The 2015 Atlantic Hurricane Season kicks off June 1st. Nevertheless, the first named storm occurred May 8th off of the Georgia/Carolina Coast. Although storms are unpredictable, there are many groups that attempt to do annual predictions. Not so much individual storms, but the number of storms and what categories they will fit into. The folks at Colorado State University are my personal favorites. They are predicting seven named storms and three hurricanes in 2015. They predict one of those three will be a major hurricane; a category 3 or higher. This, and many of the other hurricane predictors, are calling for low activity when compared to the 30 year average. Even so, it only takes one in your back yard to make it a very busy season for you. This is where I ask that everyone review their hurricane plans, supplies, and materials. Get what you need now. If you have lived here long enough to have experi-

enced a hurricane threat, you know that you don't want to be shopping for storm needs as one is approaching. Inspect storm lines and bilge pumping systems. Small boats in the marina should plan to trailer out to avoid storm damage.

Reminders – Slip Fees not paid are overdue. Vehicles with trailers attached must have a parking decal. Don't loan out your Gate Key. If you are bringing a guest that is towing a boat, you must remain with them at all times. Arrangements must be made for tow vehicles with trailers parked in the Marina without decals.

Improvements - The Marina Committee is seeking a Marine Engineer to consult with on the proposed projects in the marina. New throwing safety rings are on order.

Repairs and Projects Completed – A few loose planks on the finger piers around the marina have been reattached or replaced. The end of two finger piers have been repaired. A handrail on the pier approaching the fish dock was repaired.

Meeting convened at 7:00 pm, Wednesday, May 6, 2015. Present were: Suzanna Young, Maynard Boyce, Suzanne Stell, Greg McDonald, Rochelle McDonald, Pamela Ortiz, Rose Woodruff, Debbie Korell, Debra Leavenworth and our guest/consultants; Ivan Groom and Ogden Clark from County Neighborhood Services.

Suzanna announced that our booth at the "See Manatee" event April 17 went off very well and we received many compliments on our booth representing Bayshore Gardens.

Next order of business was that since we are now an organization on our own, we now need to elect a slate of officers and establish bylaws before submitting an application for a 501c status with the state. We also needed to discuss raising much needed funds, as there are none at this time.

Debbie Korell did an excellent job of working up a set of bylaws, which was presented and approved with only minor revisions. Officers elected were: President: Susanna Young, Vice-President: Maynard Boyce, Secretary: Suzanne Stell. Treasurer remains unfilled at this time.

IS IT TIME TO REFINANCE? KNOW THE FACTS

In any economic climate, the facts and figures of a home mortgage can be confusing. If you are a homeowner, you have been through the process when you purchased your property. In the current economic conditions, the option of refinancing should be something to investigate. Without the right knowledge, it can be difficult to decide on the correct course of action. Below are some basics to consider, if refinance is right for you.

Getting a new mortgage to replace the original mortgage is called refinancing. Refinancing allows a borrower to obtain a different, usually better, interest rate and term. The first loan is paid off in full and allows the new mortgage to be created. That is called a rate and term refinance. A mortgage done on a property that is owned free and clear is also called a refinance. Many loan options fall into the category of cash out refinances. If you mortgage a property that is free and clear, or if you pay off an existing mortgage and take additional cash as part of the transaction, it is considered a cash out refinance.

One of the main advantages of refinancing is reducing an interest rate. You may have taken out your mortgage at a time when rates were higher than they currently are. As people work through their careers, make more money and pay their bills timely, it results in an increase in their credit score. This increases the ability to obtain a loan at lower interest rates. A lower rate can have a profound effect on monthly payments, potentially saving you hundreds of dollars a year. Many refinance for this reason. There can be other benefits to refinancing. Borrowers are able to save money by consolidating debt or using cash to fund a purchase, such a car, in addition to lowering the interest rate. An advantage to debt consolidation is the tax benefit when doing your annual tax return. Mortgage interest is an itemized deduction, unlike personal or car loans, which cannot be itemized for tax savings. Of course, the exception to this would be if the personal and/or car loan are used for business. It is best to consult your tax professional to determine tax itemizations and potential savings.

