



Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

Disease Control and Prevention, the first month of the year is the worst for carbon monoxide poisoning. At least two people die each day from carbonmonoxide poisoning in January—three times the fatality rate recorded in August and July.

Fatalities were highest among men and senior citizens: Men because they are engaged in more high-risk behaviors such as working with fuelburning tools or appliances and seniors because they are likely to mistake the symptoms of CO poisoning (headaches, nausea, dizziness or confusion) for the flu or fatigue.

It should come as no surprise that CO deaths are the highest in winter (December is the second highest month). Cold weather increases the use of gas-powered furnaces as well as the use of risky alternative heating and power sources (portable generators, charcoal briquettes, propane stoves or grills) during power outages.

With these sobering facts it's a good time to remember the following safety tips to prevent CO poisoning:

- According to a study by the Federal Centers for Have your heating system, water heater and any other gas, oil or coal-burning appliance inspected and serviced by a qualified technician every year.
 - Install battery-operated CO detectors on every level of your home.
 - Don't use a generator, charcoal grill, camp stove or other gasoline or charcoal-burning device inside the home, basement or garage or outside the home near a window.
 - Don't burn anything in an unvented stove or
 - Don't let a vehicle idle inside a garage attached to a house, even if the garage door is left open.
 - Don't heat a house with a gas oven.

If a CO detector sounds, leave your home immediately and call 911 from outside. Seek prompt medical attention if you suspect CO poisoning and if you or someone in your household is feeling dizzy, light-headed or nauseated.

Proving the power of the pen, John and Abigail wrote over 1,000 letters to one another during their courtship and marriage. Unwilling to follow conventional roles, Abigail ran the family farm and

managed the budgeting, without John's interference. This didn't bother the statesman one bit, and he often joked that the household seemed to run smoother in his absence. Abigail even wielded her influence during John's term as President, but was not well received by the American public, who This duo is particularly noted for breaching social referred to her sarcastically as "Her Majesty." Criticism did not diminish the love between the two, and they remained devoted until their deaths.

The History of St. Valentine

Around 270 AD, the Roman empire was facing enemies from all sides, which made the emperor Claudius demand the need of men to enlist in the army. Very few men volunteered though, opting for tranquility and a life with their loved ones. Seeing this, Claudius believed the remedy to the problem would be to dissolve this love, and the best way to do it would be to outlaw marriage. The very notion of outlawing marriage to diminish love was ludicrous to the Catholic priest Valentine. He soon became known as the 'friend of lovers', secretly uniting couples in marriage, and being their only witness. Claudius soon caught on to this though and threw Valentine in prison. While imprisoned, the guard, Asterius, brought his blind daughter to Valentine in hopes that he would cure her. Some say he did and some

say he didn't, but what is known is that the duo developed a rapturing bond, remaining in constant contact. Claudius met with Valentine to deter him from Christianity to Roman gods, but instead Valentine began to preach to him. By doing this, he knew it would mean the harshest punishment possible, death. He was condemned to be executed. Before his execution, he was given the chance to write a letter. He wrote to his love a final farewell and penned the now famous signature 'From Your Valentine'. This love became renowned and Valentine became regarded as a saint. In 496 AD, February 14th was declared Valentine's Day and in the 14th century, it became a day dedicated to celebrating lovers; a tradition that carries on to this day.

OLD BUSINESS: Nothing to report.



DOCKMASTER'S REPORT Dockmaster John Woodruff 941-720-3738

January saw some activity in our work areas. One boat returned to the water and two boats came out into the south work area. Also there have been a couple of boats in and out of the north work area. Maybe this will be the month I put my boat up for a long overdue bottom job. The new boat stands came in so we now have as many stands as we should need to safely fill the work areas with boats. If you would like to pull your boat let me know so I can get you into the north work area for small boats or get you in on a crane operation in the south work area for large boats.

Low tides this past month have underscored our need for the dredging project in the marina and exploring our options for the dredging of the Bayshore Gardens/Trailer Estates channel. Each of these continues to be an ongoing project for the Marina Committee and the Board of Trustees. Also the plan to redo the finger piers is under development.

A theft was reported of fishing gear off of a boat in the marina in January. Those of you that have read my thoughts on people that take other peoples stuff, know how much I detest sneak thieves. Unfortunately they are a miserable fact of life and while we haven't had many thefts, one is too many for me. The best that we can do is taking steps to deny these criminals the opportunity to take our possessions. Please do what you can to secure your property. I wonder what the penalty for theft would be under maritime

law. I'm thinking at least Keelhauling.

Reminders – Vehicles with trailers attached must have a parking decal. Don't loan out your Gate Key. If you are bringing a guest that is towing a boat, you must remain with them at all times. Arrangements must be made for tow vehicles with trailers parked in the Marina without decals.

Improvements - The Marina Committee Continues to work the dredging issues. Design drawings for the new finger piers and the dock reconfiguration are being worked up.

