## Manatee County seeks public input on land development code changes

Manatee County residents have a few more weeks to give input on a set of changes to the County's land development code (LDC).

In works and part of public discussions since December, 2016 the proposed updates to the LDC will bring significant changes to how the County reviews and processes future land development applications. Specifically, the suggested changes will bring more consistency to the regulations in tection of natural resources, adjacent land uses and For more information on Manatee County the County's major planning documents, according to Planning Manager Lisa Barrett. The proposed amendments are posted on the County's website and click on Pending Land Use Regulation Amendments for public review.

"Our land development code and comprehensive in the Patricia M. Glass Commission Chambers at plan are somewhat convoluted and difficult for the public — citizens and developers— to understand," Barrett said. "With this scope of work we're trying to make things more consistent, streamlined, more easily understood and more predictable. This is about trying to minimize duplication of review and streamlining the review of development proposals, while ensuring the propublic facilities."

The County will hold a public hearing to receive public comments and to consider the amendments to the land development code as described in LDCT-17-07/Ordinance 19-03 on Feb. 5 at 9 a.m.





Gwen Norris, Jeanne Corbin, Edie Norris and Ogden Clark were present. Holly Clouse was absent, dealing with an allergy attack. Treasurer's Report was given by Gwen.

Promotional Pamphlets: The final prototype has been sent and we will print copies for the BOT to review. Discussion followed. > Florida Blvd sidewalks. The 34th St sidewalk is complete and now ongoing on Florida Blvd. Ogden said they are going to be eight feet wide on Florida Blvd. He said he looked at some of the stakeouts that had homeowner complaints and it looked like it was on county Right-of-way now.

> Bayshore historical posters were returned from the SCF exhibit by David Breakfield. Suzanna asked the group about donating them to the District but be reimbursed for some of our expenses in mounting them on board. She will look for the invoice with the costs.

> Street / yard lights. Gwen shared info on solar lights which do not need wiring or permits and would be a good option for homeowners. She said LED solar powered lights (colonial style) that can be found online at Lowes and Home Depot. The higher priced one (about \$255) was 200 lumens. The lower priced (\$220) ones were lower lumens (150 lumens). More research is needed for other styles.

> **Dog Park.** To mention a few concerns voiced: users may not keep their dog's shots up to date, there should be separate areas for large dogs and small dogs; the size of the small boat storage area is too small; proper cleaning and maintenance, etc, etc..

> Gwen moved to adjourn. Jean seconded the motion. We adjourned at 7:35





# Garden Club

The March meeting is Monday, March 4th at 1 pm at the Recreation Center. Our own Rosemarie Woodruff will present a program about Container Gardening.

There were 14 present at the February meeting for the tour of the Sarasota Succulent Society Experimental Gardens at 1310 38th Street. The entry gate to the Gardens is on Cocoanut Ave. just north of Myrtle Ave.

Our tour guide was Wilda Meier who has been a member of the Sarasota Succulent Society for 50 years. Needless to say she is very knowledgeable about the gardens and the property where they are located.

The gardens are located on a .6 acre island with roads on 3 sides and a creek on the 4th side. Walter Sparkman brought four lots in the 1930's in what is now known as Bayou Oaks and began experimenting with the growing of plants. He was particularly intrigued with succulents. When Whitaker Creek was widened, the soil deposited on the property provided elevated areas with good drainage suitable for the cultivation of succulent plants. Mr. Sparkman, along with five others chartered the Succulent Society in 1950. In 1954 the Society purchased two lots from Mr. Sparkman, and the house and remaining two lots were purchased by the Society in the 1960's.

The house is a prefab from the 1930's, but is not a Sears house. The depression style cottage serves as the Society's clubhouse. In 2004 the "Sparkman House" was declared a Historic Site after being repainted to its original yellow orange exterior color with brown accents. The original color was discovered inside the storage shed at the back of the house. The Society will celebrate its 70th anniversary in 2020.

Over many years the Society's plant collection has increased and greenhouses have been added to house many of its specimens. An extensive botanical library has also been added over the years.

Succulents are found on all continents except Antarctica. There are gradations of succulence. Usually the plants show distinct succulence in their leaves, water storing stems or caudex (roots). The surface of the leaves may also be involved in moisture control with a hairy or a waxy epidermis. Many species go through a dormant, dry period but all require good drainage. The amount of sunlight needed varies. Succulents are found in a least 30 plant families. The cactaceae and crassulaceae families are entirely succulent.

