The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bayshore Gardens Park and Recreation District was called to order by Chairman Maynard Boyce at 7:00 pm and was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Notice of the meeting was posted in the February Bayshore Banner.

Roll: Dan Rawlinson, Holly Clouse, Kathy Lokos, Debbie Korell Maynard Boyce, Richard Nelson, Terry Zimmerly, Vickie Ford and Jonna Koellhoffer.

A quorum was established.

Present: Joanne Manse, Steve Watkins, Suzanna Young, Don Gassie, Adam Hange, Marie Young. Debbie made a motion to approve the January minutes. Kathy seconded. **Motion passed.**

Debbie made a motion to approve the January financials. Kathy seconded. **Motion Passed.**

Kathy made a motion to move \$6,000.00 from the general fund to the Legal Fee Reserve Account. Debbie seconded. **Motion passed.**

BGNA: **Dan Rawlinson**

Suzanna reported Bayshore Gardens is going to get sidewalks. Suzanna would like to see board members at the next meeting. The topic for discussion will be speed bumps. *Next meeting is March 14th 2016 at 7:00 pm.*

MANAGERS REPORT: **Joanne Manse**
Joanne asked the board what they wanted her to do with the old cameras that were replaced. The decision was made to research to find what they are worth and sell on e-bay. We still have an unpaid boat slip. Joanne sent a request to Tallahassee for a title search on the boat. Once the report comes back the next step is to advertise an auction for the boat. Joanne reported she is starting to go through the Banner office in preparation for the new ADA bathroom. She requested a table at the attic sale to sell some of the materials and equipment that is no longer needed. Request was granted by Steve from crime watch. The new rope is being installed in the park. It has UV Blockers and should last at least 10 years. *The primary election will be held in the hall on March 15, 2016. The polls open at 7 am.*

BUDGET & FINANCE: **Kathy Lokos**
Kathy passed out a copy of the proposed budget. Kathy stated she is having a budget meeting Monday February 22, 2016 at 5:30 pm. The budget needs to be finalized at this meeting so it can be voted on at the Board meeting in March. *Next*

Jonna stated they talked about the difference from color pages verses black and white. She is still gathering information on this. Jonna will also be working on a plan to get more advertisers. *Next meeting March 9th at 5:30 pm.*

MARINA: **Richard Nelson**
Richard stated we received the letter from our attorney with his reviews on the proposal from Coastal Engineering. Our attorney's concern was having blank TBD on the contract. Debbie made a motion to submit the contract to Coastal Engineering with the amendments that include the three addendums from the attorney. Vickie seconded the motion. **Motion passed with eight yes and one no.** *Next meeting March 9, 2016 at 5:30 pm.*

HOUSE & GROUNDS: **Maynard Boyce**
Maynard stated that maintenance has been maintaining the ball field. There are a few deficiencies that need to be corrected. Maynard has found two suppliers for clay for the field. They range from \$32.50 per yard to \$43.45 per yard. We have to order at least 18 yards before they will deliver. Maynard made a motion to purchase 18 yards from Calhoun Inc. Dan seconded. **Motion passed seven yes and two no.** Debbie stated we would like to have approval to accept the plans from Final Draft, to pay for the rest of the plans and have approval to move forward on the next phase of the project. Holly seconded. **Motion passed.** Maynard reported on the porta potties we have at the beach and marina. We need to exchange those for ADA porta potties. We now pay \$170.00 per unit per month. The ADA potty's are \$204.00 per unit per month. The mangroves are in need of trimming so the office will contact Trailer Estates to get the name of the person they use. Don Gassie was asked by the Manatee Fish and Game to sponsor the Gullet Mullet tournament this year. We had some issues with them last year. Don asked for a hold harmless form and a hall contract form. He will review this and bring back to the board. *Next meeting March 9, 2016 at 5:30 pm.*

PERSONNEL & SALARY: **Dan Rawlinson**
Dan made a motion to pay the manager time and a half if the board meetings go over two hours. Kathy seconded. **Motion passed.** *Next meeting is March 9th at 5:30 pm.*

OLD BUSINESS: No old business

NEW BUSINESS: Debbie would like the office to order 9 new Sunshine Law books for each trustee. They are \$26.00 each. Maynard stated she should order 10 so we have a new book in the office. *Next meeting is March 15, 2016, at 7:00 pm.*

Call to Order: Dan Rawlinson at 7:00 pm after the Pledge of Allegiance.

