angles"! Shown here at the helm of his beloved catamaran Too Sexy, his is sailing with a group of friends on one of his almost daily tours around Sarasota Bay. If you want to check out his knowledge about angles, just check out his deck at the back of his lovely Bryn Mawr Island Drive home, which he shares with his well-known spouse, Joyce. You won't find a right angle corner there - nor in his unique re-designed galley kitchen indoors. He might also tell you about his on demand hot water system, or his cast iron wood stove as he pursues his ongoing efforts to conserve energy. If you want to know about sailing techniques,

Bill also knows all the angles in that regard too. There is no doubt Bill can fill you in on most community matters about Bayshore Gardens too!

Bayshore Gardens House Styles: Then and Now – Much change but the personality has been preserved!

When Sal Cumella, a graduate student from the University of Florida [shown right with Professor Dr. Linda Stevenson], presented his part of the Bayshore Gardens heritage preservation study, he gave us a glance back at lifestyles in the mid-1950s when our community was formed. He showed us cars with huge fin tails, bobby sox, and women wearing plaid skirts; and, our beloved homes as they were originally constructed. Our homes were designed in an effort to reflect the Florida west coast landscape. Their names were assigned to represent common aspects of our local geography.

In the intervening decades, many of these homes have been altered and slightly redesigned. There are new windows, doors; and, breezeways were often closed in to become garages. Other refinements have hidden the grand 'clerestory' windows below the rooflines, intended to let in floods of Florida sunshine. Some have been intentionally preserved in their original forms by caring owners. A few have permitted us to see their origins, regretfully, through neglect.

In our own home, the Carrolls, at 6916 26th Street, West, which we have only owned since 2010, most of the big changes occurred in the interior. Yet on the outside, the breezeway was



closed in to create a garage, the southerly roofline was extended, to provide some additional storage space, and a sunroom and a lanai were added to the canal side 'front' yard. A new breezeway was extended over the driveway to provide shade from the hot sun.

Blood Donations Are Crucial Part of Hurricane Season Prep List

4 TBS. Extra Virgin Olive Oil


1 TBS. Butter

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bayshore Gardens Park and Recreation District was called to order by Chairman Maynard Boyce at 7:00 p.m. and was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Notice of the meeting was posted in the June Bayshore Banner.

Roll: Kathy Lokos, Steve Watkins, Don Gassie, Maynard Boyce, Bob King and Richard Nelson. A quorum was established.

Present: Joanne Manse, John Woodruff, Suzanna Young, Faye Golden and Lenny Lyons

Steve made a motion to approve the May Minutes. Bob seconded. Motion Passed.

Steve made a motion to approve May Financial Statements. Richard seconded. Motion Passed.

CRIME WATCH Steve Watkins

Steve reported MSO is patrolling the grounds more often. 10 more keys need to be ordered for the beach gate. These keys will be delivered to the MSO District 2 Office and distributed to the new deputies who now patrol our area.

MANAGERS REPORT: Joanne Manse

Joanne stated Florida League of Cities sent a letter stating the district is not responsible for the dog bite in the park. The responsibility is that of the dog owner and the case is closed. Joanne reported the AED's are on order and should be in soon. Joanne stated there is rumor on miscommunication between herself and The Chairman.

Maynard will give Joanne directives by e-mail. Don requested the e-mails be forward to all the Board members. Joanne announced she is ready to come back full time starting June 30th.

BUDGET & FINANCE: Jeannette Sparrow No meeting. No report. Next meeting will be July 9th, 2014 at 5:30 pm.

WEB: Don Gassie

Don stated the five year plan dated history will be done soon. Don reported we now have eight color pages in the Banner. Don made a motion to determine the cost of color verses non color pages. Bob seconded. Any advertiser that wants their ad to be on a color page, there will be a surcharge based only on the publishers markup. This will be taken back to committee to determine the cost. Motion passed. Don made a motion to pay Kim Wind, our Banner and web design person \$20.00 per hour instead of \$15.00. Steve seconded. Motion passed. Steve made a motion to extend the 15% discount for six month ads for one more month. Kathy sec-

onded. Motion passed. New or continuing customers need to pay up front to get the discount. Next meeting will be July 9th, at 5:30 pm.