When you are going through the refinancing process, there are a few important items to be aware of. If you are currently making automatic payments out of a checking account, make sure to cancel your current auto pay before you close on your new mortgage. You don't want to pay for the same month twice. Also, continue to make your monthly payments up until you are ready to close

on your new mortgage. Work with your mortgage professional to coordinate the last payment and obtain the correct balance to be paid off. Escrow accounts are usually mandated by lenders. This account is set up to collect your real estate taxes and homeowners insurance in monthly increments, along with your principal and interest payment on the mortgage. The monthly escrow amount is determined by taking the annual taxes and insurance figures and dividing those amounts by twelve (12), along with an escrow account balance. Each lender's guidelines differ on the minimum balance requirements. Typically, a new escrow account will be established which the new lender will assist you with. Escrow accounts assure the lender that these items are paid in full when due. Existing funds from your old mortgage held in escrow will be disbursed to you after the closing on your new mortgage.

In order to refinance a property, an appraisal of your home will need to be completed. This is ordered by the new lender. The amount you are eligible for refinance is based upon a percentage of the current appraised value, not the original purchase price of the property. This assures your new lender that the collateral (your home) is worth the amount loaned in the event of default. As with all mortgages, this creates a lien on the property. Mortgages are recorded with the local Clerk of Courts and are considered constructive notice.

Current economic conditions and the potential to take advantage of low interest rates are leading many people to look at the option of refinancing. You should consult a mortgage professional to answer all your questions. As a knowledgeable, informed and confident consumer you will be able to assess the advantages of refinancing and determine if refinancing your home makes financial sense for you.

MAKING 9-1-1 WORK FOR YOU!

THINGS KIDS NEED TO KNOW

In an emergency, the best thing that you can do is tell your parents, a teacher, or another adult you trust right away. But if no one is around you may have to call someone else for help. Here is what you need to know about where to find help and how you can make sure it gets to you FAST:

Know what 9-1-1 is. 9-1-1 is the phone number you can call from any phone when you need help or you see someone who needs help right away.

Know when to call 9-1-1. You should only call when someone or something is hurt or in danger and you need a police officer, a firefighter, or a doctor.

Know what happens when you call 9-1-1. After you dial, the person who picks up on the other end will be someone who works at a 9-1-1 center and whose job it is to help you. They may ask you to do things to help or ask you questions. It is important that you follow their directions as best you can. They will send someone to wherever you are and stay on the phone with you until everyone is safe.

Never hang up. Even if you called 9-1-1 by accident, or if you think the problem has gone away, it is important that you stay on the phone until the call taker tells you it is alright to hang up. It is the call taker's job to make sure that you are OK and that help has gotten to whoever needs it. In situations where you aren't able to talk or have to leave, keep the phone off the hook so that the 9-1-1 operator can hear what is going on in the room. Most times, they will be able to use the computers at the 9-1-1 center to find your address.

Memorize important stuff about you and your family. Being able to tell the 9-1-1 operator things like your address, your parents' names, and your phone number will get help to you faster.

Know where you are. If you aren't at home and don't know the address where you are look around and try to find a street sign or a building with a name on it so that the 9-1-1 operator knows your exact location.

Try not to be scared. When you call 9-1-1, you become the eyes and ears for the call taker. Help will get to you much faster if you stay calm and can tell the call taker everything that is happening and can answer all the call taker's questions.

