The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bayshore Gardens Park and Recreation District was called to order by the Chairman Maynard Boyce at 7:00 p.m. and was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Notice of the meeting was posted in the December Bayshore Banner.

Roll Call: Barbara Susdorf, Sharon Denson, Steve Watkins, Dan Rawlinson, Maynard Boyce, Debbie Korell, Terry Zimmerly and Jim Couey.

A quorum was established.

Present: Jodie Lawman, Don Gassie, Suzanna Young, Richard Nelson, Alan Riga and Barbara Greensburg.

Maynard made a motion to approve the December minutes. The minutes were not available and will be at the February meeting.

Steve made a MOTION to approve the December financials, Debbie seconded. **MOTION PASSED**.

BGNA: Dan Rawlinson

There will be a Breakfast February 10th from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., the "Breakfast of Champions" with the Board of Trustees. HOA members are free, otherwise it's \$3.00 per person. Dan reports that the first breakfast of the New Year went very well. Next meeting will be February 8th, 2017 at 7:00 pm.

CRIME WATCH: Steve Watkins

Steve reported we have some new deputies on patrol in our area and they are focusing on our marina. Next meeting will be February 13th, 2017 at 7:00 pm.

RESTORE BAYSHORE: Suzanna Young

Town Hall is Wednesday, January 17, 2018 at 7:pm. This time Susan suggested that they will track questions and answers. Susan suggested discussion about crosswalks at Florida Blvd. and 26th Street W. There is difficulty crossing at this area because cars generally will not stop for pedestrians. There is illegal parking in our lot on the paved apron adjacent to the ball field. A deputy was called and advised that this was not her jurisdiction, stating it is private property. A county map clearly depicts the area as county property. We need to find out how the county views this parking. Next meeting will be February 12th, 2018 at 6:30 pm.

MANAGER'S REPORT: Jodie Lawman

Jodie reported a new sign was installed to the left of the breezeway for night and weekend drop offs by residents. This will appear in the February banner with a photo and brief description of location. The office would like to offer fax, copying and notary services to our residents for a nominal fee. Treasurer, Gwen, reports we still have \$67.79 on hand which was mostly due to the Bake Sale at the last Attic Sale.. Report was approved.

Minutes were posted in January Banner. Jeanne Corbin motioned to approve and Jim Couey seconded; motion passed.

President's note: We now have 2 cabinets in hall for storage for our files and display materials.

There was no agenda planned. Tonight was to review plans for, and assemble, signs for Town Hall. However, old and new business came up.

Gwen passed out map with color codes that Ogden Clark created to show distribution of Speed Table Surveys and results. She noted that we still need more survey results. Holly reiterated Ogden's report that Samoset got the 67% they needed to get street lights, so speed tables are possible.

Everyone agreed that if Public Works sets up a temporary prototype speed table, this could, hopefully, create more public interest and understanding.

While Georgia Ave. looked strong for yes's, more are needed.

Three members tonight filled out new surveys since map did not reflect their information.

Number of signatures needed: 67% of Bayshore

Meeting Monday, January 8, was called to order at Gardens population including Auburn Ave in Cambridge Village. Needed are about 500 more signatures.

Success can happen with enough volunteers.

Discussion pointed out that to make this work, face to face public encounters work better than leaving surveys on doorknobs. It was noted that we may have tentative recruits on South Dartmouth, a very high speed street. Don said there are homeowners he knows who haven't signed a survey.

Suzanna: We need to keep asking Public Works for a prototype speed table.

Suzanna pointed out residents from Florida Blvd, 26th and Dartmouth especially need to be at the Town Hall to bring forth (again) their ongoing traffic problems.

Jim had a question of lowering speed limit to 30 mph on 34th. Good question to bring to Town

Town Hall plans: Gwen and Sharon will man the sign up desk; Suzanna and Holly will be mediators; Jeanne Corbin will be overseeing that people fill in question cards for Town Hall panel, and ask group to contribute some questions or comments: Suggestions were made to bring to Town Hall: (too many to include all here)

*2 sheriffs every Friday in Target parking lot, what are they doing? Finishing paperwork and handy in case of Target shoplifters?

*Seen: Presence of a car or cars around 26th close to Bayshore Elementary after school lets out without tags.

*Recommend a lighted crosswalk Bayshore Gardens Parkway by Target, as one at Roslyn would be more dangerous.

*Can more crosswalks be painted at key intersections in Bayshore. such as: 26th/Fla. Blvd., at Dartmouth, Columbia/Harvard; and other side streets. Reason? Designated crosswalks, pedestrians have right-of-way.

*Yield-to-Pedestrians signs at major crosswalks? *We need a speed table prototype so residents can see what they are. Possibly locate one near the park where speed limit is 20 mph.