Richard Nelson MARINA:

Richard stated we need to do something with a derelict boat docked in the marina . We will contact the lawyer and have him send a letter to the owner. Richard reported we have a resident with a 38' catamaran. The homeowner would pay the expense to have a piling removed to accommodate his boat. This will go back to the committee. There is going to be periodic gate checks possibly by July 4th. If the card doesn't belong to the person using it, the card will be taken and the owner notified. Next meeting will be July 9th, 2014 at 5:30

HOUSE & GROUNDS: Bob King

Bob made a motion to give the executive committee the authority to have vehicles towed. Kathy seconded. Motion passed. The executive committee consists of; Chairman, 1st and 2nd Vice Chairman's, Treasurer and Secretary. Motion passed. Bob stated he has two bids for a one meter diving board. The cost will be \$19,000.00

Of which \$8,000.00 of this is installation. This is going back to committee for further evaluation. The lock on the Woodchoppers door is now back to the push button lock. Kathy made a motion to never discuss moving the oak trees along the north ball field again. Don seconded. Motion passed. Next meeting July 9th 2014 at 5:30 p.m.

PERSONNEL & SALARY:

Maynard Boyce/Bob King

No meeting. No report.

OLD BUSINESS: Maynard announced Dr. Faye Golden is interested in being on the Board. Maynard asked Dr Golden to tell the board a little bit about herself. Dr. Golden is native Floridian and has been in the area for 20 plus years. She is a homeowner in Bayshore and a registered voter in Manatee County. Dr. Golden is a licensed Chiropractor Physician as well as a teacher in Manatee County. A vote was taken to accept Dr. Golden as a new trustee. All are in favor.

NEW BUSINESS: Maynard would like the board to start budgeting yearly to have a landscaping reserve fund. Maynard would like to have more Florida friendly plants that don't require much water. This will go back to House and Grounds for further review.

Don Gassie made a motion on District Communication:

1. All employees and Trustees of the District will adhere to Florida sunshine laws.

- 2. All employees and Trustees of the District will conduct themselves in accordance with District bylaws and the passed motions that modify them.
- 3. The District Manager or his/her assigns will supervise and direct other employees. Trustees will not direct staff employees unless requested to do so by the manager or a Board motion.
- 4. Any direction given to the District Manager by the Trustees through motions or suggestions must be transmitted by the Chairman of the Board only, not by other Trustees, unless they are empowered by the Board to communicate directly.
- 5. The Chairman of the Board will direct the manager only as to bylaws and the motions that modify them. The Chairman must not give direction that is not endorsed by the Board.
- 6. Only the District Manager can authorize expenditures via office discretionary funds and will be solely responsible for said expenditures.
- 7. The District manager or assigns shall promptly advise all Trustees of any problems concerning personnel or facilities. All Trustees must be individually informed via email or regular mail.
- 8. Any employee with a grievance, safety warning or other concern that they believe may affect the District may directly communicate with any or all Trustees without fear of reprisal. But if a Trustee chooses to act it must be done through a Board action only. Bob seconded. Motion passed.

Don made a motion to hire an Assistant Manager: The position of Assistant Manager will be created and filled as described below.

- 1. An ad will be placed in at least the Herald and the Banner.
- 2. Manager will provide details and applications as requested. See below
- 3. Manager will forward all received applications to all Trustees.
- 4. Interested Trustees, with the advice of the Manager, will decide on a short list of applicants.
- 5. Selected applicants will be interviewed by Trustees and Manager. All will be asked the same questions in accordance with employment laws.
- 6. Interested Trustees, with the advice of the Manager, will choose the Assistant Manager.
- 7. The choice will be submitted at a board meeting for ratification. Bob seconded. Motion passed. An ad will be placed in the Banner and in the Bradenton Herald.

Suzanna announced John Miller, a long time Bayshore resident and renowned artist has donated several of his drawings to the district. Suzanna would like to get estimates of matting and framing of the art. Suzanna will be getting estimates.

Maynard adjourned the meeting at 9:20 p.m.

