Minute with the Manager

As we conclude the first month of the new year, slated projects are being completed with others in the process of planning. The Board meets for a monthly work session where the details and financials are discussed in depth. In addition, each of the committees meet on a monthly basis and give the Board input regarding a project. These projects are then addressed at the Board level with all the particulars in place, as well as final cost. At the monthly Board meeting, an informed decision is voted upon based on the research, pricing and the budget. A motion is presented regarding the proposed project. The Board members will vote to accept or reject the project. In order for this to be accomplished, there must be a quorum. A “quorum” is a minimum number of Board members that must be present at any of its meetings to make the proceedings of the meeting valid. Our Board minimum is five members. Occasionally, ques-

tions are raised by Board members and the “project” will be tabled and sent back to the work session for further discussion. The Board of Trustees has a fiduciary duty to act in the best interest of the District and its residents. Progress is being made to improve and update the District grounds and amenities. We have also invested in a new updated website for District business. Not only is the website visually appealing, it is user friendly and will contain all the contracts for the District. This is in the process as of this writing and should be up and running within a month. As always, suggestions are welcome in the office from our residents. Feel free to stop in and tell us what activities you would like to see implemented. The Recreation Committee has been formed and is ready to start planning events. Enjoy your park and the amenities we are lucky to have as Bayshore residents.

BAYSHORE GARDENS BOARD OF TRUSTEES HIGHLIGHTS OF JANUARY 15, 2019 Meeting

* Recreation Committee - 4th of July Picnic in the works which may include a parade, food and beer vender, and still be working on other activities for adults and kids. Hall activities should fall under the Recreation Committee to contact and supervise. Committee looking into a splash park

* House and Grounds - preliminary price quotes on the marina project work. Dredging quote was \$681,650. The marina pier removal (prior to dredging) and replacement (after dredging) is \$299,800 plus permits and engineering costs.

* Quote on the fishing pier dock with Trex wood was \$20,000.

* Epoxy flooring quotes are coming for the pool breezeway. He reported that the slide is gone and

the aluminum was salvaged with proceeds going to the office. He said the dive board was removed as the bolts were rusted. Sharon said the board was not safe and is stored out of the way. Sharon asked Jodie to prepare a Surplus Property form for the next meeting in February.

* The Auditors are about finished with the audit and waiting for letter from our attorney to provide the District with the report.

* Paperwork on the boats that were sinking is now with the State. We are waiting for the paperwork from the State to dispose of the vessels.

* APPROVED Railroad landscape ties have arrived and Olive Tree Branch has removed all of the old ties and installing new.

* APPROVED Hall Contract 1004HC revisions approved.

* APPROVED New framing material for the entrance woodshop door approved.

* APPROVED 27,000 BTU air/heat system approved for the woodshop

* APPROVED Purchase of a new office scanner to scan in old Banners to preserve historical value

* APPROVED Purchase new amplifier for recreation hall

* APPROVED Electrical update for outlets in Recreation Hall

A 501 (C) 3 Organization - We are "Neighbors helping Neighbors"

Hurricane season is quickly approaching. If you don't have your hurricane guide, please pick one up at the District office. The guide gives you a lot of information regarding shelters, what to take, and more. We are also recruiting CERT members and hope that you will talk to us about it. CERT training is more than Hurricanes and may save someone's life, it could be a loved one. Manatee County Certification is mandatory for a FEMA CERT organization. In addition we will also be scheduling First Aid and CPR classes and will post for our members. Other classes we will offer will

be Active Shooter by the Manatee County Sheriff's Department and Stop the Bleeding and Active Bystander by Dept of Health.

The CAT program is the current program that we are working on as well as Protecting your Property. We will keep you informed of the progress and would appreciate your suggestions for programs that would benefit you. We are very appreciative of the Sheriff Department's commitment to the community.

Your C.E.R.T organizations and other communities participate in quarterly meetings with

Emergency Management, Fire Departments and the Sheriff's Department. The meetings create a good working relationship with all First Responders.

Manatee County will sponsor another C.E.R.T. class in August. The classes fill up quickly; early registration should insure a spot in the class. If you have questions about the organization please feel free to call, Sharon 941-752-7421 or email originaltr@cs.com. Manatee County certification is required to join our organization.

Manatee County implements more cutting-edge 9-1-1 technologies

Manatee County has integrated several new potentially lifesaving advancements to its 9-1-1 services to improve emergency response efforts.

