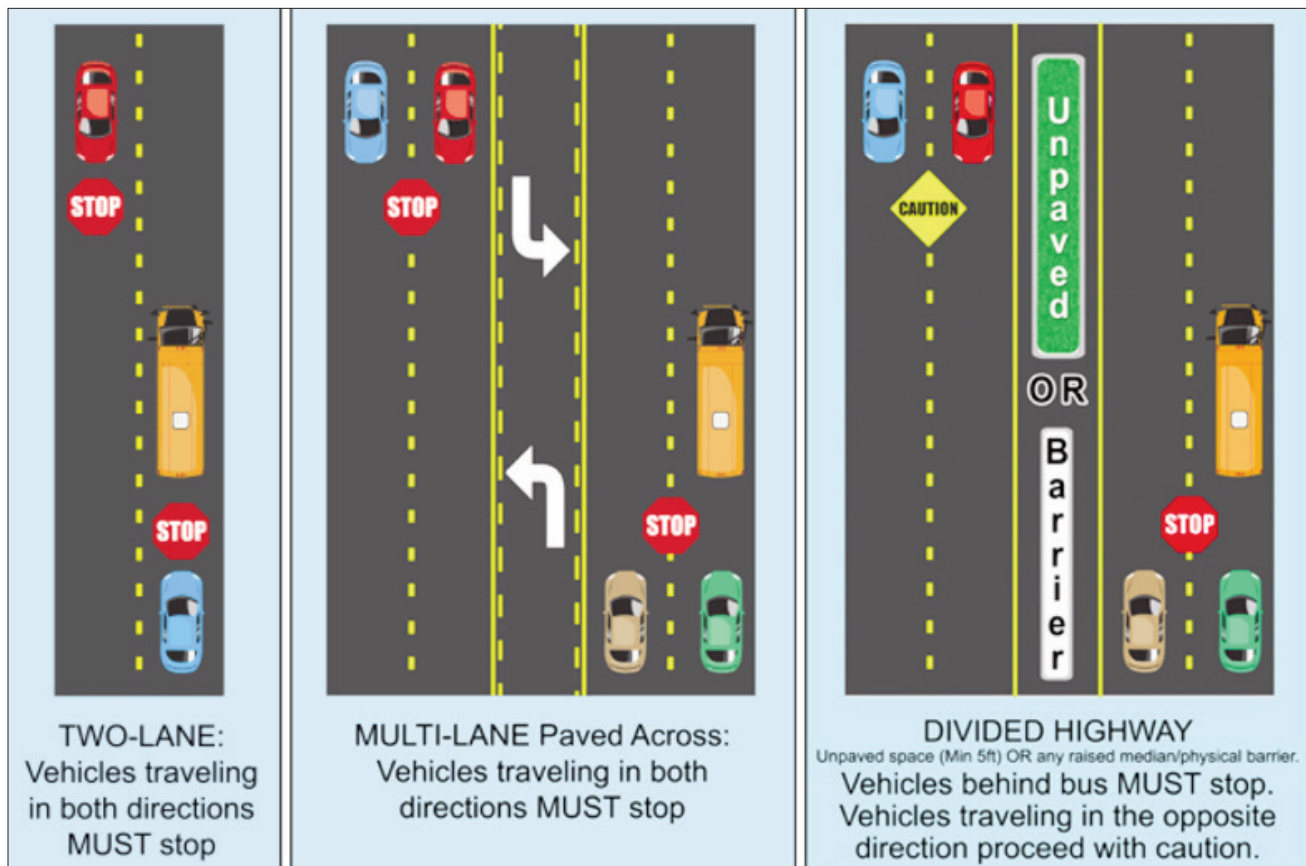

As Florida students return to school this month, Florida's DMV reminds drivers to remain vigilant on the road.



Florida's School Bus Stop Law requires all drivers to come to a complete stop when nearing school buses with flashing red lights and extended stop signs.

In 2012, more than 21,000 drivers illegally passed school buses per day, according to the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles.