Secretary: January Minutes were published in the Bayshore Banner. Motion made by Joyce Fisher to approve of minutes as written. Second by Debbie Korell. Approved by all. Susan mentioned that the BGNA minutes for January that were in the Bayshore Banner preview edition included a February 12th Spaghetti Dinner on them, which BGNA was not sponsoring. She did ask that this statement be removed before publishing the Banner. She did not receive information as to whom may have added this piece to our Minutes.

Treasurer: Susan Donaldson reports with the most recent updates, including NYE party the Pancake breakfast membership drive, and Friday morning dances earnings. (Pancake breakfast expenses were not factored into the balance, as Susan had not received the receipt from Dan R. yet.)

Joyce presented the BGNA with \$430 from the current season of the Friday morning dances. This is until current date, and the dances will con-

tinue until sometime in April.

Motion for approval of Treasurer's Report by Don G. and seconded by Rose. Approved by all.

Membership: Susan reports that we are currently at 25 members. If members have mailed their membership to the Recreation Center office, cards will arrive to you in the mail soon.

Old Business:

There was some discussion about the success of the Pancake Breakfast as a membership drive event. Arrangements were made to have another Pancake Breakfast Membership Drive on **Saturday, March 5th**. Restore Bayshore Reports

We are now talking Speed Calming measures in Bayshore Gardens!

Meeting on February 8, started at 7:00 pm. Second Mondays will be our new meeting date.

Suzanna Young opened the meeting and introduced our guest consultants from Neighborhood Services: Debbie DeLeon, Ivan Groom, Ogden Clark, Bob Barto; Commissioner, Robin DiSabatino and Michael Kenyan, Traffic Control officer from Manatee Sheriff's Dept. Present were the Task Group members and about 16 residents. Also attending was Misty Servia who is running for the School Board in August who happens to have background in planning.

As this meeting was dedicated to Infrastructure Task Group business, Maynard Boyce presided.

Ogden Clark gave an update on sidewalk projects. He noted that the school Board ID'd most all the (proposed) sidewalks that we have and endorsed it. He cautioned that there would be projects other than ours in the area: Road widening, signal maintenance, pavement marking maintenance, etc.

Road widening is to happen on 53rd Avenue and could possibly alleviate some traffic through Bayshore Gardens. The right-of-way has been cleared and construction is underway.

For Bayshore sidewalks, costs will be lower as no acquisition of right of way is needed. Neighborhood Svcs. will meet with Public Works in February to discuss project requirements. Florida Blvd. will be seen as a capital improve-

ment project and will be partnered with other projects.

We were reminded; anyone who sees any problem on the streets or back up or damage from heavy rains can take a picture and send it to ogden.Clark@mymanatee.org.

Sgt. Kenyan, with Sheriff's Dept since 1981, described speed problems and remedies.

"Pothole" art on a road is not just a joke, it works.

Designated crosswalks could be safer and even more so if they are raised crosswalks. He stressed more education is needed to be taught about school bus loading and off-loading and how cameras on buses can now spot violators; that in addition to electronic speed monitors there are speed trailers that are unseen, and record data about high traffic, speed areas and time of day they occur.

Sgt. Kenyan peppered his presentation with humorous stories from some of his 35 years on the job.

The MSO carries bicycle packets to hand out to people biking at night. It was pointed out too few wear reflective clothing.

Speed tables were discussed at length as stop signs are too often ignored thus causing increased danger. If speed limit were observed, a table would not impact a motorist.

They are also unobtrusive, unlike a string of stop signs. You can blow a stop sign but not a speed table. Requests for a speed table would have to be

produced by surrounding residents.

Discussed briefly were other speed calming measures such as painted double lines, painting bike lanes; Stop signs, chokers, chicanes, curb extension, raised crossings, neck-downs/bulb outs, speed tables, etc. Of course, any curb work would involve higher costs. Information sheets were handed out describing different solutions and their costs.

Discussion on crosswalk safety included: raised crosswalks, signs designating crosswalks, crosswalk caution lights; different texture of pavement to visually alert drivers; rumble strips in front of a cross walk or stop sign.