The 9-1-1 Emergency Communications Center now receives more accurate cell phone location information from any updated iOS and Google phones that dial 9-1-1 through RapidSOS, an emergency response data service. The new technology provides a location within six meters of accuracy, much greater than the existing location data provided by cell phone carriers using tower location technology.

The Emergency Communications Center also installed a new technology called Automated Abandon Callback. If a 9-1-1 caller hangs up before a telecommunicator answers the line, the system automatically calls the number back and asks if they need assistance.

Manatee County Public Safety will also soon be the first in the nation to be able to send out an outbound text directly from its call handling equipment. This would allow telecommunicators to send a text to the number of an abandoned call

rather than calling, freeing them up to answer other calls and increasing the likelihood of a response from someone who made the call in error.

The County's Text to 9-1-1 program is another recent addition that provides increased access to emergency services, particularly for those who are hearing or speech impaired, or are in a situation where it's difficult or dangerous to make a phone call. While a phone call is always the best way to contact 9-1-1, Manatee County has received over 350 text to 9-1-1 requests since launching the initiative in October.

"9-1-1 in the United States recently turned 50 years old and for most of that time the technology has remained the same," said Manatee County 9-1-1 Chief Jake Saur. "Now, much needed technology improvements are coming faster and faster to the 911 world and Manatee County Public Safety has made it a priority to bring whatever new technology is available to our area's citizens and visitors."

Restore Bayshore Reports

Community Opportunities

Meeting called to order at 6:30. Tonight, introductions included Misty Servia, our County Commissioner; John Howard and Zach Stiscak from Code Enforcement and, Ogden Clark, our liaison to County and Neighborhood Services.

Suzanna said Holly met with Sophia, the high school artist who is making necessary changes in our promo pamphlet, which we should see by next meeting.

Being she had to split her time with another meeting, Misty shared some recent issues with us.

Golf Cart Issue: Misty, stated that she received questions on how to change Bayshore Gardens to a designated golf cart legal community. She said that Lakewood Ranch roads are CDD (private) community roads and the county has no jurisdiction on their roads. She gave us the County's Resolution and the procedure on how to get approval; that the procedure includes getting a 2/3 majority of the residents to approve the change. She asked to be contacted if/when we decide to begin the approval process. We will put a copy in the office for residents to read. (Details in this issue)

Misty said there was an investigation Friday afternoon, Jan. 11, on the brown water reported in Bryn Mawr Canal. The county began their investigation early Monday. She could report that it is not sewage, red tide nor algae. Samples

were taken to discover what it was. The complaint came from a resident on Florida Blvd.

Grants will be available. Misty stated there are grants available for neighborhood improvements. Ogden said the first meeting is January 24th, and February 6th. Attending one of the meetings is required to obtain a grant. Ogden will get us more information for the Banner. The grants include \$1000 to \$10,000. Some larger grants require matching funds. Gwen cautioned that grant money can only be used for the community, not the District Park. (See this issue for details)

Gwen asked if the drainage ditch running between Columbia/Dartmouth is supposed to be periodically cleaned out. She said it looks like a retention pond, and only holds a foot of water. She is concerned that the accumulated soil will wash down into the marinas, (where we will soon be discussing dredging).

Election of new officers is needed if we are to remain active. Otherwise Restore Bayshore may cease to exist. Suzanna has been president since 2014. Subject tabled again.

A new name for the club. Suzanna said some people have said Restore Bayshore sounds like we are dilapidated and need restored. However, Holly previously noted we are known at the county by this name and changing it may be confusing.

Garden Club

The February meeting is Monday, 4th at 1:30 pm for a tour of the Sarasota Succulent Society Experimental Gardens at 1310 38th Street, Sarasota. The entrance to the Gardens is on the right going north on Coconut Ave. between Myrtle Ave. and 38th Street with parking on the street. We will meet in the parking lot of the Recreation Center at 1 pm in order to carpool.

There were 17 present at the January meeting. Business discussed:

- A vice-president is still needed for 2019, especially for the May meeting.
- The signup sheet for programs still has openings that need to be finalized for publication in the club guide prepared by Joyce Fisher.
- The preliminary club guide for 2019 was passed around for review.
- Thank you notes were received and read for donations to the Humane Society of Manatee County and Mote Marine for Red Tide Research on water quality and algae reduction.

