Here we are at the first of May, a full third of 2017 already written in the books and I am sorry to say that I have nothing new to report on the Marina rehab. Regarding the marina project, the pursuit of permits is ongoing and we did receive word that questions about the permits have been answered satisfactorily and now it is a waiting game as they work their way through the system. The questions from the engineers for clarification about the work to be done have been answered also. We should be receiving contracts that are ready to go out for bid shortly but not before the permits are approved. As soon as I know some details on the start dates I will put them out in this report and notify slip holders. We are trying to organize a group and tactics toward motivating the responsible agencies, county and state, to dredge the Bayshore Gardens Trailer Estates Channel. This channel is part of the storm water runoff system for the county and part of the inland navigation system maintained by the

state established West Coast Inland Navigation District. (WCIND) As this effort becomes more organized we will reach out to let you know how you can help. Speaking of community action, as noted elsewhere in this paper there will be a County Commission Meeting May 4th at 9:00 am.. The item once again under consideration is the development of Long Bar Pointe. (Aqua by the Bay). I am sure that the commissioners are anxious to hear the public comments on this project. Most of those I talk to feel this version is a 1.01 of the original with little improvement for environmental protection concerns and some points are left open so eventually we could end up with something very close to the originally denied proposal.

Due to a computer failure, my Marina Slip Waiting and Trailer Space Waiting lists were lost. I am attempting to restore this but if you were on either of these lists please call me. Reminders – It is past time for slip and trailer space renewals. Although most have already taken care of this there are still a few outstanding. If you do not intend to renew please notify the Office. Please provide all the required paperwork, completed contract, proof of insurance and current registration.

Improvements, Repairs and Projects Completed –Several planks were reattached or replaced on the finger piers and fish dock.

There were 13 members present at the April meeting. Business discussed:



 - 1 Tablespoon Vegetable Oil
 - 1 Tablespoon Dawn Dishwashing Liquid

The April meeting was a workshop on Spring Cuttings presented by Lee Korniluk. Lee brought small pots and cuttings from her yard of a rose bush, hibiscus, bougainvillea, and a snow bush

In the small pots she had put leaves in the bottom and dirt on top. It was also mentioned that a coffee filter could be used instead of leaves to keep the dirt in the pot. Lee then emphasized that in her experience with cuttings that they need partners so she puts at least 2 and sometimes 3 cuttings in the same pot.

She then used her finger to poke 2-3 holes in the dirt for the cuttings. The cuttings need to have any blooms removed and be cut below the stem node. Lee then encouraged everyone to take a pot and pick a pair of cuttings to plant to take home for their garden. The most popular cutting was from the rose bush which is an old variety that Lee started from a cutting many years ago.

Thanks to Lee for sharing her vast experience and expertise with Spring Cuttings and to Matilde Renovalez for being our hostess with fresh fruit, coffee cake, and other goodies.

Public Works Responds to Questions on Columbia Sidewalk Placement

In the past month inquiries have been made and questions raised about the safety of sidewalks being placed on the west side of Columbia. One of the questions was: If safety is a factor, is it wise to have more pedestrians cross at least 9 intersections when there is only one intersection on the East side. The routine complaint on Columbia is about speeding. The worry is that in coming off Columbia, a (speeding) driver may not see a pedestrian in time —which is very possible now — but in the future, more people of course, will be using the side with sidewalksand intersections of the west side would be using the side with sidewalksand intersections.

After an email to Mr. Russo from Suzanna Young, the following is his response.

"Yes, west side is the plan for this segment for the following reasons:

- 1) It's what was requested by the schools.
- 2) Looking at the map below the west side will collect more students / people than the east side.
- 3) West side street crossings will be at stops signs.
- 4) East side sidewalk would require all the folks on the west side to cross the street at 9 places without stop sign protection.

The west side would actually provide safer crossings with ramps to stand in while waiting to cross each street vs. crossing Columbia street to get from west to east side of road.

All the 9 side streets have stop signs. There are no stop signs on Columbia. This is the very essence of

why the west side is a better place to be. The pedestrians would be crossing at a stop sign vs. no stop sign and this is usually considered a preferred scenario.

Bus operators needed at Manatee County Area Transit

Manatee County Area Transit (MCAT) is hiring full-time bus operators to provide high quality public transportation services throughout the County.

Last year MCAT officials brought the driver shortage situation to the attention of County Commissioners who responded by funding two new Handy Bus drivers. But several vacant positions mean MCAT needs new drivers to maintain existing service levels.