The only exception to the law is when the driver is separated by a median of at least 5 feet wide on the opposite side of traffic (see top-right diagram).

Violators can face fines of up to \$265 and have their licenses suspended for up to a year.

BGNA Donates Craft Fair Earnings to Local Schools

Then there is the coveted Big Pencil, showing all the students in the room what a good job he or she did. These items currently come directly out of the classroom teachers' pocket. Ms. Calhoun told us that our donation would go a long way towards helping to provide these incentives.

Members of the BGNA had a very enlightening meeting with Dianne Calhoun, our liaison, to learn what we could do for the school. Our thought was to provide pencils, paper, etc. to the students. Ms. Calhoun informed us that BGE is a Title 1 school. Title 1 schools get materials such as paper, pencils, toner etc. from the State. Title 1 schools also provide breakfast and lunch to their students. She also informed us that the "Church of the Cross" on 26th St. has been very generous with BGE by providing backpacks for all the students.

The BGNA Craft Fairs, one in spring and one in fall, will continue to help our community. At \$10 a table, it is not much, but it adds up. So, purchase a table, make a little money for yourself, meet your neighbors and know the proceeds the BGNA makes is helping our neighborhood by helping our school.

Special Series: Making 9-1-1 Work for You

Since May, Crime Watch has been running informational guidelines regarding calling 9-1-1. This month is the final reference in the series. The 9-1-1 operators for Manatee County reside at the

ECC (Emergency Communications Center). Our emergency operators use E9-1-1 (Enhanced 9-1-1). Basically this enhanced technology is linked to wireless services and provides the operators with additional information to identify who is calling and where they are calling from. This is important for someone who has cellular service in Washington state making a 9-1-1 call from Miami, Florida.

To triangulate the precise location of a cell call requires GPS and Cellular Tower locations and must comply with FCC accuracy standards to within 1,000 feet of that location. Not all 50 states in the U.S. has the E9-1-1 technology so it is important to know before you go.

A quorum was established.

Present: Joanne Manse, Jonna Koellhoffer, Vickie Ford, Jane King, Howard Taylor, John Woodruff, Adam Hange, Bill Mueller, Terry Zimmerman & Ursala Wing.

Steve made a motion to approve the July minutes. Bob seconded. **Motion Passed.**

Debbie made a motion to approve the July financials. Jodie seconded. **Motion Passed.**

Kathy made a motion to move \$11,282.00 from the reserve air conditioning fund 1031 to the general fund 1037. Don seconded. **Motion passed.**

We still need to change the locks on the hall doors, the doors are very old and difficult to work with. We will get estimates to have the hall doors replaced. School goes back into session on Monday the 24th, and the pool will be closing at 7 pm.

Vicki Ford suggested that the Crime Mapping web address appear in the paper. There were some issues with the August issue about text being truncated and a frame missing around an article. Don spoke with Kim and new procedures will be implemented. There was some discussion on Banner distribution procedures. A form needs to be created on the expectations of the Banner delivery person. Don made a motion to co-sponsor the Fishing Tournament for September. The Bayshore Gardens Yacht Club will provide the following: Volunteers to manage all aspects of the tournament, leaving the District staff with as little work as possible. Minutes: Steve made a motion to accept the July minutes as printed in the Bayshore Banner, Don seconded motion passed.

Restore Bayshore Reports

A Community Improvement Organization

Meeting was called to order Wednesday, July 29, 2015 by Suzanna Young. June 1 Minutes were read and approved. Present: Ms. Young, Pam Ortiz, Annie Armstrong, Don Gassie and Robin DiSabatino. Missing for a quorum was one officer.

Discussed: Current meeting dates conflict with Bunco Club. It was agreed after Aug. 26 meeting to go back to former dates. Next meeting will be Tuesday, September 8 at 7:00 pm.