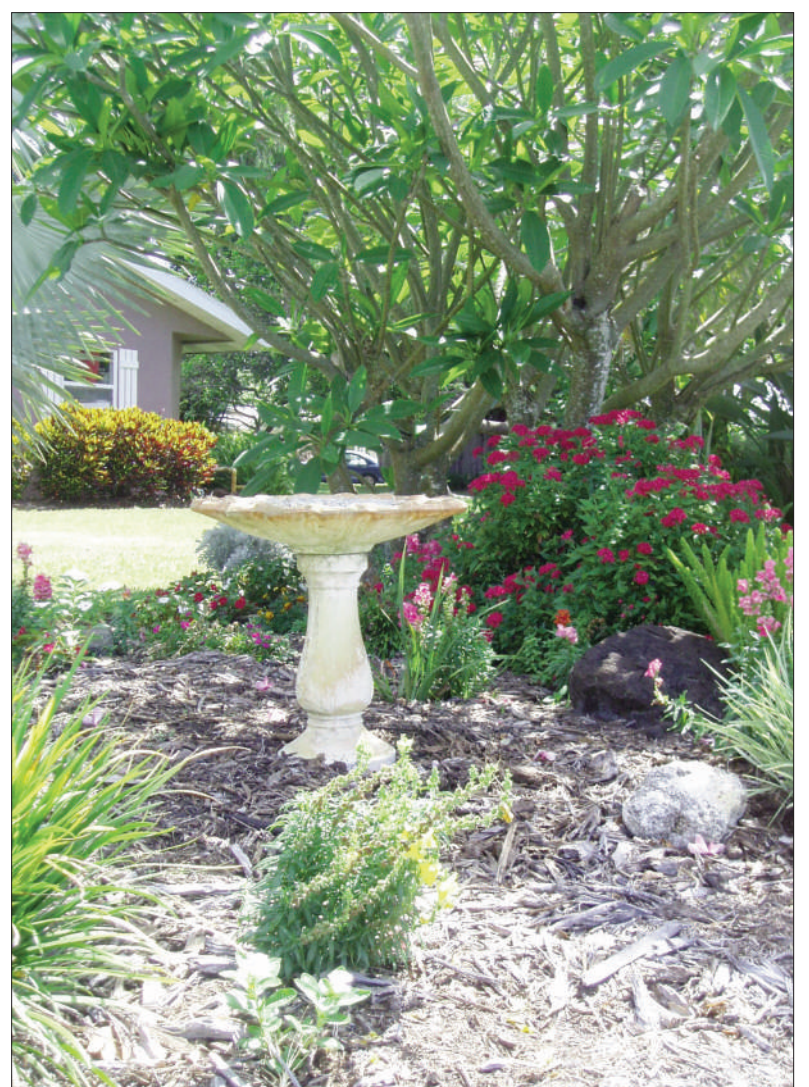

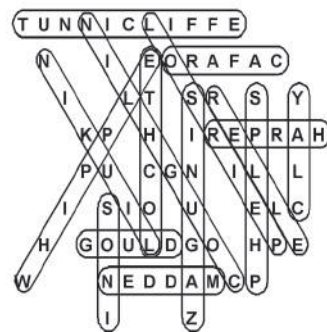

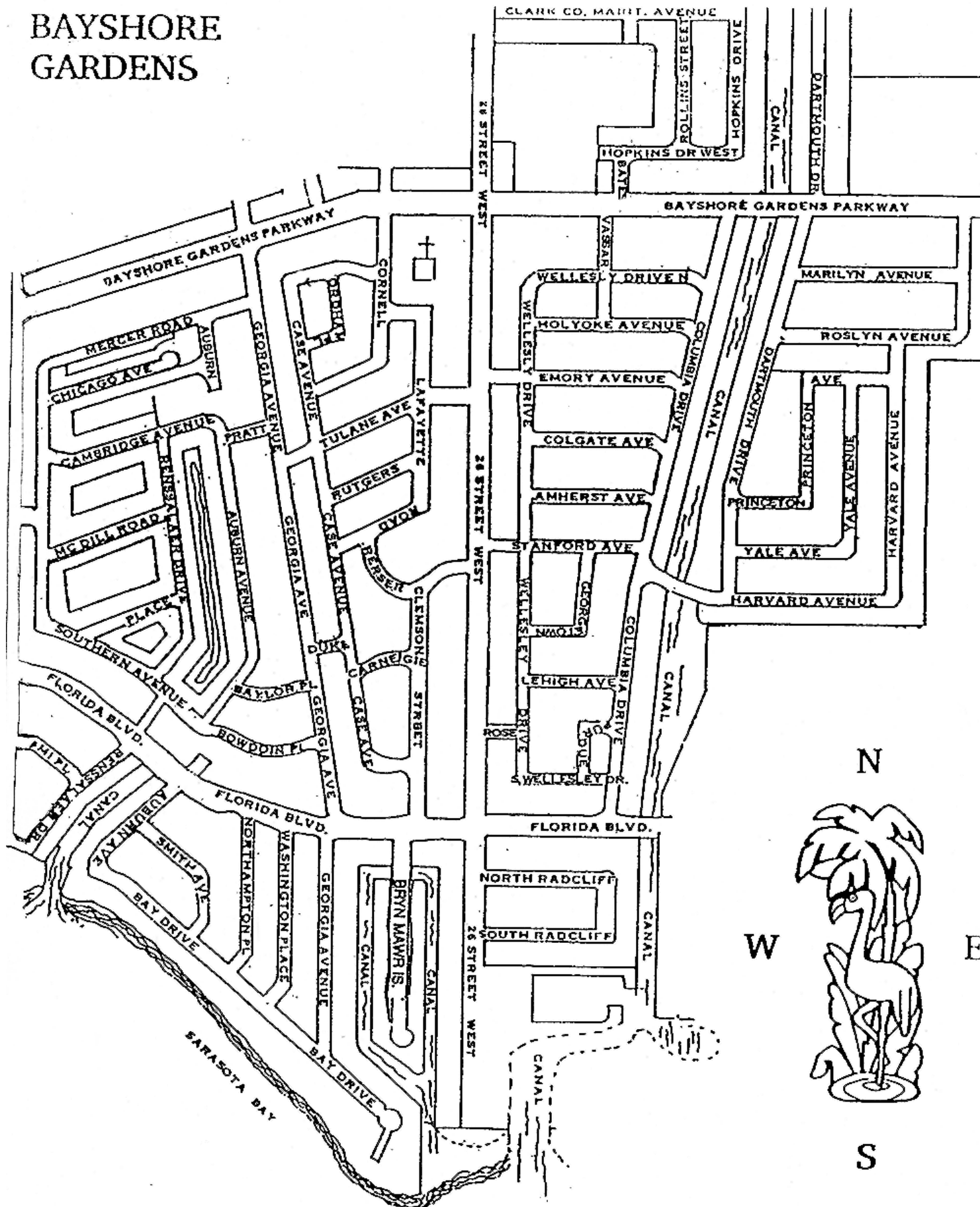

Easy Gluten Free Recipes

Gluten Free Mac and Cheese with Kale

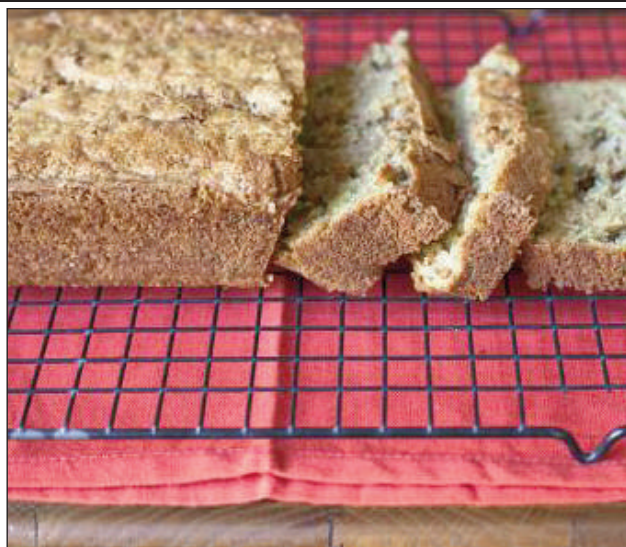
16 oz dried gluten-free elbow macaroni
 4 oz soft goat cheese (chevre), crumbled
 4 oz aged white Cheddar, grated
 1 large bunch lacinato kale, stems removed, leaves cut into ribbons
 Cook the macaroni according to package directions. Set a large pot of salted water over high heat. (Add enough salt to the water to make it taste like the ocean.) Bring the water to a boil. Add the macaroni. Stir for at least 1 minute to make sure the pieces do not stick together. Set the timer for 8 minutes. Set up the sauce. While the pasta is boiling, put the goat cheese, Cheddar and kale in the bottom of a large, wide bowl. Finish the dish. When the macaroni is tender but still has a bite (al dente), remove it from the pot with a Chinese spider or slotted spoon. Put it on top of the cheese and kale. Pour in about 1/3 to 1/2 cup of the water the macaroni cooked in. Let everything sit for 5 minutes. Stir the mixture until the macaroni is coated in a creamy sauce, with kale dotted through it.