One of the biggest boating holidays will be just days ahead when this is published. Along with cookouts, picnics, fireworks and all manner of outdoor activities, our corner of paradise will see a great increase in the number of vessels out on the water. If you are planning a boating activity for the holiday put an extra bit of emphasis on safety. Increased numbers and boats unfamiliar with our area can create challenges not typical for a day's outing. Throw in a few adult beverages and things can get real dangerous, real fast. Captains need to stay especially vigilant. Watch Out For the Other Guy. Night time operations require even more attention, and be sure to check out your Navigation Lights and Signaling devices before you need them. I think that one of the scariest moments that I have ever experienced was when the main fuse on my boat blew and the boat went dark. Ordinarily that wouldn't have been that

scary except it happened just after we headed back from the fireworks at Marina Jack's. We had gotten out a little ahead of the mass exodus but just a little and all of the other boats were right behind us. I was amazed at the number of boats that were running wide open throttle in the dark and more than a couple had no lights at all. I am sure that it only took a few minutes to replace that fuse. With only a flashlight marking our position, and all of those boats, seen and unseen, bearing down on our position it seemed like an eternity. Have a most excellent and enjoyable 4th of July and please keep it safe.

Reminders – Vehicles with trailers attached must have a parking decal. Don't loan out your Gate Key. We intend to perform gate checks in the near future. Perhaps as early as July 4th. If you are bringing a guest that is towing a boat, you must

remain with them at all times. Arrangements must be made for tow vehicles with trailers parked in the Marina without decals.

THE HISTORY OF THE STARS AND STRIPES

The Stars and Stripes originated as a result of a resolution adopted by the Marine Committee of the Second Continental Congress at Philadelphia on June 14, 1777. The resolution read:

"Resolved, that the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation. "

The resolution gave no instruction as to how many points the stars should have, nor how the stars should be arranged on the blue union. Consequently, some flags had stars scattered on the blue field without any specific design, some arranged the stars in rows, and some in a circle. The first Navy Stars and Stripes had the stars arranged in staggered formation in alternate rows of threes and twos on a blue field. Other Stars and Stripes flags had stars arranged in alternate rows of four, five and four. Some stars had six points while others had eight.

Strong evidence indicates that Francis Hopkinson of New Jersey, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, was responsible for the stars in the U.S. flag. At the time that the flag resolution was adopted, Hopkinson was the Chairman of the Continental Navy Board's Middle Department. Hopkinson also helped design other devices for

the Government including the Great Seal of the United States. For his services, Hopkinson submitted a letter to the Continental Admiralty Board asking "whether a Quarter Cask of the public Wine will not be a proper & reasonable Reward

for these Labours of Fancy and a suitable Encouragement to future Exertions of a like Nature." His request was turned down since the Congress regarded him as a public servant.

In our own home, the Carrolls, at 6916 26th Street, West, which we have only owned since 2010, most of the big changes occurred in the interior. Yet on the outside, the breezeway was closed in to create a garage, the southerly roofline was extended, to provide some additional storage space, and a sunroom and a lanai were added to the canal side 'front' yard. A new breezeway was extended over the driveway to provide shade from the hot sun.



Ironically, if you look inside the garage, the original decorative wrought iron supports for the breezeway are still in place to hold up that end of the roof. Since the photo was taken, the exterior windows, by then inoperable, have been replaced. We hope their modern design will still complement the original architectural features. The house style was known as a "Gladiola". It is different though, because the original owners chose the option to have same-size windows installed across the front, as opposed to the normal configuration shown in the 2014 photo following. That house has retained the original breezeway. The original concrete driveway configuration is still in place as well.




This Gladiola home has retained most of the original design features. It is obviously well-maintained.



Notice the open windows in the small room at the back of the breezeway in the original architectural concept drawing.


In the inventory of dwellings undertaken by Dr. Linda Stevenson and her students, the popularity of the various house designs can be seen in the table presented. The data collected includes a detailed inventory for each individual home



reviewed.

In this table, one can see the popularity range of each of the ten prominent architectural designs available for sale in the early years of the Bayshore Gardens community. There were various options available for each, but the designs stayed basically the same for each named.