No one from Infrastructure was present to report on drainage problem areas. No individual meetings for Infrastructure or Preservation were held. Robin was advised that Ivan Groom volunteered to get charts and graphs from the School Board indicating locations of student populations regarding sidewalk plans. (Mr. Groom had a schedule conflict and could not attend this meeting.)

Robin will contact Ivan Groom on sidewalk priority list and ask for a matrix of streets and costs. It was brought up that the community of Rubonia was also asking for needed infrastructure improvements and could be in competition with us. It was noted they are very organized.

Suzanna explained we were currently focusing on raising funds. Robin asked what was needed and was told we need money to pay pending bills for past workshops, display at "See Manatee, and ongoing information handouts for meetings. We are starting to get \$10 annual dues from members, however.

Coffee for August 1: Don volunteered to help serve. Suzanna reported we had 5 tables reserved by businesses or activity groups. Everything was on ready. Suzanna put up posters and flyers in key neighboring venues.

Tea/Fashion Show dates were discussed. The group

agreed on two dates—Oct 17 or Nov. 14—as good possibilities. Suzanna would reserve the best date on the District calendar and will be amended at the next meeting. (Dates will be in September Banner) Annie Armstrong suggested her daughter, Ashley Benn, might be interested in catering the tea, as she is starting a catering business and wants exposure. Food needs will be donated. It was noted we would need a scriptwriter and a narrator for the fashion show and consider a theme. Suggestions are needed. Noted: we needed to solicit items for raffles immediately.

Preservation: Dr. Stevenson, who was at a summer seminar in Nantucket, will be in contact about preservation process when she returns. Noted: there are residents who want to begin preservation applications and possibly form clusters or a street of historic homes.

It was noted we still need Task Groups to handle: County Liaison (critical, as a lot is going on at the county), Image, Fund Raising, and Improvement Promotion / Communications. (Call: 753-7433)

We will try and have Code Enforcement come to our meeting in Sept. Also considered are Nuisance Abatement and someone from Zoning.

Robin suggested a **TOWN HALL** meeting wherein we would have all county departments present. She will check and get back with Suzanna with a date. Everyone was in agreement on a date selected. (Heads up date will be in Sept. issue) Robin also said to give her a list of code violations and she will contact that department.

Suzanna thanked Robin for joining us, and adjourned meeting at 8:30 pm

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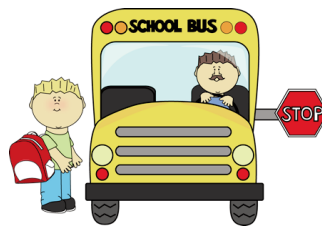

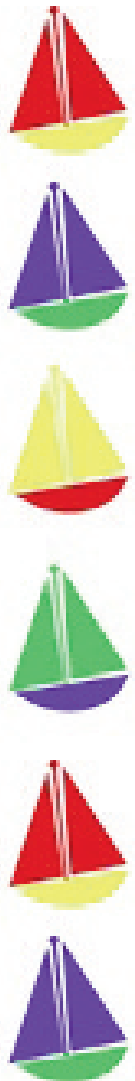

Back to School Safety Checklist

Transportation Safety

Whether children walk, ride their bicycle or take the bus to school, it is extremely important that they take proper safety precautions. Here are some tips to make sure your child safely travels to school.

Walking to school

- Review your family's walking safety rules.
- Walk on the sidewalk, if one is available. When on a street with no sidewalk, walk facing the traffic.
- Before you cross the street, stop and look left, right and left again to see if cars are coming.
- Never dart out in front of a parked car.
- Practice walking to school with your child. Cross streets at crosswalks when available.

Riding a bicycle to school

- Make sure your child always wears his/her helmet when leaving the house.
- Make sure helmet is fitted and secured properly.
- Teach your children the rules of the road.

- Ride on the right side of the road, with traffic, and in a single file.
- Come to a complete stop before crossing the street. Walk bike across street.