*We need more 4-way stop signs on thru streets, like Harvard and Stanford and other locations.

In addition there were street light, stop sign, security, sidewalk questions for the county.

For meeting, a timer is still needed to allow everyone opportunity to speak.

For future clarification: The need for county parking rules on 26th by ball field. Sharon presented a map showing 13 feet of the paved area is county right-of-way.

Reported: Saturday presentation at South Co. Library on history of our area was very interesting. Motion to end meeting at 8:00 and work on sign making. Gwen seconded. Motion carried.



Wednesday, January 17, 60 (+) people braved our codes when built so we will Florida winter weather to be at the Town Hall held at the Rec. Center. Along with District 4 Commissioner, Robin DiSabatino were 10 more county people to share ideas and information with over 46 residents.

This time, we will be reporting the Q & A in the Banner. Questions that could not be answered will be forwarded to Robin who will then forward to relevant County departments. Two departments, Public Works and Traffic Management, were not present but had most of the questions.

The answers will appear in the February and future Banners until all have been answered. If you missed this meeting, remember Robin still has an open door policy.

The following is a short example of the subjects addressed:

Q What is the statistical number of opioid use in Bayshore Gardens (including Whitfield)?

A The Sheriff's Office accumulates data on the entire County. There is no breakdown of areas at this time. Overdoses were down in the last year. They are trying to change the law to charge 'murder' for selling Fentanyl. Pharmacies who fill prescriptions for opioids the third time are placed in a database.

Q *Traffic must yield to pedestrians when there* is a dedicated crosswalk; Can pedestrian crosswalks be painted on major intersections in Bayshore Gardens as drivers just don't stop to allow kids and adults to cross?

A (this will be a send-in question.)

Q Bayshore being an older community has to fight for sidewalks and street lights and new developments get them right off. Why?

A These are being done by the builder because they are in the codes now; not an expense to county. Our community did not have these

have to take other measures for those amenities.

Doug Wright, of Bayshore Community Garden, (941-758-3965) gave a short speech on their project operation and plans; which include a co-op gardens right up the street from us where you can grow food from seed to the table! dhwright007@outlook.com.

Did You Know? The February Edition

began with the spring equinox in March and ended in December.

There is belief that what is now February was overlooked when this calendar was created, as winter weather had little to do with the harvest in the northern hemisphere, where Rome is located.

Romans essentially considered the winter a period of time with no distinctive months.

When the second king of Rome, Numa Pompilius, took to the throne in 713 BC, he had plans to make the calendar more accurate by synchronizing it with the actual lunar year, which is roughly 354 days long.

Thus, two new months, January and February, were added to the end of the calendar.

Both January and February had 28 days.

At the time, even numbers were considered bad after Feb. 23 each year to play catch-up.

> February was left untouched, remaining an "unlucky" month and one devoted to honoring the dead and performing rites of purification, as the word February comes from februare, which means

> February remained the last month of the year for roughly 200 years until the calendar was reevaluated and February was reassigned as the second month, with January being the start of the new

> This new 355-day calendar simply could not stay in sync with the seasons because it did not account for the amount of time it takes the Earth to orbit the sun.

> Therefore, an extra "month" of 27 days was added

Sometimes this extra month was overlooked or not scheduled in time, continuing the calendar conundrum.

Julius Caesar was responsible for tackling calendar problems further when he was in power.

He wished to make the

instead of the older lunar-based calendar.

This led to the creation of the Julian calendar. Ten days were added to the calendar year in various months, and February was increased every four years (leap year) to 29 days to coordinate the calendar year to the solar cycle of roughly 365.2425

February remains the shortest month of the year.

Through the years there has been no widespread attempt to reorganize the calendar once more to even out the months and give extra time to February.

As a result of the shorter number of days, February has some unique attributes.

In common years, February can pass without a single full moon. The next time this will happen is in 2018.

Once every six years, February is the only month that has four, full seven-day weeks.

February starts on the same day of the week as March and November in common years, and on the same day of the week as August on leap years.

February ends on the same day of the week as October every year.

In leap years, it is the only month that begins and ends on the same weekday.





