries are almost pureed; stir in orange liqueur. Cover and chill 8 hours before serving. Store in refrigerator in an airtight container up to 3 weeks.

Cornbread Dressing

1/2 cup butter; 3 cups diced celery

2 cups diced sweet onions

1/2 cup finely chopped fresh sage

3 cups soft, fresh breadcrumbs

4 large eggs, lightly beaten;

7 cups chicken broth; Cornbread Crumbles

1 tablespoon freshly ground pepper

Preheat oven to 400°. Melt butter in a large skillet over medium-high heat; add celery and onions, and sauté 5 to 6 minutes or until onions are tender. Stir in sage, and sauté 1 minute. Stir together Cornbread Crumbles and breadcrumbs in a large bowl. Stir in eggs, next 2 ingredients, and celery mixture, stirring until blended. Divide cornbread mixture between 1 lightly greased 13- x 9-inch baking dish and 1 lightly greased 8-inch square baking dish. Bake at 400° for 45 to 55 minutes or until set and golden brown.

Perfect Mashed Potatoes

3 lbs Yukon gold potatoes; 2 tsp salt, divided 1/3 cup butter; 1/3 cup half-and-half

4 oz cream cheese, softened

3/4 tsp coarsely ground pepper

Peel, Boil & Drain. Peel potatoes, and cut into 1-inch pieces. Bring potatoes, 1 tsp. salt, and cold water to cover to a boil in a medium-size Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Reduce heat to medium-low, and cook 16 to 20 minutes or until fork-tender; drain. Add cream cheese and butter. Return potatoes to Dutch oven. Cook until water evaporates and potatoes look dry. Mound potatoes on 1 side; add butter, next 3 ingredients, and remaining 1 tsp. salt to opposite side of Dutch oven. Cook 1 to 2 minutes or until butter is melted and mixture boils. Beat until smooth. Remove from heat; beat at medium speed with a hand-held electric mixer 30 seconds to 1 minute or to desired degree of smoothness. (Do not overbeat.)

Classic Sweet Potato Casserole

4 1/2 lbs sweet potatoes

1 cup granulated sugar; 1 tsp vanilla extract

1/2 cup butter, softened

1/4 cup milk; 2 large eggs

1/4 tsp salt; 1 tbsp brown sugar

1 1/4 cups cornflakes cereal, crushed

1/4 cup chopped pecans

1 tbsp butter, melted

1 1/2 cups miniature marshmallows

Preheat oven to 400°. Bake sweet potatoes at 400° for 1 hour or until tender. Let stand until cool to touch (20 minutes); peel and mash sweet potatoes. Reduce oven temperature to 350°. Beat mashed sweet potatoes, granulated sugar, and next 5 ingredients at medium speed with an electric mixer until smooth. Spoon potato mixture into a greased 11- x 7-inch baking dish. Combine cornflakes cereal and next 3 ingredients in a small bowl. Sprinkle over casserole in diagonal rows 2 inches apart. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes. Remove from oven; let stand 10 minutes. Sprinkle marshmallows in alternate rows between cornflake mixture; bake 10 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

Corn Pudding

12 to 13 ears fresh corn, husks removed

1/4 cup sugar; 1 1/2 tsp salt

3 tbsp all-purpose flour

2 tsp baking powder; 6 large eggs

2 cups whipping cream; 1/2 cup butter, melted Preheat oven to 350°. Cut kernels from cobs into a large bowl (about 6 cups). Scrape milk and remaining pulp from cobs; discard cobs. Combine sugar and next 3 ingredients. Whisk together eggs, whipping cream, and butter in a large bowl. Gradually add sugar mixture to egg mixture, whisking until smooth; stir in corn. Pour mixture into a lightly greased 13- x 9-inch baking dish. Bake at 350° for 40 to 45 minutes or until set. Let stand 5 minutes






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