Riding the bus to school

- Go to the bus stop with your child to teach them the proper way to get on and off the bus.
- Make sure your children stand six feet away (or 3 giant steps) from the curb.
- If your child and you need to cross the street in front of the bus, walk on the side of the road until you are 10 feet ahead of the bus. You always should be able to see the bus driver, and the bus driver always should be able to see you.

School Safety

Many school-related injuries are completely preventable. Follow these steps to ensure your child's safety at school.

Preventing backpack-related injuries

- Chose a backpack for your child carefully. It

should have ergonomically designed features to enhance safety and comfort.

- Don't overstuff a backpack; it should weigh no more than 10 to 20 percent of your child's body weight.

• For example, a child that weighs 60 pounds should carry a backpack no heavier than 12 pounds.

- Ask your children to use both straps when wearing their backpack to evenly distribute the weight on their shoulders.

Preventing playground-related injuries

• Encourage your child to use playgrounds with a soft surface. Avoid playgrounds with concrete surfaces, as they are too hard if your child falls.

- Children under the age of four should use climbing equipment with assistance and adult supervision, and watch older children when they're climbing, especially on monkey bars.

Slow Down: Back to School Means Sharing the Road

Things get a little crazy on the roads during the school year: Buses are everywhere, kids on bikes are hurrying to get to school before the bell rings, harried parents are trying to drop their kids off before work. It's never more important for drivers to slow down and pay attention than when kids are present – especially before and after school.

If You're Dropping Off

Schools often have very specific drop-off procedures for the school year. Make sure you know them for the safety of all kids. More children are hit by cars near schools than at any other location, according to the National Safe Routes to School program. The following apply to all school zones:

- Don't double park; it blocks visibility for other children and vehicles
- Don't load or unload children across the street
- Carpool: reduce the number of cars at the school

Sharing the Road with Young Pedestrians

According to research by the National Safety Council, most of the children who lose their lives in bus-related incidents are 4 to 7 years old, and they're walking. They are hit by the bus, or by a motorist illegally passing a stopped bus. A few precautions go a long way toward keeping children safe:

- Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a red light or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you; this could put them in the path

of moving traffic

- In a school zone when flashers are blinking, stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection
- Always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign
- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas
- Don't honk or rev your engine to scare a pedestrian, even if you have the right of way
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians
- Always use extreme caution to avoid striking pedestrians wherever they may be, no matter who has the right of way

Sharing the Road with School Buses

If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing.

It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.

- Never pass a bus from behind – or from either direction if you're on an undivided road – if it is stopped to load or unload children
- If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus

- Be alert; children often are unpredictable, and they tend to ignore hazards and take risks

Sharing the Road with Bicyclists

On most roads, bicyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as vehicles, but bikes can be hard to see. Children riding bikes create special problems for drivers because usually they are not able to properly determine traffic conditions. The most common cause of collision is a driver turning left in front of a bicyclist.

- When passing a bicyclist, proceed in the same direction slowly, and leave 3 feet between your car and the cyclist
- When turning left & a bicyclist is approaching in the opposite direction, wait for rider to pass
- If you're turning right and a bicyclist is approaching from behind on the right, let the rider go through the intersection first, and always use your turn signals
- Watch for bike riders turning in front of you without looking or signaling; children especially have a tendency to do this
- Be extra vigilant in school zones and residential neighborhoods
- Watch for bikes coming from driveways or behind parked cars
- Check side mirrors before opening your door

By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones.

Manatee County Mosquito Control *By Joy Derksen, Master Gardener 2004*

Florida has always been an ideal home for numerous varieties of mosquitoes. Before there was mosquito control, much of Florida was considered uninhabitable. Orange County's official name used to be Mosquito County. (Not a very tourist-friendly name!)

Mosquito-borne diseases sickened the population, causing many to leave the state in the summer to avoid the twin threats of malaria and yellow fever. Although Manatee County and Tampa had a yellow fever epidemic in 1887, it wasn't until 1949 that Manatee County Mosquito Control became a reality. Today there are nearly 30 employees that are working to keep us safe and comfortable.