Gluten Free Zucchini Bread

1 large zucchini; 1/4 cup Greek yogurt
 210 grams all-purpose gluten-free flour mix
 1 tsp psyllium husk; 1 tsp baking powder
 1/4 tsp baking soda; 1 tsp vanilla extract
 1 tsp cinnamon; 1/2 tsp nutmeg
 1/4 tsp cardamom; 1/2 tsp salt
 1 egg; 1/2 cup white sugar
 1/3 cup brown sugar; 1/4 cup olive oil
 Heat the oven to 350F. Grease a 9x4 loaf pan. Grate the zucchini into a bowl. Put it in a double layer of paper towels. Squeeze the water out of the zucchini into the sink. Set aside about 2 cups of the drained zucchini. In a large bowl, combine flour mix, psyllium, baking powder, soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, cardamom, salt. Whisk together the egg, sugars, olive oil, yogurt, and vanilla extract. Plop drained zucchini into the liquids and whisk them together. Sprinkle dry ingredients over top of the liquids. Using a rubber spatula, fold the dry ingredients into the wet until no sign of flours remain. Pour the batter into the prepared pan. Bake until the top of the bread is crackly brown and a toothpick inserted into the center comes out dry, 45 to 55 minutes. Cool to room temperature before slicing into it.

Gluten Free Pork and Noodle Stir Fry

8 oz rice noodles; 2 cloves garlic, minced
 1 pork tenderloin, cut into 1/4" thick strips
 Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper
 3 tbsp cornstarch; 4 tsp vegetable oil
 2 cups fat-free low-sodium chicken broth
 4 scallions, sliced: white, green separate)
 1 2-inch piece ginger, peeled and minced
 3 cups precut stir-fry vegetables
 Grated zest of 1 lime, plus extra wedges.
 Cook the noodles as directed, drain and rinse under cold water. Toss pork with 1/4 tsp salt, pepper and 2 tbsp cornstarch in bowl. Whisk chicken broth and remaining 1 tbsp cornstarch in new bowl. Heat large nonstick skillet over high heat. Add 1 tsp vegetable oil, add the pork, stir-fry until lightly browned; transfer to a bowl. Add remaining 3 tsp vegetable oil to the pan, add scallion whites, ginger and garlic; reduce heat to medium and cook, stirring occasionally, 2 minutes. Stir in vegetables and 3 tbsp water and cook, stirring occasionally, until vegetables are crisp-tender. Add broth mixture and bring to boil; cook, stirring occasionally, until slightly thickened. Return pork to skillet with noodles, lime zest and 1/4 tsp salt, heat through. Stir in scallions

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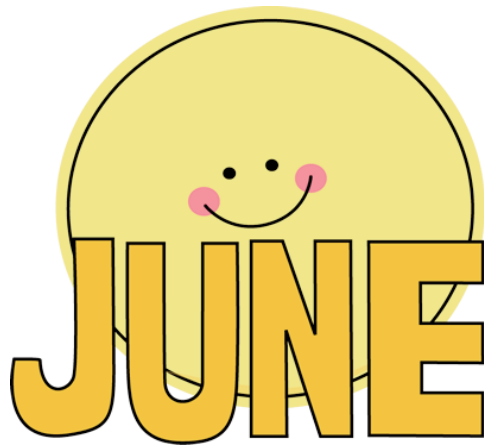
