Swimming Pool Attendant Job Description:

- 1. Assist in getting pool ready to open.
- 2. Take the position at the Lifeguards stand to allow the lifeguards to have a break every 45 minutes.
- 3. Assist in ensuring that safety regulations and standards are followed
- 4. During lulls, hose off the upper and lower deck area.
- 5. Assist in the closure of the pool for one hour in the event of fecal or vomit in the pool, and remove the contaminate as thoroughly as possible.
- 6. Assist in closure of the pool for 24 hours should someone have diarrhea in the pool
- 7. Only allow diapers in the pool if they are approved swimmers diapers.
- 8. Assist in the closure of the pool immediately at the first sign of a storm and keep closed until storm passes.
- 9. Assist in the closure of the pool immediately in the event of loss of electricity or water. Pool may not reopen until service is restored.

- 10. Assist in the removal of the public from the pool who are causing disturbances or not following safety regulations and pool rules. Call 911 if directed by the lifeguard on duty
- 11. Do not assume responsibility for belongings of guests or co-workers.
- 12. Do not loiter, smoke, consume alcohol, use profanity, or use cell phone for personal business.
- 13. Assist in the filing of incident report for any incident occurring at the pool that could be an injury. Turn report into District Office.
- 14. Clean the pool, deck, and bathrooms during lulls.
- 15. Inspects Pool and surrounding area periodically each day for safety and cleanliness of the facility.
- 16. Take down umbrellas, put away pool equipment, safety floats/noodles, kick boards, tetherball etc.;
- 17. Make sure pool is ready to open the next day.
- 18. Assist in the closure of the Pool at time specified.

"Flare" From The Chair

Your Board of Trustees have been hard at work checking things off our "to do" list. We are working on having our facilities ADA compliant. Anyone who has tried to get into the rec center the usual way has experienced the inconvenience of construction. It is a necessary part of operating the District. Now our residents, who are wheelchair and walker dependent, can easily open the door to the rec center without the fear of the sloped landing. Soon, we will have a pool lift and other required equipment to assist our residents who need specialized equipment.

The rebuilding of the boat ramp is scheduled to start the by the 15th of April. We are finalizing the details to put the marina out for bids. The Recreation Center is in the final engineering stage before bids start on that renovation.

I know you are all anxious to get to the pool since the weather is so nice. In order to open we must meet three criteria. 1. The water temperature must be 70 degrees. (That one should be accomplished soon). 2. All the maintenance projects must be finished. This one is iffy right now. The leaking pipe under the pool deck was discovered while the filters were being changed in anticipation of opening the pool. It is serious and right now there is no completion date. The new surfacing is being applied to the breezeway as I write this. 3. We

must have pool supervision. The Board had changed the policy to one lifeguard per shift, and a pool attendant in an effort to keep the pool open longer hours. This one is also iffy right now as we are not receiving applications for either position and we have advertising to get personnel since November and nobody is applying for the positions. The Board has voted to raise the pay scale to attract more applicants, but the pool cannot open without proper supervision. The teenagers we once relied upon, don't seem to want summer jobs. Pool attendants will only need to be strong swimmers to start, and if the applicant has CPR and first-aid training, he/she will be started at a higher pay rate. The Pool attendant will be supervised by the lifeguard on duty. If any resident is interested in a position, please call the office. The shifts will be three or four hours long. Please be assured that we are working hard to get the pool open as soon as possible, and for as many hours per day as possible.

There are two conditions under which the pool cannot be open after achieving 1 thru 3 above. 1. The pool must be closed at dusk (½ hour before sunset) and may not reopen until 1/2 hour after sunrise 2. The pool must be evacuated when a storm approaches (and ½ hour after if any lightning is observed in the area).

Minute with the Manager

The history of Bayshore Gardens started in 1955 when three real estate developers purchased 3.6 square miles of land from the owners. At the time, this was one of the largest developments in Manatee County. In 1979 Bayshore Gardens Park & Recreation District became a Special Taxing District, created by the Florida Legislature. As an independent Special Taxing District, the Board of nine Trustees governs the District and allocates the annual tax assessments for the maintenance of the District's common elements and recreational activities.

This distinction is often confused with a Homeowner's Association. We do have a **volun**tary Homeowner's Association which residents may join for \$10 a year. Our Homeowner's Association does not have the authority to levy a lien against a taxpayer's property nor can they cite a homeowner for property condition. We are not a deed restricted community. This power falls under Manatee County Code Enforcement who can impose a fine for not keeping a property to code standards. The annual assessment that we all pay as homeowners within the Bayshore Gardens District appears on the tax statement issued by the Manatee County Tax Collector and is noted under the non-ad valorem portion of the tax bill. Non-ad valorem assessments are based on the value or benefit to the property. Whereas, ad-valorem taxes are based on the assessed value of the real estate, which is determined by the property appraiser's office.

The Bayshore Gardens annual assessment is currently \$367.00 and is charged to each homeowner in the District. The office receives calls requesting to opt out of paying the annual assessment fee. This is not an option. When one purchases within the community, this assessment is due and payable within the real estate taxes whether the homeowner utilizes the common elements or not.