Mosquito Control has a four-pronged program. They kill larvae and adult mosquitoes, survey mosquito populations and monitor for disease, and take part in ongoing research and education. Larvae (newly hatched non-flying mosquitoes that live in water) are controlled before they reach the adult stage by spraying ditches and swampy areas where larvae grow. Larvicide is applied by hand, by truck, and by helicopter. We don't usually notice this service, but it is most important for control. These mosquitoes never grow up to bite!

To provide local relief to the people of the coun-

ty, adult mosquitoes are killed with fogging trucks. Larger areas get treated by aircraft. As you can imagine, this only provides temporary relief, as weather and reinfestation can decrease the effectiveness of the treatment.

How do the Mosquito Control folks decide where and when to spray? From April to November there are traps set out in certain areas. Scientists empty the traps and count the number and type of mosquitoes that are captured. There are also a special set of chicken coops around the county that are blood tested every week for signs of mosquito-borne virus. Any sign of St. Louis encephalitis, Eastern Equine Encephalitis, and West Nile Virus causes more mosquito traps to be placed near the chickens so that the type of mosquito can be identified, tracked, and controlled.

Research is also carried out by our Mosquito Control. They are working to determine pesticide resistance in the mosquitoes. There is another study to determine the travel pattern of aircraft spread pesticide clouds. Education to county residents is carried out by pamphlets, by visiting schools, and through county events.

How can you help? Many mosquito problems in your neighborhood are likely to come from water-filled containers that you, the resident, can help to eliminate. All mosquitoes require water in

which to breed. Be sure to drain any standing water around your house.

- Dispose of any tires. Tires can breed thousands of mosquitoes.
- Drill holes in bottoms of recycling containers.
- Clear roof gutters of debris.
- Clean pet water dishes regularly.
- Check and empty children's toys.
- Repair leaky outdoor faucets.
- Change the water in birdbaths at least once a week.
- Canoes and other boats should be turned over.
- Avoid water collecting on pool covers.
- Empty water collected in tarps around the yard or on woodpiles.
- Plug tree holes.

Even the smallest of containers that can collect water can breed hundreds to thousands of mosquitoes. They don't need much water to lay their eggs (bottles, barrels, buckets, overturned garbage can lids, etc.). If you have a landscape pond, keep mosquito eating fish in it or add Mosquito Dunks which contain Bti (*Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis*) which only kills mosquitoes, midges, and black flies.

Osprey: Florida's Fish-Eating Raptor *By Amy Stripe, Master Gardener 2008*

Living near shallow bodies of water such as Terra Ceia Bay and on a canal here in Manatee County affords me the priceless opportunity of observing ospreys, our native fish-eating hawks.

Ospreys (*Pandion haliaetus*) are often confused with bald eagles owing to their white heads. As a general rule, however, ospreys are smaller at 24 inches high versus the eagle's 36 inches. The osprey's wingspan is also a foot shorter, at about 6 feet. In addition, ospreys have white breasts and a distinctive black mask-like band across the eyes.

Their favorite nesting areas are in the tallest structure around, including snags of dead palms, utility poles, channel markers and tall trees. As long as you are near any body of water, you are likely to spot the osprey.

Around mid-morning, I often hear a nesting pair calling to one another in a high pitched shriek that gets

increasingly shrill as they swoop through the neighborhood. When it's "fish on!" there is a curious display in which the osprey will make several circuits around the area with his fish lunch.

No sooner does he (or she) roost in a tall tree to dig then the crows organize a harassment campaign, intending to steal said fish. Don't feel too sorry for the osprey, however. After all, he's done

a bit of advertising with his boastful flight and is a very successful angler. Studies have shown that one in every four dives of an osprey results in a fish catch.

Ospreys are uniquely adapted to fishing. They have the ability to hover while scouting prey, and the catch involves two reversible outer toes in front and two behind, as well as barbed soles on their feet to secure a slippery fish. They usually catch, and thus fly, with their fish head first, in order to minimize wind resistance in the getaway flight.