Ivan Groom then handed out street maps of Bayshore to the audience to identify streets, situations and areas they felt should get attention and ultimate solutions on speed and safety issues.

Participation by the group seemed quite enthusiastic in this task. Ivan will then come up with a synopsis gleaned from all the suggestions and report back at the next meeting.

Due to schedule conflicts, the March 14 meeting on Monday will start at 6:30 pm.

Traffic Calming Measures: 101: (Excerpts Provided by Manatee County Neighborhood Services)

Traffic calming measures are engineering tools used with the goal of reducing vehicle speed and improving the safety of motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists.

Introduced at the February Infrastructure Task Group meeting (Restore Bayshore), common traffic calming measures include: chicanes, chokers, curb extensions (neck-downs/bulb outs), median islands, speed tables, raised crossings, among others. Costs by foot, by square foot, by mile and by unit were given in an info sheet handed out at that meeting.

Chicanes: are concrete islands that offset traffic and create horizontal diversion thus reducing speed. Landscaped chicanes lend more greenery to a street.

Curb Extension: also called chokers or bulb-outs, extend the sidewalk or curb line out to the edge of the parking line. It visually reduces "street width". They can be used at

intersections to create a gateway effect.

Diverters: are islands built at intersections to influence traffic turning movements which slow traffic.

Islands: Crossing islands, also known as center islands or refuge islands are raised islands in the center of a street or intersections. Pedestrians need only to deal with one direction of traffic at a time and can have time to wait for an adequate gap in traffic.

Medians: are raised islands—narrower than islands—separate opposing streams of traffic and limit turning movements. They also facilitate pedestrian crossing, improve pedestrian visibility to motorists, slow vehicle speeds and provide space for lighting and landscaping. Medians can be constructed, natural, or landscaped.

Speed tables: are raised roadway with slight ramps on both sides for ease in negotiating; a small "hill". They are engineered to have no

adverse effect or impact on a vehicle going the posted speed.

Raised Crossings: Essentially are speed tables at an intersection on level with the sidewalk, 15 feet across, with ramps on both sides for vehicle traffic. If speeding, vehicles have to slow down to whatever the crosswalk speed is which encourages vehicles to yield to pedestrians.

A Raised Intersection is a speed table for the whole intersection.

Traffic Circle or Roundabouts: are circular intersections designed to eliminate left turns, requiring yielding and merging by motorists (teamwork in driving!). It also saves on gas in the long run.

Speed Trailers: Electronic signs which tell motorist what speed they are doing. These quell speeding but only temporarily.

Stop Signs: (Should) serve to slow traffic if spaced in close proximity to each other.

Traffic Calming for Bayshore Gardens Subdivision: Typical speed table configuration to reduce speed in residential areas.

This is an example of traffic calming utilized in a single family subdivision to slow down traffic that is using local residential streets to by-pass heavier

traffic on collector roads and thoroughfare streets. This condition occurs in Bayshore on Georgia, Case, Columbia, Stanford, Harvard, and Emory.

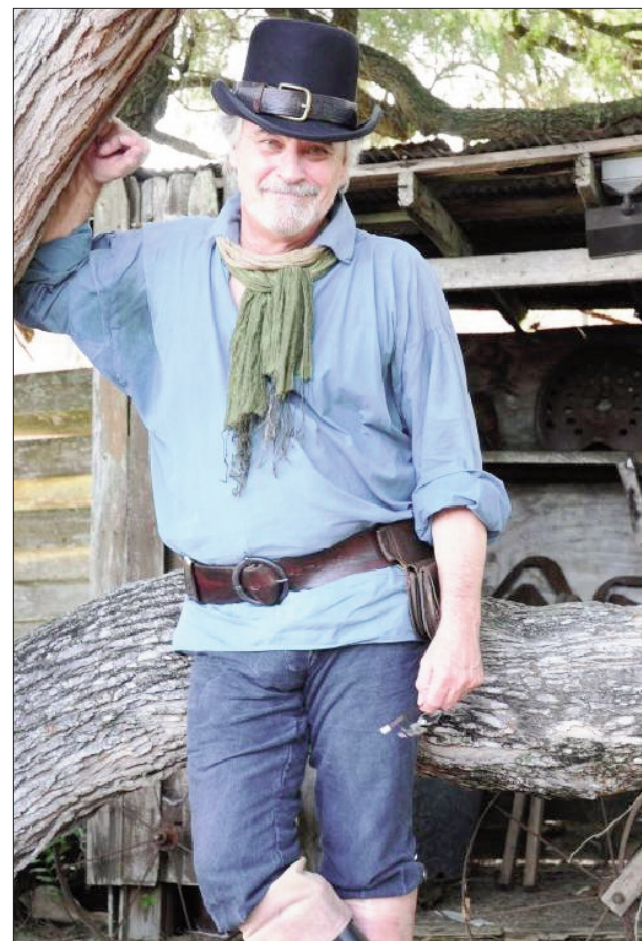
in the area.