Every year three big public sales are held in the Gardens from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm. Admission is free. The sales are on the Saturday before Presidents Day, the Saturday before Mother's Day, and on Labor Day. The sales almost always feature an interesting educational program on the north lawn, and periodically feature guest artists and/or artisans actively working throughout the Gardens.

In addition to the three big annual sales, there are casual sales and hands-on gardening sessions that are open to the public almost every Monday from 9 to noon, all year 'round, and on the third







# **School Bus Safety Tips for Motorists**

- \* Be alert and watch for children especially near schools, bus stops, school buses and in school parking lots.
- \* Children on bicycles can be unpredictable and can make sudden changes in direction. Be especially careful when children are present in school zones and residential areas.
- \* Pay extra attention to lower speed limits in school zones
- \* Watch for and obey signals from school crossing guards.
- \* Only drive or park in authorized areas to drop off or pick up children at school.
- \* Motorists are required to stop when approaching a school bus that is stopped with its red lights flashing and STOP arms extended.
- \*All drivers moving in either direction on a twoway street must stop for a school bus displaying a

stop signal, and must remain stopped until the road is clear of children AND the school bus stop arm is withdrawn.

- \* On a highway divided by a paved median, all drivers moving in either direction must stop for a school bus displaying a stop signal, and must remain stopped until the road is clear of children AND the school bus stop arm is withdrawn.
- \* The only time traffic approaching an oncoming school bus does not need to stop, is if there is a raised barrier such as a concrete divider or at least five feet of unpaved space separating the lanes of traffic.
- \* On a highway divided by a raised barrier or an unpaved median at least 5 feet wide, drivers moving in the opposite direction do not have to stop for the bus (painted lines or pavement markings are not considered barriers). However, these motorists should slow down and watch for students loading or unloading from the bus.



#### Easy Container Plants for Decks, Patios, and Lanais By Norma Kisida, Master Gardener 2012

Well-chosen plants can create focal points and greatly enhance the attractiveness of your patio, lanai, and other outdoor spaces. Some advantages of container gardens are the ability to move plants to suitable growing areas, easy access for the gardener, control of soil type, and protection from adverse weather.

Important things to consider when choosing plants are the type of sun exposure and the amount of water the plants will receive from rainfall. You will likely have some areas which get bright light but not direct sun and these are great for plants that don't do well in intense sun. The smaller and more porous the container, the more often the



plants will need to be watered. Start with a good quality soil mix suitable for the plant type and make sure the container has good drainage. Protect the patio surface with a saucer so that dirt, water, and fertilizer don't stain the area; empty saucer after watering. Plants in the same container or grouped together need to have similar growing

requirements. A water-soluble fertilizer may be used as directed while a slow release fertilize only needs to be used every three to four months.

Tips to enhance attractiveness are to display containers in groups which are linked by common elements such as pot color, shape, or similar plants; and, using different sized pots or elevating containers to different heights to make them more eye catching. Patio gardening is not restricted to bottom surfaces as there are many creative ways to use wall or ceiling space with hanging containers and vertical gardening ideas.

Plants with only foliage will be less messy than flowering plants which can require deadheading or drop spent blossoms to the ground. Foliage plants come in many shapes, sizes, and color variations, and many can last in containers for years as opposed to just one season.

There are many sun-loving foliage plants that work well in containers. Succulents require little care, are drought tolerant and have become very popular and widely available. They need a light, well-drained soil and don't mind being in a shallow container. Ti plant (Cordyline spp.) and Dracaena spp. thrive in bright indirect sun and work well as background plant in a mixed container. Some varieties of Croton spp. will have the best color in sunny areas while others do best in part sun or light shade. Herbs and salad greens are an attractive and useful choice.

Small palms such as cat palm (Chamaedorea cataractarum), pygmy date palm (Phoenix roebelenii), Christmas palm (Adonidia merrillii) and

ponytail "palm" (Beaucarnea recurvata), may be grown in containers. Clumping bamboo and native and ornamental grasses in groups or as an accent are attractive additions.



Some examples of shade or part-shade patio plants include caladiums (Caladium x hortulanum), peacock ginger (Kaempferia spp.), ferns, tricolor (Stromanthe sanguinea), Philodendron xanadu, Coleus spp., lady palms (Rhapis excelsa), and orchids. Bromeliads are extremely easy care with colorful foliage and some have beautiful flowers which last for months.

If you have pets that might nibble your plants, check to make sure they are not toxic to animals.