According to some sources, this mechanism for securing fish may also have a bad end. Fishermen reportedly have caught large fish with osprey talons attached. I guess it was an overly ambitious catch! In my case, the worst fallout I have experienced is an occasional fish head or tail strangely discarded in my yard, which I can only attribute to the ospreys.



Coral bean (*Erythrina herbacea*), sometimes also known as Cherokee bean or cardinal spear, is a deciduous large shrub or small tree, which is native to the hardwood hammocks of the eastern United States. It is most notable for red tubular flowers which grow on tall stalks in the spring and seed pods which split open in the fall to reveal shiny, scarlet red seeds.

The flowers are a great hummingbird and butterfly attractor. It also has interesting compound leaves which appear after flowering. This Florida-friendly plant is a great choice for the back of mixed borders since it can appear somewhat sparse for several months in the winter. Another reason for put-

ting it in the back is its backward facing does have small thorns on the branches.

When I was putting several of these into my garden I was told they were more "leaners" than climbers so I planted them beneath slash pines where they grew up around and through the pines for support. The size can vary greatly depending on the environment.

There is one at the Manatee County Extension office which has exceeded all expectations and is substantial tree but the more typical growth is an open shrub.

People You'll Meet on Your Real Estate Journey

When buying a home, you'll encounter a wide range of folks on your way. Of course, buying a house is more complicated than clicking your heels together three times and chanting "there's no place like home". Fortunately, the following pros will help you along the way.

Realtor: As the "good witch" and the primary guide on your journey, your buyer's agent has a fiduciary responsibility to look out for your best interests. Loan Officer: Unless you're able to make a cash offer, you'll likely be working with a loan officer to procure a loan from a bank. Don't forget that you have options – you can choose to work with an independent mortgage broker who works with several institutions or an in-house loan officer at a specific bank. Whichever route you choose, be sure to shop around for the most competitive rate. Speaking with a loan officer prior to your home search is a great way to start. By getting pre-approved prior to your home search, this initiative will tell you how much house you can buy and prepare you to make a more concrete offer when you locate the home of your dreams. The loan officer will also advise you of each cost associated with your loan which will help you determine all the costs associated with the loan. Being pre-approved makes you more competitive with a cash buyer. Typically, most sellers do not want to delay the sale on a finance contingency.

Loan Processor: Once you begin working with a loan officer, a loan processor will likely be the person helping you assemble the nuts and bolts for your loan application. This individual will assist you in gathering the financial data needed to make the loan decision. From check stubs to tax returns. Appraiser: your lender will select the appraiser who will do a room-by-room walk-through of the property and use those findings along with current market knowledge to determine their professional

estimate of the property's present value. The appraised value of the property is utilized in the loan process to make certain that the collateral (the home) is worth the value the bank is lending upon. Banks will lend on the appraised value or the contract purchase price, whichever is less.

Transaction Coordinator: Some real estate offices have a transaction coordinator to act as a liaison between all of the people mentioned above. This helps ensure an efficient process and prevents you from having to juggle numerous emails and voicemails.

Sommelier: This expert will help you make the critical decision of which vintage to use when you toast the purchase of your new home!