Qualified applicants for bus operator positions must possess a Class "B" Commercial Driver's License (CDL) or a Class "B" CDL permit with passenger endorsement by the effective date of employment and must pass a Department of Transportation physical.

Each bus operator is cross-trained to work the full array of bus services offered by MCAT, and every operator undergoes a comprehensive six-week training program which includes classroom instruction and supervised driving time on MCAT routes.

Energy assistance available for low-income seniors

Manatee County is accepting applications for the Emergency Home Energy Assistance for the Elderly grant which offers financial help to residents ages 60 and older who have an economic hardship.

Tracie Adams, Manatee's Human Services Manager, says Manatee County may approve up to \$600 in state grant assistance for a household twice a year. Assistance is available to a household once during the cooling season, April 1 through Sept. 30, and again during the heating season, Oct. 1 to March 31. Manatee County will have about \$4,100 per month to distribute to needy customers from April 1, 2017 through March 31, 2018. There is still approximately \$7,600 of funding available now through March 31 from the current grant year. The program is available to Florida Power & Light and Peace River Electric Cooperative customers. "These are crisis benefits—vou're in jeopardy of having your power turned off or need it turned back on," Adams said. "Recipients must have a final notice, past due amount or have their power disconnected in order to get the financial assistance."

To be eligible for assistance, applicants must:

- * Be part of a household with at least one person age 60 or older in the home;
- * Have a documented heating or cooling emergency (a past due amount on your bill; a final notice of disconnection has been issued, a deposit due or your electric has been turned off); * Earn a gross household annual income equal to or less than 150 percent of the federal poverty guidelines. That means a one-person household could have an income of \$17,820 or less to be eligible. A two-person home must show an income of less than \$24,030. These amounts are subject to change based on the Federal Poverty Guidelines.



Herbs as a Ground Cover? By Nancy Porter, Master Gardener 2014

To some of us, planting space is at a premium. So, covers to beautify our surroundings and create Keep in mind a little goes a long way when plantif we have the choice of planting things for the beautiful deliciousness in the kitchen. eyes to feast upon, why not consider something that will answer not one, not two, but three desires? Beauty to behold, aroma to enjoy, AND tastiness to our meals.

We have the opportunity to plant herbs as ground

German Chamomile (Matricaria chamomilla) Has a delightful scent and provides a delicious and soothing tea. Chamomile is rather aggressive; install barriers to keep it from overtaking your entire garden. Boggy soil is a no-no; well-drained soil is best. Plant it where it will get sun in winter and shade in summer.



Chervil (Anthriscus cerefolium) Sometimes referred to as French parsley, is a member of the carrot family (who knew?) and, as expected, is often used in French dishes. Chervil enjoys cool conditions, so plant it in the cooler months. Adding sphagnum peat moss will help provide the moist conditions it needs to thrive. Shade is necessary, as it will struggle in sun. Harvest leaves before the weather gets too hot.

Horehound (Marrubium vulgare) A perennial herb with hairy oval leaves. Since it is a weed in much of the United States, it should do great here! Well-drained soil and sun are needed, and it should be spaced about 12 -18 inches apart. Trim plants regularly to keep them bushy. Horehound is used to make candy. It is thought to alleviate throat tickles and coughing.

Lemon Balm (Melissa officinalis) As the name implies, it is a lemon-scented perennial herb that belongs to the mint family. This herb can be used as a back drop to your garden, as it grows a bit higher (2 feet) and in clumps. It enjoys well-drained soil and lots of sunlight. Plants are started from seeds or cuttings. It might be 2 years before a well-sized clump is formed.

Marjoram (Origanum majorana), Is also called sweet marjoram. It is a perennial that grows upright. For your ground cover, pot

Most herbs will grow in conditions of soil and sunlight that are similar to vegetable gardening. Take into consideration pH testing and preparation of soil, in addition to fertilizing and watering.

marjoram (O. onites) would be better, as it runs along the ground. Plants can be started early in the spring from seeds, cuttings or clump divisions. It is attractive enough to use as a border for a flower garden. It is drought tolerant and can take sandy soil and lots of sunlight

Mint (Mentha spp.) There are many forms of mint that can quickly spread throughout the landscape. Above and below-ground barriers need to be erected to keep it from taking over. Shady, moist conditions are best. Two of the most popular mints are spearmint (Mentha spicata) and peppermint (M. piperita). They have pointed leaves with slightly notched margins. The flowers are small, whitish, bluish, or violet.