Repairs and Projects Completed – A few loose planks on the finger piers around the marina have been reattached or replaced. A few 4x4 posts were installed to stabilize finger piers. Some repair was done to strengthen the east end of the fishing dock.

Did You Know: Admiralty law or maritime law is a distinct body of law that governs maritime questions and offenses. It is a body of both domestic law governing maritime activities, and private international law governing the relationships between private entities that operate vessels on the oceans. It deals with matters including marine commerce, marine navigation, marine salvaging, shipping, sailors, and the transportation of passengers and goods by sea. Admiralty law also covers many commercial activities, although land based or occurring wholly on land, that are maritime in character.

Admiralty law is distinguished from the Law of the Sea, which is a body of public international law dealing with navigational rights, mineral rights, jurisdiction over coastal waters and international law governing relationships between nations.

Although each legal jurisdiction usually has its own enacted legislation governing maritime matters, admiralty law is characterized by a significant amount of international law developed in recent decades, including numerous multilateral treaties.





Mangrove Trimming: Regulations You Need to

The Manatee County Master Gardener Newsletter: By Betty Ann Price, Master Gardener 2012

Waterfront homeowners are frequently perplexed by rules and regulations governing mangroves along their shoreline. From permits to "PMT" to "riparian mangrove fringe," the language can be a bit overwhelming. Let's wade through the regulatory swamp with a glossary of definitions intended to protect a precious natural resource, while preserving valuable waterfront property views.

1996 Mangrove Trimming and Preservation Act: (aka the 1996 Act) regulates alteration and trimming of mangroves statewide in Florida. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection provides oversight for the 1996 Act.

Alteration of Mangroves: Any human-induced removal, defoliation, or destruction of mangroves requires a permit (refer to special conditions within). Herbicides that will defoliate or destroy mangroves are prohibited. Note: Removal of a dead mangrove tree is considered alteration, and prohibited without a permit. Alterations include cutting mangrove roots or trimming a mangrove that is more than 24 feet tall.

Homeowner Exemption: Within specific parameters, homeowners may trim riparian mangrove fringe (RMF, see definition below) on their property without obtaining a permit. (When the pre-trimmed mangrove height is greater than 6 feet and less than 10 feet tall, the homeowner may trim mangroves on their property back to 6 feet tall. Homeowners may maintenance trim mangroves that have been previously trimmed in accordance with an exemption or prior authorization, provided the trimming does

not exceed the height and configuration previously attained. When the shoreline is greater than 150 feet in length, only 65% of the mangrove trees along the shoreline may be trimmed. Note: the services of a professional mangrove trimmer (PMT) are required if the mangroves are between 10 feet and 24 feet



in height.

Mangrove Permits: Permits are required for alteration of mangroves and situations that do not qualify under the home-owner exemption. General permit applications require a thirty day notice to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection before beginning any work.



You can find the permit application online at www.dep.state.fl.us/water/wetlands/forms/mangrove/trimapp.doc.

Professional Mangrove Trimmers (PMT): These are persons certified through a variety of professional arboriculture, wetland, environmen-

tal, ecology or landscape societies and recognized by the FL Department of Environmental Protection. PMT services are required to supervise and/or trim mangroves when pre-trimmed height is between 10 to 24 feet tall. A list of PMT for our region may be found online.

Riparian Mangrove Fringe (RMF): A shoreline band of mangroves no more than 50 feet deep from the most landward to waterward trunks. Only an owner of RMF property may trim or authorize trimming of mangroves within parameters of the 1996 Act.

Trimming: Includes cutting a portion of mangrove branches, limbs, twigs and a portion of foliage. Trimming is intended to shape and preserve the mangrove tree specimen. While the term pruning is not used in the 1996 statute, it may be considered a synonym for trimming. Mangrove trees with pre-trim height over 16 feet tall must be trimmed so that no more than 25% of the leaves are removed annually.

A variety of mangrove trimming styles can offer the waterfront homeowner satisfying shoreline vistas. 

Master Gardeners Bench; By Norma Kisida, Master Gardener 2012

As a bonus to our great weather here in winter, we are treated to a wide range of winter flowers and foliage. Along with the typical annuals and perennials, several of our spectacular trees, shrubs, and vines are in bloom during the "dead of winter." Examples are the red silkcotton tree, the Hong Kong orchid tree, and of course, the flamboyant bougainvilleas.

One our biggest show-off vines in winter is the **bougainvillea** (**Bougainvillea spp**.). It is a tropical vine/shrub that presents colors of fuchsia, red, white, or orange that tumbles over and against walls and trellises.

It can be left as a large free-growing shrub, pruned to keep smaller or used as an espalier. There are also dwarf varieties available. What we perceive as flowers are actually modified brightly colored leaves called bracts. These bracts appear on and off during the year but put on the best show in

It is fast growing, cold hardy, drought tolerant, and thrives on neglect. To get the most blooms, trim and fertilize after a bloom cycle, preferably in early spring and before the rainy season. Reasons for not blooming well include too little sun, too much water, over pruning, and too much nitrogen.