It is clear that the Hibiscus design was slightly more popular than the stylish Bird of Paradise. This was followed in popularity very closely by the Seagrape and the Gladiola designs. The most expensive and spacious design, the Heritage, was chosen by many, and, the White Orchid, apparently by just a few. The "other" homes clustered or spread throughout the community are probably, for the most part, RICHMOND-style homes, introduced and often furnished by Lawrence Richmond, joined by his wife Ruth, the interior decorator.



The Richmond homes included a half dozen different designs, and often, as shown below, terra cotta tile roofing.



A Richmond home as seen today.

The various home designs are shown following, with a before and after view. Changes most often seen are breezeways closed in to become garages, window and door replacements and the closing in of clerestory windows. The astounding thing, though, is that with rare exception, the fundamental characteristics of the community have been maintained. You will note that each design was available in a 'reverse' format that could have the driveway and key features at either end.





Robin's Report: Status of the new South County TIF

implemented as a tool to raise and allocate money within a certain geographical area. The money generated is specifically utilized within that area for community revitalization, improvements and projects. The Southwest Area TIF boundaries will be our South County line, straddling New 301 to Manatee Avenue and over to the edge of the mainland.

If you are familiar with the South County CRA, money generated above a baseline was captured and dedicated for enhancements, extra policing, lighting and sidewalk projects, within that specific geographical area. The major difference between the CRA and the TIF, is the CRA is designated to benefit a blighted area, and the TIF, is any area

A TIF, Tax Increment Financing, is going to be designated to generate funds and disperse them improvement, what partnerships can be developed according to a plan and list of priorities. We currently have a Port Manatee TIF, whereby an increase in the taxes collected above a base, will be set aside for improvements within that specific

> A benefit to the larger TIF area would entitle areas not currently served in the CRA to become eligible for enhancement projects. The Tallevast Area will now be included, when it has been excluded from being in the CRA as well as sections of 41 that fell outside of the CRA boundaries.

> What's important to the people in the Bayshore Gardens area and areas West of 41, is that you will now be included in the discussion as to what needs

and how we can work together to improve Neighborhoods. Your input is greatly appreciated and vital to our overall success.

Nitrogen Fertilizer Ban in Effect June 1st:

Taken from Master Gardeners Bench. By Amy Stripe

As a reminder to Manatee County residents, June 1st kicks off the ban on application of nitrogen fertilizer. This is to protect our waterways from nutrient runoff during our rainy summer months. Here are the main provisions of our fertilizer ordinance:

Summer fertilizer restrictions: From June 1 to September 30, no fertilizer containing nitrogen (N) shall be applied to turf or landscape plants in Manatee County.

This does not mean your garden will suffer; you can apply:

- Potassium (K) the third number in fertilizer formulations - plays a key role in many growth related processes in plants.
- Micronutrients, such as magnesium (Mg) and manganese (Mn).
- Iron (Fe), which is particularly useful for keeping lawns green.

• Compost-based products, such as chicken or cow manures, earthworm castings, or composts.

Limits on nitrogen: From October 1 through May 31, nitrogen fertilizers must contain at least 50% slow release nitrogen. Look for the terms time release, slow release, or controlled release on the product label. In addition, nitrogen application cannot exceed four pounds per 1,000 square feet annually or one pound per application.

Phosphorus ban: No phosphorus (P) can be applied at any time throughout the year without a soil analysis showing a phosphorus deficiency filed with the county administrator. (The filing process can be protracted, so it's not as easy as it sounds.)

A Garden For Moonlight: Taken from Master Gardeners Bench. By Joy Derksen

Get ready for the next full moon by planting a "moon garden" to enjoy in the evening hours. Moon gardens use white blossoms, plants with silvery and variegated leaves, and evening scented flowers to make an oasis of nighttime beauty in our gardens.

Why would you plant a moon garden? Well, first, it's just too darned hot to sit outside at noon in coastal Florida. It's cooler and breezier in the evening. Second, many folks are working from nine to five and they only have weekends to

admire their gardens in the daylight. They are also to add a solar powered light or two (this helps with charming and romantic!

While a moon garden will look good in the daytime, it comes into its own at sundown. White flowers glow in dim light while releasing scents to attract the evening pollinators. Variegated or silvery leaves give the garden a

> ferent look while reflecting low levels of light.