Oregano (Origanum vulgare) Another herb of the mint family, is also called wild marjoram. Oregano is fairly drought tolerant; it needs full sun, and well-drained soil. It loves to be used! Pinching it back helps to obtain a lower and bushier posture.

Parsley (Petroselinum crispum) Parsley is a great success in our gardens. This biennial has a 2-year life cycle and is best planted in the fall or late winter. Parsley grows best in extremely

rich and moist but well-drained soil. It flourishes in full sunlight, but will also grow in partial shade. Seeds are sown about 1/4" deep, or set seedlings about 6" apart. Parsley is also a butterfly caterpillar favorite. Creeping

ing herbs for culinary purposes. These low-growing herbs, mostly perennial, can provide us with a delightfully pretty, aromatic, and tasty garden.

'Prostratus'), Is an excellent ground cover if grown in full sun. It is drought tolerant and evergreen. It can be propagated though cuttings or division of established plants.

Thyme (Thymus vulgaris L.) Is low-growing and bushy and can be planted as a ground cover in mounds. It thrives in well-drained soil with full sun. You can keep it as close as 2" in height.


DEAR DR. ROACH: We recently lost a dear relative to cholangiocarcinoma. He had served in the Navy in Vietnam. The probable cause of his cancer was from a parasite, a river fluke, which is common to that region. The diagnosis came way too late to save his life. How can veterans be tested or diagnosed early enough for a possible successful cure? Are there any current tests available? — J.A.E.

ANSWER: I am sorry to hear about your relative. Cholangiocarcinoma is cancer of the bile duct, a rare cancer. Liver flukes are a risk factor, and so is a condition called primary sclerosing cholangitis, a condition associated with ulcerative colitis. The cancer is rare but highly lethal, because by the time symptoms show up, the cancer usually is advanced.

Also because of its rarity, screening for the cancer in a general population won't be effective. However, for people at high risk, such as those with PSC or a history of liver parasites, at least one study has shown that screening with a blood test (CA 19-9, CEA) or by endoscopy can be effective. It would be reasonable to speak with the expert taking care of this problem, usually a gastroenterologist, about screening.

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Stretching Helps Ease Spinal Stenosis Pain

DEAR DR. ROACH: My wife suffered from spinal stenosis. She had a cortisone shot, which helped for 90 days. She had regular physical therapy meetings. She was in constant pain, but insisted on playing tennis (against her doctor's wishes).

Then, we happened to vacation for a month in Florida, and one of the offered activities was a "stretch" workout. She insisted that she wanted to try it. After the very first time she thought she felt a little better. She went to several more sessions, and finally asked the trainer what she could buy to keep it up at home.

The trainer suggested a stretching DVD. It takes about an hour to complete it, and she now does it three times a week. She plays hard tennis five days a week, hasn't complained about pain since 2010, and hasn't needed any physical therapy, either. I continue to be amazed.

Certainly this kind of therapy can't hurt anyone, since you do it only to your personal comfort levels. Perhaps you might mention this type of therapy in your column sometime. It worked miracles for us at virtually no cost. — R.M.

ANSWER: Spinal stenosis is caused by pressure on the nerves at the level of the spinal column. Physical therapy is one effective treatment, and one I always recommend prior to considering surgery. I thank you for taking the time to point out that gentle stretching can help, probably by opening up the spaces in between the vertebrae to allow the nerve more room.



Stone Crab Claw Recipes

Marinated Stone Crab Claws

2 1/2 lbs frozen Florida stone crab claws

1/2 cup butter, softened

1 teaspoon curry powder

1/3 cup orange marmalade

1/4 cup lime juice

1/4 cup soy sauce

1 clove Florida garlic, minced

1/2 teaspoon ginger

Crack and remove outer shell from the claws, leaving meat attached to the moveable pincer that is on one side of the claw. Cream together margarine and curry powder. Spread curry butter over both sides of frozen stone crab claws; arrange on broiling pan. In the meantime, combine remaining ingredients, mixing well. Cook, stirring constantly, until clear and thickened; keep warm. Place broiler pan with the crab claws about 3-inches from heat source and broil 6-8 minutes, turning once, or until hot. Serve with hot marmalade dip.