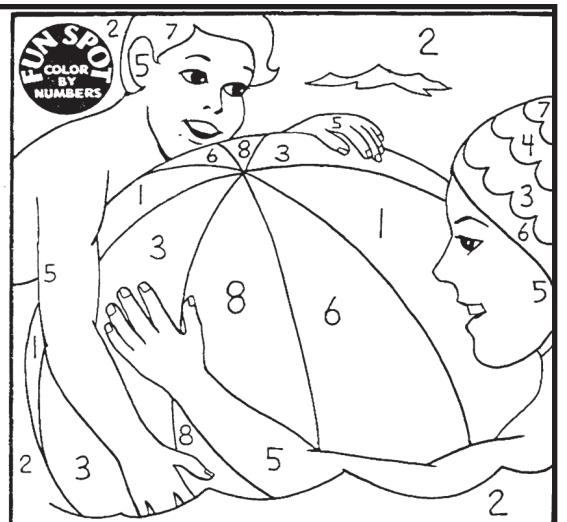

Easy Summer Salad Recipes

Chopped Salad with Steak

6 cups chopped romaine lettuce
1 small red onion, thinly sliced
1 red bell pepper, chopped
1 yellow bell pepper, chopped
1 cucumber, peeled and sliced
1/2 cup pitted kalamata olives, chopped
1/4 cup loosely packed fresh flat-leaf parsley, chopped
3/4 lb Seared Flank Steak with Lime-Wasabi Sauce, chopped
Crumbled blue cheese. Toss together first 7 ingredients in a large bowl. Divide salad mixture among plates; top each with steak and desired amount of blue cheese. Serve with blue cheese dressing.

Orzo Salad w/ Spicy Buttermilk Dressing

1 cup uncooked orzo
1 cup frozen whole-kernel corn, thawed and drained
12 cherry tomatoes, quartered
3 green onions, sliced
1 (15 oz) can black beans, rinsed and drained
1/4 cup low-fat buttermilk
3 tbsp chopped fresh cilantro, divided
3 tbsp fresh lime juice
2 tbsp light sour cream
2 tbsp canola mayonnaise
1 tbsp chili powder
1/2 tsp kosher salt
1/4 tsp black pepper
1/4 tsp ground red pepper
2 garlic cloves, crushed
1 peeled avocado, cut into 8 wedges
1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley
Cook orzo according to package directions, omitting salt and fat. Drain and rinse; drain well. Place orzo, corn, and next 3 ingredients (through beans) in a large bowl; toss. Combine buttermilk, 2 tbsp cilantro, and next 8 ingredients (through garlic) in a small bowl, stirring well with a whisk. Drizzle over orzo mixture; toss. Top with avocado; garnish with remaining cilantro and parsley

Chilled Vegetable Salad

1 cup sugar
3/4 cup cider vinegar
1/2 cup vegetable oil
1 medium-size green bell pepper, chopped
1 medium onion, chopped
3 celery ribs, sliced
1 (7 oz) jar diced pimiento, undrained
1 can small sweet green peas, drained
1 can French-cut green beans, drained
1 (11 oz) can white shoepeg corn, drained
1/2 tsp salt; 1/4 tsp pepper
Bring first 3 ingredients to a boil in small saucepan over medium heat; cook, stirring often, 5 minutes or until sugar dissolves. Remove dressing from heat, and cool 30 minutes. Stir together chopped bell pepper and next 8 ingredients in a large bowl; gently stir in dressing. Cover and chill salad for 8 hours. Serve with a slotted spoon. NOTE: Salad may be stored in an airtight container in the refrigerator for several days.

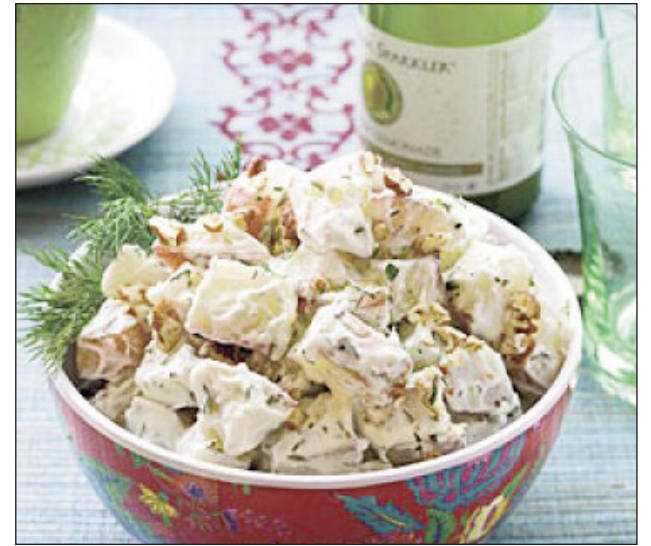
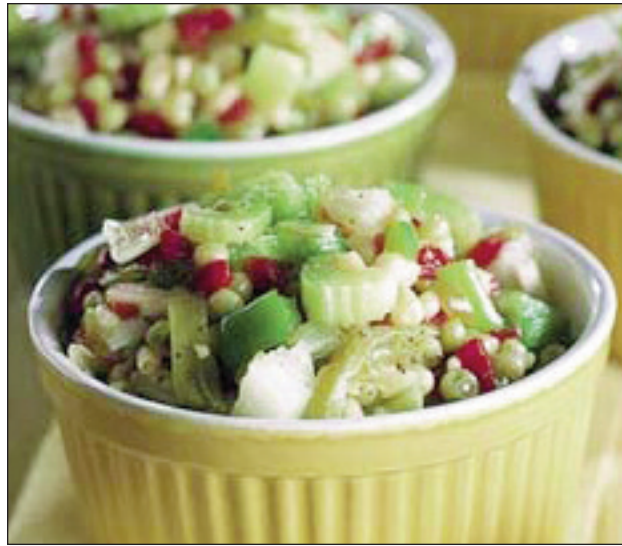