The program was Floral Arranging presented by Jessica Januszka a professional floral designer with Tropical Interiors Florist at 1303 53rd Ave. W., Bradenton, with her daughter Dorothy as her assistant. It was amazing to watch Jessica do the arrangement while telling us what and why she was doing each step and answering questions.

Jessica offers a floral design class called Wine & Design which last 3 hours with a maximum of 10 participants. The per person cost is based on the size of the arrangement that will be designed. The class can be held in a home or the Recreation Center or any location that allows wine to be served.

Jessica prepared an arrangement for Valentine's Day while explaining her techniques and answering questions.

She started with a block of oasis in the container to hold the flowers and keep them watered. There

are two types of oasis floral foam, fresh that absorbs water and silk for artificial flower arrangements. Oasis for fresh flowers comes in two types, instant that soaks for 2 minutes before use, and standard that soaks for 24 hours before use.

For a round arrangement she used a base of leather leaf or baker leaf and lemon leaf. Next were the roses from Ecuador, which are the best. Roses are sold wholesale as a minimum 25 stem bunch. They can be 60, 70, or 80 cm in length. Jessica removed the guard petals, which are the outside petals with a white line at the base, before placing the roses in the oasis.

All flower stems need to be cut on an angle with a sharp knife. The pointed stem allows the flower to absorb water whether in oasis or in a vase. And in oasis the point allows the flower to be securely placed without damaging the stem.

Next were the carnations which are also sold in 25 stem bunches. Jessica showed us how to pinch and fan the carnation blossoms so that the size is more consistent for the arrangement. She assured us that the pinch and fan will not cause the flower to fade faster.

The size of the arrangement is determined by the size of the container and the rule to use is 1.5 times the height and width of the container.

Another tidbit is that lighter color flowers are more fragrant.

Next were mini carnations, daisies, and status which are sold by weight, not stem count.

Since there are multiple stems per stalk, you

should break from the bottom up and arrange from the top. Another way to think about it is these flowers should be arranged in the same order they were growing on the stalk, top to bottom.

This type of arrangement should be watered once a day by filling up the container for the oasis to absorb the water. It is not possible to overwater. Also, a cooler location is best but not under an A/C vent.

Flowers that should not get wet are fuzzy leaf flowers and dusty miller.

When ordering flowers, most are available year round. Tulips are best in the spring and peonies are seasonal.

It is best to use FTD or Teleflorist to insure that your order is exactly right and at the best price.

Do not combine anything with a milky secretion with fresh flowers. It causes the flower stem to seal which prevents the stem from absorbing water. With poinsettias it is possible to burn the stem to seal it off.

The basic principles of floral design are balance, proportion (scale), dominance (emphasis, focal area, accent), rhythm (depth, repetition, transition), color, orientation, contrast (opposition, tension, variation), harmony, and unity.

Judy Drake was the lucky recipient of the arrangement. Thanks to Joyce Fisher for inviting Jessica to do the program this month.

Wonderful refreshments were provided by Winnie Denny-Smith. There was a table full of goodies with something for every taste. Winnie shared how to make the miniature bread bowls that were perfect for filling with the dips she prepared. Thanks to Winnie for feeding us well.

Clogged Coffee Maker

A surface look at cutting boards

DEAR HELOISE: Could you tell me the advantages and disadvantages of different kinds of cutting board surfaces? Thanks!

— Joe S., via email

Hi, Joe! Happy to! The U.S. Department of Agriculture (www.usda.gov) has good information on food safety and cutting boards. Both wood and plastic boards are OK, but keep one for raw meat, including beef, poultry and seafood, and another for veggies and bread. This will help prevent cross-contamination.

To keep clean, wash with hot, soapy water, and sanitize with 1 tablespoon of bleach per gallon of water. Immerse the board in the bleach water for 10 minutes.