Mango Marinated Stone Crab Claws

- 3 pounds medium Florida stone crab claws
- 2 cups ripe mango, cut into 1/2 inch cubes
- 3 tablespoons cilantro, finely chopped 2 jalapeño peppers, seeded and minced
- 4 tablespoons lime juice

1 tablespoon light brown sugar

Florida salad greens

Crack claws and remove shell and movable pincer, leaving the meat attached to the remaining pincer. Place in a single layer in a shallow dish. To make salsa marinade, combine mango, cilantro, peppers, lime juice and sugar in a mixing bowl. Taste for seasoning, adding more lime juice and/or brown sugar as needed. Spoon the salsa mixture over the meaty part of crab claws. Cover and marinate in refrigerator at least 2 hours. Serve claws on a bed of salad greens with mango salsa as an appetizer.

Stone Crab Claws with Cilantro Butter & Old Bay Seasoning

8 stone crab claws (fresh or frozen)

1 tbsp Old Bay seasoning

2 tbsp unsalted butter

a handful fresh cilantro, chopped

2 bay leaves; 1 garlic clove, peeled

garlic powder; ice cubes

Fill a large and high pan with water and add 2 tsp of Old Bay, peeled garlic clove and bay leaves. Season with pepper and salt. Place pan over high heat and bring water to a good boil. Add claws. Turn heat lower and boil claws: 10 minutes if fresh, 5 minutes to thaw if frozen. In the meantime prepare an ice bath: fill a large bowl with water and add 2 handfuls of ice cubes. Place this in fridge. Once crab is boiled, take pan off the heat and remove claws using a slotted spoon, and transfer to ice bath. Leave crab claws in ice water for 5 minutes, then drain them. Open claws up to make it easier to eat. Gently tap the claw with the back of a knife blade, turning the claw until it cracks open. Do the same with the crab knuckles. Add unsalted butter to a wok or large non-stick pan and place it over medium heat. Season with a pepper, salt, garlic powder and Old Bay. Add cilantro. Stir well and add cracked crab claws. Don't stir crab but let it warm through for about 7-8 minutes. Drizzle with cilantro butter from time to time. Divide the crab over 2 deep plates and drizzle with the remaining butter sauce. Serve hot.

Claws with Spicy Golden Mustard Sauce

3 pounds medium Florida stone crab claws 2 tbsp dry mustard, 1 1/2 cups mayonnaise 1 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoons half and half

Crack claws; remove shell and movable pincer leaving meat attached to the remaining pincer. Set aside. Combine mustard, mayo and Worcestershire sauce; blend slowly for 3 minutes. Add small amounts of half and half until mixture has a creamy consistency. Serve claws with mustard sauce on the side.

Stone Crab Claws Miami

3 pounds Florida stone crab claws 1/4 cup olive oil

1/4 cup extra-dry vermouth

2 tablespoons Florida lemon juice

1 tsp salt; 1/2 tsp white pepper

Crack claws, remove shell and movable pincer, leaving the meat attached to the remaining pincer. Heat olive oil in a skillet over medium heat. Add claws and cook for 3-4 minutes until heated through, turning claws frequently. Turn heat to high; add vermouth, lemon juice, salt and pepper to pan. Cook 1 minute more, spooning vermouth sauce over claws. Serve claws hot or cold.

Honey Citrus Florida Stone Crab Claws with Hearts of Palm Salad

3 lbs medium Florida stone crab claws, cooked and chilled

1/2 cup sugar; 1/2 cup rice wine vinegar

1/4 cup honey

1/2 cup orange or tangerine juice

8 hearts of palm, fresh or canned 1/4 cup red onions, thinly sliced

1/4 cup roasted red peppers, thinly sliced

1/4 cup roasted yellow peppers thinly sliced

2 medium oranges, peeled and segmented

1/4 cup fresh tarragon leaves

2 cups fresh spinach, finely chopped

1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil

1/4 cup rice wine vinegar

2 tbsp fresh parsley, finely chopped Crack claws; remove shell and movable pincer, leaving the meat attached to the remaining pincer. Set aside. In a small saucepan, combine sugar, vinegar, and honey with orange juice. Bring to a boil and cook until thickened to syrup. Cool and set aside. Slice hearts of palm into thin strips. In a bowl, combine the hearts, onions, peppers, orange segments, tarragon and spinach. Dress salad with olive oil and vinegar; toss until moistened. Serve salad in center of plate with stone crab claws arranged around the edge. Drizzle the honey citrus sauce over all and garnish with chopped parsley.





















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
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