6 tbsp olive oil, divided
2 tsp kosher salt, divided
1/2 tsp black pepper, divided
2 lbs asparagus, trimmed
4 oz crumbled goat cheese
1/4 cup thinly sliced shallots
1/3 cup mayonnaise; 3 tbsp buttermilk
2 tsp fresh lemon juice
2 garlic cloves, minced
2 tbsp chopped fresh mint
2 tsp chopped fresh dill
Preheat grill to med-high heat. Brush chicken with 2 tbsp oil; sprinkle with 1 1/4 tsp salt, 1/4 tsp pepper. Grill chicken, covered, 5 mins on each side or until done. Let stand 10 mins; chop. Toss asparagus with 2 tbsp oil, grill in a grill basket, covered, 1 min. on each side. Cut into 2-in pieces. Toss chicken, asparagus, cheese, shallot, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper in bowl. Whisk together mayo, next 3 ingreds, 2 tbsp . oil, and 1/4 tsp. salt; drizzle over mixture. Top with herbs.

Layered Cornbread-and-Turkey Salad

1 (6 oz) package buttermilk cornbread mix
1 bottle Parmesan-peppercorn dressing
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup buttermilk
1 (9 oz) package romaine lettuce, shredded
2 1/2 cups chopped smoked turkey
2 large yellow bell peppers, chopped
2 large tomatoes, seeded and chopped
1 red onion, chopped
1 cup diced celery (about 3 celery ribs)
2 cups (8 ounces) shredded Swiss cheese
10 bacon slices, cooked and crumbled
2 green onions, sliced
Prepare cornbread according to package directions; cool and crumble. Set aside. Stir together dressing, mayonnaise, and buttermilk until blended. Layer crumbled cornbread, shredded lettuce, and next 7 ingredients evenly into 6 (3- to 4-cup) glass containers; spoon half of dressing mixture evenly over tops. Cover and chill at least 3 hours or up to 24 hours. Sprinkle with green onions just before serving. Serve with remaining half of dressing mixture on the side.

Herbed Potato Salad

2 lbs red potatoes, cubed
1 (14-oz.) can fat-free chicken broth
1 garlic clove, minced
1/2 cup nonfat plain yogurt
1 tbsp chopped fresh dill
1 tbsp chopped fresh oregano
2 tbsp light mayonnaise
1 tsp salt
2 tsp olive oil
2 tsp white wine vinegar
fresh dill sprig, chopped toasted pecans
Bring first 3 ingredients and 2 cups water to a boil in a large saucepan over medium-high heat, and cook 20 minutes or until tender. Drain and let cool 30 minutes. Whisk together yogurt and next 6 ingredients in a large bowl until combined. Gently fold potatoes into yogurt mixture. Cover and chill 1 to 12 hours. Garnish, if desired.