A small pond or a gazing ball with a silvery surface can add to the enjoyment and the feeling of tranquility. If you are gardening in a small place, use containers and trellises to turn a corner into a moonlit, peaceful seating area.

Locate your moon garden close to a seating area on a patio, lanai, or in front of a picture window. For nights when the moon is not glowing, you might want

safety, too---you don't want to trip over a pet or a

tricycle in the dark!) For nights when a breeze is not blowing, you might want to add citronella candles or a fan to keep mosquitoes on the wing and not on you! White plants that flower and/or scent at night: Angel's trumpet, Plumbago, sweet smelling tobacco plant,

blooming Cereus, Crinum asiaticum, four o'clocks, snow-on-the-mountain, evening primrose. Several white orchid species also are scented at night. Many sites recommend the lady-of-thenight orchid as easy to grow with a fragrant lemony scent. Varieties of yucca bloom at night, but be careful where you place them in the landscape as the leaves are frequently sharp and pointed. You can also get scented water lilies that bloom at night for your pond. There are numerous variegated leaf plants that can also be included in your garden: bromeliads, coleus, devil's backbone, liriope. White blooming vines: Night blooming jasmine, bleeding heart clerodendrum, moonflower, Carolina jessamin, Night jessamin. Plants with gray or silver foliage: Artemesia, dusty Miller, white salvia "cirrus", silver lamium, and silvery leafed bromeliads.

NUISANCE DOGS and CATS, YOU HAVE RECOURSE

Excerpts from Manatee County Animal Services Booklet: "Pet Ownership Information – It's the Law"

This series could well add: "Responsible Pet Ownership Information" because

animal rescue services would not be needed if pet (Of note: A tethered dog will be apt to bite anyowners were responsible for their pets.

To take over the care of another living being that is dependent, definitely requires full responsibility and that includes animal ownership.

"Nuisance"; means no dog or cat shall disturb the peace and quiet or interfere with the enjoyment of life or property. Sec.2-4-12

No dog or cat shall materially disturb the peace and quiet or interfere with the enjoyment of life or property by persistent or repetitive barking, yelping, whining, howling, meowing, squealing, screaming, or causing other objectionable noise for a persistent period of time exceeding 10 minutes or for a repetitive period of time which cumulatively exceeds 10 minutes within a two hour (120 minute) period of time.

"Causing objectionable noise for a persistent period of time exceeding 10 minutes": A dog that does not want to be outdoors barks, or off times barks if it's hungry, or it barks because it sees a cat or dog next door; or if it barks at any movement, or it barks because it's bored or wants socialization. This persistent barking may be a violation of

This Ordinance. Of note: A good watchdog does not bark at everything and anything.

Dogs that are tethered alone in a yard will bark, sometimes incessantly as a tethered dog knows it is in a disadvantaged situation and is very paranoid. It is also a Violationunless the owner is out-

side with the pet and can see the pet.. At no time 1st Offense \$100, 2nd Offense \$300, 3rd Offense is a pet to be unattended when tethered (tied up).

one coming near it)

"Violation" can be described as: "Excessive noise which is repetitive and which cumulatively Dog Fighting Crimestoppers: exceeds 10 minutes within two hours (120 minutes), period of time". Example: A dog barks for 5 minutes at someone walking nearby, 4 minutes at someone riding their bicycle, 3 min-

utes at the mailman and 2 minutes at some birds all within a 120 minute time period—adds up to a total of 14 minutes of barking within the two hour time period. This may be a violation Of this Ordinance.

Also a nuisance is un-warranted animal feces. Any feces (poop) deposited by a dog or cat on public property, public walks, recreation areas or private property of others, MUST be immediately removed by the person who has custody or control of the animal unless otherwise authorized by the property owners.

It is also definitely unsanitary or could be unhealthy for you or your pet. Many animal diseases are transmitted in animal feces.

Accidentally "encountering" animal feces can cause much distress in having to deal with a disturbing odor or a mess on your shoes, clothes or items and/or transferred to soil and possibly infect personal space.