When the board develops grooves from cutting, replace it. — Heloise

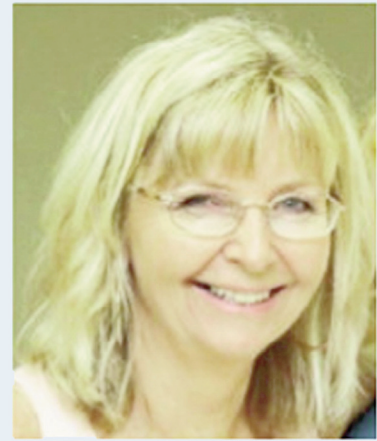


Recent Crime in Bayshore Gardens

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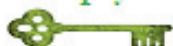
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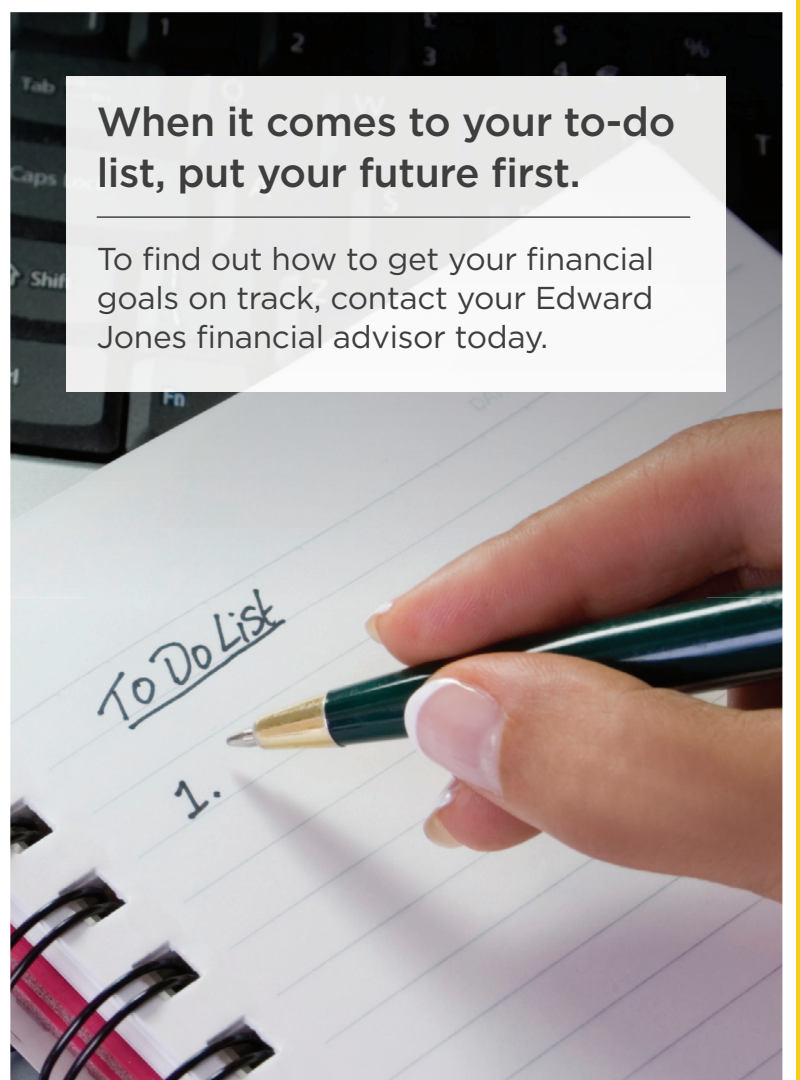

Neighborhood Enhancement Grant Program Info Meetings Coming Soon

County officials will hold two meetings in coming weeks to help neighborhoods and homeowner associations improve their chances for a successful grant application of up to \$10,000 with a one-time neighborhood improvement funding.

Grants of up to \$1,000 require no community match. Projects between \$1,001 and \$10,000 require a dollar-for-dollar match. Matching funds may be in raised dollars or in-kind contributions.

Grant information sessions will be held: Jan. 24, 2:30 - 4:30 p.m., and Feb. 6, 6:00-8:00 pm. and will take place on the 4th floor in the Manatee Room of the County Administration Building, 1112 Manatee Ave. W.

They will go over the Manatee County Neighborhood Enhancement Grant to help neighborhoods improve their leadership, character, safety, health, or environment.

"This program is a great opportunity for neighborhoods to come together to brainstorm projects that can activate their potential," said Debbie Deleon, Neighborhood Services Coordinator. "It allows for two different grant levels."

Tomato Tips: Planting the Right Tomatoes in the Right Place: Soils and Sunshine

Florida is one of the largest commercial producers of tomatoes in the United States and tomatoes are one of the most popular home-grown vegetables in the country—a perfect formula for trying your own at home! Tomatoes can be grown in containers, (upside down, or right side up), grow boxes, raised beds, or traditional garden plots. With the hundreds of tomato varieties on the market, it can be difficult to decide which kind to buy.