The homeowner is eligible for resident rates in the marina, recreation and screen porch rentals by virtue of residency. When selling your Bayshore Gardens home, the community amenities add value to your home. Having direct access to Sarasota Bay with no fixed bridges is viewed as contributory value and will demand a higher price in the market place versus a home without these amenities.

As residents, we all benefit from the amenities we have to offer. In the upcoming year, you will see your tax assessment being used to update the facilities. Slated first is the boat ramp. This project is in the hands of the contractor and as of this writing we are waiting on confirmation of a start date. The ramp will be widened by 2 feet along with an ADA dock installed. Thereafter, the dredging of the marina and finger piers will follow. A much needed and overdue project. The RFP is being prepared and will be ready to send out for bids. As we confirm these dates, the community will be notified by website posting, signs on the property and Bayshore Banner. Although we will experience an inconvenience during these major projects, the end result will be worth it.

Keep an eye on the Banner and the website for upcoming details and schedules of improvements.

Community C.E.R.T. organizations must have a sponsor, and that sponsor must be one of the following, a County, Police agency or Fire Dept. Individual communities such as ours cannot certify a team, we must be a part of one of the three to be certified. The training we all receive is the same nationwide and our credentials are honored everywhere. Many C.E.R.T. members were asked to deploy to the panhandle for Hurricane Michael and were recognized for their service.

Your C.E.R.T organizations and other communities C.E.R.T. programs participate in quarterly meetings with Emergency Management, Fire Departments and the Sheriff's Department.

The meetings create a good working relationship with all First Responders, and the opportunity to learn new procedures from the other First Responders.

Our C.E.R.T. is a local organization whose members are trained in First Aid, CPR, search and rescue, and more. Our training is provided by Manatee County under the direction of Homeland Security and we are classified with the first responders. C.E.R.T. is a part of the Manatee County Emergency Disaster Plan. We self-activate in an emergency to serve the public until help arrives. We are trained to survive and assist our neighbors for the first 72 hours.

We know our communities and where the most vulnerable are. We are just getting started here and need volunteers. Manatee County will sponsor another C.E.R.T. class in August. The classes fill up quickly; early registration should insure a spot in the class.

There is a \$5 per person charge for the guided tour given by the owner of the property. Cash or check only, no credit cards.



Neighborhood Oak Trees in Manatee County

On your next walk, pause and take note of the trees that surround you. If you live in an older or perhaps even a newer neighborhood in the county, chances are one of the trees is an oak (Quercus spp.). There are several hundred oak species in the United States; twenty-four are found in Florida, but only a few are common to Manatee County.

The most dominant in the county is the live oak (Q. virginiana). This tree got its name for retaining its green leaves until after the following year's new leaves appear.

This tree has one of the broadest spreads of all oaks, making it majestic in our landscapes. It can reach 40 to 60 feet in height, but its spread can stretch out 60 to 100 feet. The trunk is very short and has deep rough ridges and grooves. Leaves are leathery green and tend to have a rolled look.

This tree is prized for its disease and pest-free hardiness, long life, shade cover, hurricane and salt resistance, and ability to thrive in urban settings, including areas with compact soil and drought conditions. If that weren't enough, consider that it is a great home to many epiphytic plants and wildlife.

Some maintenance issues with live oaks include pruning, which must be done every year in the first three years to properly develop trunk and branch structure. Then, the pruning can taper to every five years to age thirty and then as needed. Roots are known to lift sidewalks and driveways.

In the past, the live oak was designated as the canopy street tree in the land development code of Manatee County. Due to the potential size, it is now only recommended for lots greater than sixty feet wide. Smaller street trees or shrubs are now suggested.

The laurel oak (Q. laurifolia) is another oak with a strong presence in Manatee County. This tree is considered medium-sized: it often grows as tall as the live oak but does not have the broad spread. It has a rounded symmetrical top and its leaves tend to be narrower and longer than the live oak. Leaves are lustrous green in color with a yellow mid-rib. Unlike the live oak, this tree loses its leaves in early spring and can remain bare for several weeks until new leaf buds break.

Gardeners and landscapers recommend the laurel oak for its fast growth and shady dense canopy. This oak can tolerate wet conditions but only with good drainage. Drawbacks include a shortened life due to rot, starting from the inside, at about 50 years of age. Symptoms are not seen until it is too late to save the tree. The laurel oak does not grow well in alkaline soil, and its roots also tend to lift sidewalks and driveways.

There are other oak species with a limited presence in Manatee County. These include the sand live oak (Q. germinata), myrtle oak (Q. myrtofolia), Chapman oak (Q.chapmanii) and the sand laurel oak (Q.hemisphaerica). These oaks vary in the environmental sites they enjoy. For example, the sand laurel oak prefers a dry upland site, while its sister the laurel oak can thrive in wet conditions.

Look for young seedlings at local native landscape nurseries, and consider planting an oak on April 26 for Arbor Day. Call the Manatee County Extension Office and ask for assistance regarding which oak tree would be best for your landscape. Don't forget to have your soil tested for best results.



Case Management - Trained case managers link clients with needed services in the community, monitor the services, and periodically review clients' needs.

Homemaker - Service includes housekeeping, meal planning and preparation, laundry services, and shopping for groceries, medical supplies and incidentals.