Valentine Dessert Recipes

Chocolate-Strawberry Waffle on a Stick

12 large strawberries, hulled

6 oz semisweet chocolate, finely chopped Vegetable oil, for deep-frying

2 cups dry pancake and waffle mix (plus additional ingredients as directed on pkg) Confectioners' sugar, for dusting

Thread each strawberry onto a wooden skewer; place on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper and freeze for about 30 minutes. Put chocolate in a microwave-safe bowl. Microwave on high at 15-second intervals, stirring after each interval, until the chocolate is almost melted; remove and stir until smooth. Dip the strawberries in the melted chocolate; return to parchment-lined baking sheet and freeze until the chocolate hardens, about 15 minutes. Heat 4 to 6 inches of vegetable oil in a deep pot until a deepfry thermometer registers 330 degrees. While the oil heats, prepare the pancake and waffle mix as the label directs. Dip the chocolate-covered strawberries in the batter, turning to coat; let any excess drip off. (If the batter is too thin, add 1 to 3 more tablespoons dry mix.) Carefully place the berries in the hot oil (skewers and all); fry, turning as needed, until the batter is golden and just cooked through, 1 1/2 to 2 minutes. Remove with tongs and drain on paper towels or a rack. Let sit for 5 to 10 minutes to allow the chocolate to re-harden. Dust with confectioners' sugar.

Chocolate Covered Strawberries

1 cup pretzel rods

1 cup almonds

3 (4 oz) bars semisweet chocolate, melted 8 long-stemmed strawberries

Chop pretzels and nuts and place in 2 separate bowls. Chop chocolate. In a double boiler, melt chocolate until smooth and velvety. Dip strawberries in chocolate and then in pretzels or nuts. Place covered strawberries on a 1/2 sheet tray lined with waxed paper. Allow to set at room temperature and serve.

White Chocolate-Raspberry Parfaits

1 1/2 cups raspberries

3 tbsps granulated sugar

1 1/2 tsps fresh lemon juice

For the mousse:

4 ounces white chocolate, chopped

2 cups heavy cream; 2 cups raspberries

3 tbsps confectioners' sugar

1 tsp pure vanilla extract

Make sauce: Combine raspberries, granulated sugar and lemon juice in a small saucepan and bring to a simmer over med-hi heat, mashing with a spoon. Press thru a fine-mesh sieve into a bowl using back of a spoon. Refrigerate until cold. Make mousse: Put white chocolate and 1/4 cup heavy cream in a microwave-safe bowl and heat in 30-second intervals, stirring, until chocolate is melted; whisk until smooth and creamy. Beat remaining 1 3/4 cups heavy cream in a bowl with a mixer on med-hi speed until foamy. Add confectioners' sugar and vanilla; beat until soft peaks form. Whisk 1 cup of whipped cream into chocolate mixture, then fold in rest until combined. Divide half mousse among 6 small glasses; top with 1 tbsp raspberry sauce, a few raspberries, remaining mousse, sauce and raspberries; sprinkle with shaved white chocolate.

Valentine's Day Trail Mix

1 cup granola; 1 cup dried cherries

1 cup salted pretzel sticks, coarsely crushed

1 cup semisweet chocolate pieces

1 1/2 cups dried cranberies

1 cup cocoa-covered almonds

1/2 cup freeze-dried raspberries

Line two baking sheets with waxed paper. Melt chocolate in glass measuring cup until melted. Stir until smooth. Pour half over granola; pour rest over pretzels. Stir each until evenly coated. Turn onto prepared baking sheets. Separate chocolate-coated pieces into small chunks. Let stand at room temperature 1 to 2 hours or until set. Add dried cranberries, almonds, and dried cherries. Stir in dried raspberries just before serving.

Red Velvet Heart Pancakes

4 oz cream cheese, at room temperature

1/4 cup sour cream; 3 tbsps whole milk

2 tbsps confectioners' sugar

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 tbsp unsweetened cocoa powder

1/2 tsp baking soda; 1/2 tsp baking powder

3/4 cup granulated sugar; 2 large eggs

1 1/4 cups buttermilk; Fine salt

1/2 cup melted and cooled butter

2 tsps red food coloring

1 tsp pure vanilla extract

1 tsp apple cider vinegar

Toasted, chopped pecans, for serving Whisk cream cheese, sour cream, milk and confectioners' sugar until smooth in a medium bowl; set aside. Sift flour, cocoa powder, baking soda, baking powder and 1/2 tsp salt into a large bowl. Beat eggs and granulated sugar in a large bowl until pale yellow; beat in buttermilk, melted butter, coloring, vanilla and vinegar. Add egg mixture to flour mixture and fold just until incorporated. Transfer some of the batter to a squeeze bottle with a 1/4-inch opening. Heat griddle or large nonstick skillet over med-low heat. Lightly coat hot skillet with melted butter and squeeze some of the batter onto it in outline of a heart. Fill in each outline with more batter; use a spatula to spread to edges of heart. Cook each pancake until bubbles begin to pop on surface, about 3 minutes. Carefully flip and cook until bottom is set and pancake is cooked through. Repeat with remaining batter. Drizzle cream cheese mixture and maple syrup on top of the pancakes and sprinkle with pecans.

Toss 1/2 cup raspberries with 1 tbsp chocolate liqueur; layer with crumbled brownies and chocolate ice cream in 2 glasses. Top with whipped cream and more raspberries
















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
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