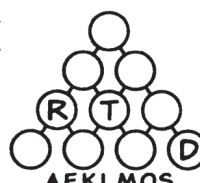

Simple and Delicious Fish Recipes

Baja Fish Tacos

1/4 red cabbage, thinly sliced
 1/2 cup fresh cilantro, roughly chopped
 Juice of 1 lime, plus wedges for serving
 2 tbsp honey or agave nectar
 1/2 cup mayonnaise; 12 corn tortillas
 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
 1/2 tsp chili powder
 1 1/4 lbs skinless halibut fillet, cut in pieces
 1 avocado; 1/2 cup fresh salsa
 Heat about 3 inches vegetable oil in a medium pot over medium-low heat until a deep-fry thermometer registers 375 degrees F. Meanwhile, toss the cabbage, cilantro, lime juice, honey and mayo in a bowl. Season the slaw with salt. Warm the tortillas and wrap in a towel to keep warm. Mix the flour, chili powder, salt and pepper to taste in a shallow bowl. Dredge the fish in the flour mixture, then fry in batches until golden and just cooked through, 2 to 3 minutes. Transfer with a slotted spoon to a paper-towel-lined plate to drain. Season with salt. Halve, pit and slice the avocado. Fill the tortillas with the fish, avocado, slaw and salsa. Serve with lime wedges.

Mustard-Roasted Fish

4 (8-oz) fish fillets such as red snapper
 Kosher salt and ground black pepper
 8 oz creme fraiche; 3 tbsp Dijon mustard
 1 tbsp whole-grain mustard
 2 tbsp minced shallots; 2 tps drained capers
 Preheat oven to 425F. Line a sheet pan with parchment paper, or use an ovenproof baking dish. Place fish fillets skin side down on the sheet pan. Sprinkle generously with salt and pepper. Combine the creme fraiche, 2 mustards, shallots, capers, 1 tsp salt, and 1/2 tsp pepper in small bowl. Spoon sauce evenly over fish fillets, making sure the fish is completely covered. Bake for 10-15 minutes, until it's barely done. The fish will flake easily at the thickest part when it's done. Be sure not to overcook it! Serve hot or at room temperature with the sauce from the pan spooned over the top.

Chicken Fried Fish

12 oz green beans, trimmed
 4 6-oz tilapia fillets; 3/4 cup AP flour
 1/4 tsp paprika, plus more for sprinkling
 2 large eggs; 1/4 cup vegetable oil
 1 1/4 cups low-sodium chicken broth
 1/4 cup whole milk; 2 tbsp cream cheese
 1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley
 Place green beans in a microwave-safe dish. Add 1/4 cup water and 1/2 tsp salt, cover loosely with plastic wrap and microwave until tender. Sprinkle fish all over with salt and pepper. Combine flour and paprika in dish. Beat eggs in 2nd dish. Dip each fillet in eggs, then dredge in flour, turning to coat. Reserve flour mixture. Heat 3 tbsp oil in a skillet over med-high heat. Fry fish until cooked through. Transfer to plate. Wipe out skillet. Heat 1 tbsp oil in skillet over med-high heat. Whisk in 3 tbsp of reserved flour mixture, add chicken broth and 1/4 cup water; bring to a boil, whisking. Add milk, cream cheese, parsley; cook, whisking, until slightly thick. Season with salt and pepper. Top with sauce, sprinkle with paprika.