This beautiful plant needs plenty of space to sprawl, has sharp thorns, and may need frequent pruning. If you are confined to a small space, look for dwarf cultivars like 'Sunvillea,' 'Helen Johnson,' or the pixie cultivars

Florida flame vine (Pyrostegia venusta) produces showy orange trumpet-shaped clusters in late winter and early spring. It is a fast growing vine with tendrils that clings to most anything it can reach and needs plenty of space as it can reach 50-60 feet. This native of Brazil is moderately cold hardy (zones 9-11), grows well in sun to partial shade, and requires little or no fertilizer once established.

The fruits are slender dry capsules. Propagation is by cuttings.

Although the flower has been described as the most beautiful flower in the world and was previously recommended for Florida, it is now a plant that is being watched by the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council (www.fleppc.org/) for further spread into natural areas.







Easy Breakfast Recipes

Scrambled Eggs with Smoked Salmon

Ingredients:

1/4 pound sliced smoked salmon

12 eggs

1/2 cup heavy cream

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

2 tablespoons butter

12-15 blades of fresh chives, finely chopped *Directions:*

Reserve 2 slices of salmon for garnish. Chop the remaining salmon into very small pieces.

Whisk your eggs and cream together. Add 1/2 of your chopped chives and season eggs with salt and pepper. Preheat a large non-stick skillet over medium heat. Melt butter in the pan and add eggs. Scramble eggs with a wooden spoon. Do not cook eggs until dry. When eggs have come together but remain wet, stir in chopped salmon. Remove pan from the stove and place on a trivet. Garnish the eggs with remaining salmon and chives and serve right out of the warm pan.

English-Muffin Breakfast Pizza

Ingredients:

1 whole-wheat English muffin, split 1 small tomato, seeded and diced

1 teaspoon extra-virgin olive oil

1 thin slice Canadian bacon, diced

1/4 cup shredded mozzarella cheese Chopped fresh basil, for garnish

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 450 degrees. Line a small baking sheet with foil.

Place the English muffin halves cut-side up on the baking sheet. Top each with tomato and drizzle with the olive oil. Sprinkle the Canadian bacon over the tomatoes, then top with the mozzarella. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes, or until the cheese is melted and beginning to brown. Sprinkle with basil.

Blueberry Coffee Cake Muffins

Ingredients:

12 tbsp unsalted butter, at room temperature

1 1/2 cups sugar; 1/4 cup milk

3 extra-large eggs, at room temperature

1 1/2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract

8 ounces (about 1 cup) sour cream

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 tsp baking soda; 1/2 tsp kosher salt 2 half-pints fresh blueberries, no stems

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Place 16 paper liners in muffin pans. In the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy, about 5 minutes. With the mixer on low speed, add the eggs 1 at a time, then add the vanilla, sour cream, and milk. In a separate bowl, sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. With the mixer on low speed add the flour mixture to the batter and beat until just mixed. Fold in the blueberries with a spatula and be sure the batter is completely mixed. Scoop the batter into the prepared muffin pans, filling each cup just over the top, and bake for 25 to 30 minutes, until the muffins are lightly browned on top and a cake tester comes out clean.

Avocado Smoothie

Ingredients:

2/3 cup avocado Lemon juice; Honey

Ginger; 1 cup ripe mango

1 cup ice

Soaked chia seeds (optional)

Directions:

For a lusciously creamy smoothie, blend avocado (full of healthy fats and potassium) with lemon juice, honey, ginger, mango and ice. Extra credit: Stir in soaked chia seeds for an omega-3 boost.

Cream Cheese & Chive Omelet

Ingredients:

1 tablespoon olive oil

4 eggs; 2 tablespoons minced chives

2 tablespoons water

1/8 tsp salt; 1/8 teaspoon pepper

2 ounces cream cheese, cubed Salsa

Directions:

In a large nonstick skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Whisk the eggs, chives, water, salt and pepper. Add egg mixture to skillet (mixture should set immediately at edges). As eggs set, push cooked edges toward the center, letting uncooked portion flow underneath. When the eggs are set, sprinkle cream cheese on one side; fold other side over filling. Slide omelet onto a plate; cut in half. Serve with salsa.

Breakfast Bread Bowls

Ingredients:

1/2 cup chopped pancetta; 1/8 tsp pepper 4 crusty hard rolls (4 inches wide)

1/2 cup finely chopped fresh mushrooms 4 eggs; 1/8 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup shredded Gruyere or fontina cheese *Directions:*

Preheat oven to 350°. In a small skillet, cook pancetta over medium heat until browned, stirring occasionally. Remove with a slotted spoon; drain on paper towels. Meanwhile, cut a thin slice off top of each roll. Hollow out bottom of roll, leaving a 1/2-in.-thick shell (save removed bread for another use); place shells on an ungreased baking sheet. Add mushrooms and pancetta to bread shells. Carefully break an egg into each; sprinkle eggs with salt and pepper. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake 18-22 minutes or until egg whites are completely set and yolks begin to thicken but are not hard.