Summer Dessert Recipes

Frozen Yogurt Coconut Pops

Ingredients

FRUIT PUREE:

2 cups fruit, such as peaches, strawberries and blueberries

1/2 cup sugar Juice of 1 lemon

COCONUT YOGURT:

1 cup plain thick yogurt

1 1/2 cups powdered sugar

1 tablespoon coconut extract

1/2 cup unsweetened coconut flakes.

Directions

For the puree: Blend together the fruit, sugar and lemon juice in a blender until smooth.

For the yogurt: Whisk together the sugar, yogurt and coconut extract.

Pour alternating layers of the fruit puree and coconut yogurt into popsicle molds, and then insert the sticks. Freeze until the pops are firm, about 8 hours.

For easy removal, dip the bottom of the molds into hot water for a few seconds to loosen the pops. Remove the pops from the mold, dip in coconut flakes and serve.

Peaches with Balsamic Cherries

Ingredients

1/2 pound cherries, halved and pitted

2 tablespoons sugar, plus more to taste

2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

1 pound peaches, sliced

Directions

In a small saucepan, stir together the cherries, sugar and balsamic vinegar, and place over a medium heat. Bring to a boil and continue to cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

In a medium bowl toss the warm cherries and syrup with the sliced peaches, add more sugar to taste and serve

Mint Chip Ice Cream Pie

Ingredients:

8 ounces chopped semisweet chocolate, melted 4 cups crisped rice cereal2 pints mint chocolatechip ice cream, slightly softened

Directions

In a large bowl, combine the chocolate and cereal until the cereal is completely coated. Transfer to a 9-inch springform pan. Press the mixture into the bottom and 1 inch up the sides of the pan. Freeze just until firm, 5 to 10 minutes

Spread the ice cream in the prepared crust and freeze, covered, until firm, for at least 2 hours and up to 3 days.

Grilled Banana S'Mores

Ingredients:

Medium ripe bananas

Brown sugar; Large marshmallows Peanut butter or chocolate spread

Graham cracker squares

Directions:

Heat a grill to 350 degrees. Leave bananas in their skins and make 1 slit down the length of each. Pack the slits with brown sugar.

Put the bananas on the grill and grill until soft and charred. Remove them to a cutting board and set aside to cool slightly. Peel the skins from the bananas and cut into 1/2-inch thick slices. Meanwhile, put the marshmallows on skewers and toast over the grill until brown and melty, about 2 minutes. You can also brown the marshmallows using a hand-held torch.

To assemble, spread some peanut butter on graham crackers and top with bananas and marshmallows. Cover with another cracker and serve.

Streusel Topped Baked Peaches with Glaze

1 cup all-purpose flour; 1/2 cup sorghum syrup

1/4 cup light brown muscovado sugar

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

11 tbsp unsalted butter, melted

4 peaches, halved and pitted; Kosher salt

Whipped cream or vanilla ice cream, optional Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Combine the flour, sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg in a small bowl. Add 8 tablespoons of the melted butter and combine until crumbly. Refrigerate for 15 minutes. Slice a very thin piece off the bottom of each peach half so they have flat bottoms. Brush the bottom and sides of a 9- by 11-inch baking dish with some of the remaining 3 tablespoons of melted butter, and then brush the rest of the butter on the peaches. Place the peaches in the pan cut-side up and about an inch or so apart. Sprinkle a little bit of salt on the peaches. Top each peach with some of the streusel. Bake in the oven until the peaches are soft and the streusel is lightly golden brown, 45 to 55 minutes, depending on how ripe the peaches are. When the peaches are almost done, put the syrup in a small saucepan and bring to a simmer on low heat, Keep warm. Serve the peaches drizzled with some of the syrup and topped with

Berry Shortcakes

whipped cream, if using.

2 pounds berries (such as raspberries, blueberries, or sliced strawberries)

1/3 cup plus 2 tablespoons granulated sugar 1 cup heavy cream; 8 biscuits

In a large bowl, toss the berries and 1/3 cup of the sugar. Let sit for at least 15 minutes (and up to 4 hours, refrigerated). In a medium bowl, beat the cream and the remaining 2 tablespoons of sugar until soft peaks form. Split the biscuits in half. Spoon the berries and whipped cream on the bottom halves and sandwich with the tops.