Shrimp-Salad Pitas

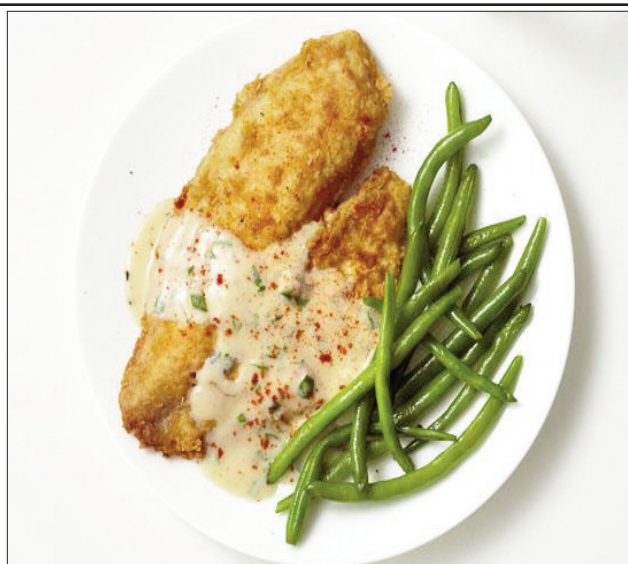
1/2 small red onion, finely chopped
 1 1/2 lbs medium shrimp, peeled, deveined and halved crosswise
 2 tbsp EVOO; 1/2 tsp hot paprika
 1/2 cup 2% Greek yogurt
 1 medium carrot, coarsely grated
 1 cucumber, halved length, seeded sliced
 1 tbsp chopped fresh dill; 1 lemon
 4 whole-wheat pitas; 8 Bibb lettuce leaves
 Preheat broiler. Soak chopped onion in a bowl of cold water while preparing shrimp. Toss shrimp with olive oil, paprika, salt and pepper on a rimmed baking sheet. Spread in even layer, broil until shrimp are opaque. Transfer to a bowl and let cool. Clean baking sheet. Drain onion, add to shrimp along with yogurt, carrot, cucumber, dill, salt, pepper. Grate in 1 tsp lemon zest, squeeze in about half of the lemon juice. Lay pitas on baking sheet, toast under broiler. Cut pitas in half, fill with lettuce & shrimp salad.

Foil-Packet Fish With Corn Relish

1 tsp coriander seeds; 1 cup fresh parsley
 1 cup fresh cilantro, more for garnish
 1 1-inch piece ginger, peeled, chopped
 2 tbsp vegetable oil; 2 limes, cut in wedges
 1 3/4 cups corn kernels (thawed if frozen)
 2 medium tomatoes, cut into chunks
 4 6-ounce skinless striped-bass fillets
 Preheat grill to high. Toast coriander seeds in skillet over med-high heat, tossing, about 3 minutes. Crush seeds, then pulse with parsley, cilantro, ginger, vegetable oil, 1/2 tsp salt, 1 tbsp water in processor to make a coarse mixture. Toss corn and tomatoes with 2 tps of mixture, season with salt. Place 1 piece of fish in center of foil. Top with spoonful of remaining herb mixtur, surround with corn-tomato relish. Fold up ends of foi, seal into packets, leaving room inside for heat circulation. Grill packets, covered, until fish is just cooked through, 8-10 minutes. Put on plates, top with cilantro, lime.

Tilapia Masala With Rice

1 cup basmati rice, rinsed
 1/2 cup frozen peas; 3/4 cup plain yogurt
 1 small clove garlic, chopped
 1 1-inch piece ginger, peeled and chopped
 1 tbsp fresh lime juice, plus lime wedges
 1/4 tsp ground cumin; 4 6-oz tilapia fillets
 1/4 tsp cayenne pepper
 2 tbsp unsalted butter, melted
 1 tbsp chopped fresh cilantro or mint
 Bring rice, 1 1/3 cups water and 1/4 tsp salt to a simmer over med-high heat. Reduce heat to low, cover and cook 15 minutes. Remove from heat and add peas; cover and set aside. Puree 1/2 cup yogurt, garlic, ginger, lime juice, cumin, cayenne and 3/4 tsp salt in a processor. Transfer all but 3 tbsp of mixture to bowl. Pierce fish with fork, season with salt; add to bowl and toss. Marinate 15 mins. Preheat broiler. Place fish on broiler pan; top with marinade and butter. Broil until opaque. Mix remaining 1/4 cup yogurt, the cilantro, and salt to taste with the yogurt mixture. Serve the fish and rice with the yogurt sauce and lime wedges.