Before visiting your local nursery or garden center, there are a several things to consider pertaining to "Right plant, right place", the first principle of Florida-Friendly Landscaping™.

Knowing the amount of sunlight, the soil pH and composition, the climate and temperature ranges, and the amount of growing space in your yard are all key factors in determining whether this year's garden experience will be relaxing, enjoyable, or just plain exasperating.

What is your soil's pH? Tomatoes prefer a pH of 6.2 to 6.5 (slightly acidic). Soil can be tested at your county Extension office. Do this well in advance of putting plants in the ground. This allows sufficient time to amend your soil to raise or lower the pH. In the case of acidification to lower pH, this is only a temporary adjustment. Raising the pH is a careful science. If you intend to keep growing tomatoes at a specific site, this will become a continuous task.

What type of soil do you have? If it is sandy, compost and other amendments may be another garden necessity.

Finding a spot with the right amount of sunlight for optimal growth is another factor. Tomatoes generally need 4 to 6 hours of sunlight per day.

Be aware of the amount of space you are providing for your tomatoes. If you are thinking about

planting them in a 4 x 8 raised bed, you may want to consider planting determinate varieties or bush tomatoes.

Determinate varieties are more compact, bush-like, and produce all their fruit at the same time. Many commercial growers select determinate varieties because they tend to be more disease resistant.

However, if space is not an issue, indeterminate ever bearing varieties may be in order. Indeterminates produce fruit throughout the growing season. Because of their sprawling nature, pruning and staking may be necessary. Indeterminate varieties are often grown in commercial greenhouses where they are harvested over a 10-month period, growing to a height around 9 or 10 feet. If you enjoy harvesting tomatoes throughout the growing season and are not bothered by pruning and staking, then this is the right variety for you.

Where in Florida do you live? North, Central, and South Florida all vary in terms of temperature. Some tomato varieties like 'Bonnie Bell' grow better in North Florida. Flowers will drop if heat becomes too excessive for an extended period. Tomatoes will drop flowers in only 4 hours if temperatures exceed 104 degrees. Temperatures that drop below 55 degrees will also cause tomatoes to abort their flowers. If this is an issue, heat resistant varieties are sold online as well as at retail outlets. Golf Carts in Bayshore Gardens?

In response to local inquiries, Misty Servia, Commissioner for our District 4, brought a County Resolution for Operation of Golf Carts to the Restore Bayshore meeting Jan 14. Requirements are extensive but possible.

There will be a copy of the resolution at the Bayshore Gardens Rec. Center office for those interested. There is also an informative orange pamphlet on golf carts from the county sheriff's office as well.

At the moment, we are not a legally designated golf cart community. There are several criteria that must be met. Essentially the request is made to Public Works for the operation of golf carts. The local community may be a property owners association or a local residents group of property owners.

"The local community shall provide a letter to the Department documenting supporting for the operation of golf carts from the owners of at least 67% of the properties located in the study area (area to be designated). The letter shall specify the type of golf cart operation—roadways, sidewalks, or crossings and the specific locations."

The evaluation of golf cart operation on county rights-of-way will be reviewed through Fla. Statutes Section 2-22-9 of the Manatee County Code of Ordinances, Manatee County Public Works Standards, Fla. Dept. of Transportation (FDOT) Traffic Engineering Manual, Fla. Greenbook, and Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD).

Basically, golf cart use on county maintained roads requires: 1) appropriate road conditions, 2) signatures of approval of 67% of the residents in the proposed designated area and, 3) the road is not a thoroughfare.

Criteria can include the traffic speed, volume and character of vehicles using the streets; crash history, and the function of the roadway such as a thoroughfare. Sidewalk use is the same but the sidewalk must be large enough a golf cart will take up only half.

If approved, the county provides signs designating golf cart roadways, sidewalks and crossings. There is a cost for signs and maintenance. Golf carts must have all required operational ability and equipment. Citizens can also contact Jeff Bishop at jeff.bishop@mymanatee.org for further assistance.

Meanwhile, please be aware that for now, golf carts are illegal on our streets and sidewalks in Bayshore Gardens and the fines for use are heavy. Please take care.
