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ANNOUNCEMENT:

MARINA AND HALL RATE INCREASE

Effective with the April 2015 slip fee renewal there will be a rate increase for boat slips. Monthly fees will be based upon the size of the boat, rather than the size of the slip. Residents and tenants with waivers will pay \$3 per boat foot, and non-residents will pay \$7 per boat foot. Measurements will be rounded up to the next foot. A boat length of 24 ft. 4in. will be calculated as 25 ft. There will be a minimum fee of \$48 for a slip.

A boat belonging to a resident or tenant with a waiver that measures less than 16 ft. will pay the minimum of \$48 per month. For example, a 16 ft. boat @ \$48/month will pay \$288 plus tax of \$18.72, totaling \$306.72 for the six month term.

A boat belonging to a non-resident will be calculated as above, but at \$7 per foot. Example: 16 ft. @ \$112/month equals \$672 plus tax of \$43.68, totaling \$715.68. The same \$48 minimum applies.

The trailer space rental will increase to \$15 per month, which will be equal to \$95.85 including tax.

The gate key fee will increase to \$40 (includes tax) with the October renewal. Anyone purchasing a gate key after May 2, 2015, will be charged the new rate of \$40 inclusive.

Effective May 3, 2015, hall rental fees by homeowners and tenants with waivers will increase to \$300 for 4 hours. A non-resident's fee increases to \$750.00 for 4 hours.

Effective May 3, 2015, there will be a charge of \$25 to rent the screen room and a refundable \$10 key deposit (for a total of \$35.00 up front). The deposit will be refunded when the key is returned.

These increases are necessary to make needed repairs in the marina and remodel the hall. These repairs will cost well over a half million dollars. We need to dredge the marina, put in new finger piers, and repair the boat ramp. We have already spent over \$250,000 to repair and replace the seawall cap. We still need to dredge the marina, replace the finger piers and repair the boat ramp.



Historic Preservation Workshop Had a Full House

January 29th, 7:00 pm at Bayshore Rec. Hall, the Workshop convened. Our special guests were: ; Robin DiSabatino, our District Commissioner, Kathleen Thompson, Building and Planning Dept.; Simone Peterson and Debbie deLeon, Neighborhood Services; Kathleen Thompson, Building and Planning Dept. and over 150 residents, and several landlords.

After a brief introduction by Suzanna Young, Chair, Robin said a few congratulatory words towards the project and the audience and introduced our speakers: Joe King, architect who spoke about Mid-20th-century architecture; Kathy Slusser, Historic Director, Clerk of Circuit Court who gave an overview of the advantages of Historic Preservation; Dr. Linda Stevenson, gave more information on the architecture of Bayshore homes and their study last winter; Paul Carroll gave a perspective from a participant in historic processes at his home town of Goderich, Ontario, and how they can be flexible.

Question & answer session followed. Concerns: a major worry was that property values would escalate so fast that people would be priced out of their homes; that they would be made to participate; that they would be restricted if they remodeled their homes. It was re-emphasized one does not owned by an Englishmen and his partner in the have to participate.

Maynard Boyce assured people that this historic designation process will take a good amount of time, (maybe up to two years), the application process will not happen overnight. It was stated home prices are already climbing here as it is. The answer to a main concern was: participation in historic status is an individual choice. Kathleen Thompson did offer that if there was a consensus to become a "Historic District", it had to consist of 67% of the community. In either case, design guidelines would be set by a committee of residents, county officials and The Historic Preservation Board.

There seemed to be a lot of attention given to the displays. Posters, a gift of Dr. Stevenson, were mounted on the wall. These showed the Univ. of Fla. study highlights and more importantly the original Bayshore models where you could identify the model of your own home. The project's mission was on display on tables with sign-up sheets.

Restore Bayshore Committee Meeting: Community Interest is Growing

Meeting was held Feb. 10 at 7:00 pm at the Bayshore Gardens Rec. Center Hall. With us were Robin DiSabatino, our District Commissioner, Simone Peterson, Neighborhood Services and Kathleen Thompson, Building & Planning and a group of 24 interested residents.

Briefly discussed was the Preservation Workshop held January 29. Everyone still had questions about different aspects of being registered in a Historic situation; the pluses and minuses. Questions that came up: What would happen if your house was destroyed in a flood or a fire? Could you rebuild something different? If you have to re-roof, does it have to follow original style? If all your neighbors participated in obtaining a historic status, where does that put a homeowner, that didn't.

Kathleen Thompson was able to explain that most of these incidents would not present a problem. If you chose not to participate, no problem. Since the Manatee County Historic Preservation Board is new, it is still establishing policy on a local basis. There is a basic framework for design features that determine a particular period and style and rationale for importance. Design standards for Bayshore Gardens architecture would be determined by a

committee of residents, Preservation Board and County officials. Local application procedures are patterned after the State. A tax incentive program, is still under consideration, which will need county approval. If this happens, it could help those who are participating brush up their home.

Infrastructure Needs in our Community was the second topic. So far 10 people have signed up for The Infrastructure Task Group with sidewalks their first task.

Terri Wonder suggested that an in-depth survey be made to all property owners as people still had questions about needs in the community. She has expertise and background in public perception research techniques and offered her services at no cost. For those at the meeting who wanted to offer survey questions, she gave her address: 312 Bryn Mawr Island, 34207 and email: terriwonder2014@gmail.com, Phone: 941-751-1480.

Simone Peterson would look into possibility of sending survey flyers out with water bills to save on cost. However, Restore Bayshore would have to print the 1404+ fliers. However, at this point, there are no funds to do this.

Kathleen Thompson said she would like to see 3 of the top community concerns before a March 20 meeting.

It has been agreed that historical designation will proceed on an individual basis—or possibly in "mini districts" within Bayshore. Future business of the Preservation group is: determine what areas want to participate, interview owners, set dates for tutorials with Dr. Stevenson in filling out site forms for properties and start the inventory process.

We now have another liaison to the County, Vicki Ford, who will give her time to attend County meetings. Creating this link will be vital to all the projects and Bayshore Gardens, in general.

You are invited to join any of the 8 Task Groups: Historic Preservation, Liaison to County, Image Improvement, Infrastructure, Traffic, Promotion & PR, Community Communications and Fund Raising. Five Objectives are still in need of Task Groups. Next Restore Bayshore meeting is March 10 at 7:00 at the Rec. Center.

These increases will affect boat slips, trailer spaces, and gate cards. The new rates will be applied to the contracts coming due 01 April 2015. The new prices will appear elsewhere in this paper, however, of note for slip holders is that slip fees will now be charged on a per foot basis. The renewal contracts with the increases applied will be in the mail this month. On a different subject, for the first time since I have been the Dock Master demand for larger slips by residents may force some of our associate slip holders out of the Marina. We hate to say good-bye but our residents do have priority. Well that's pretty much it for February, a short report for a short month.

Reminders – Vehicles with trailers attached must have a parking decal. Don't loan out your Gate Key. If you are bringing a guest that is towing a boat, you must remain with them at all times. Arrangements must be made for tow vehicles with trailers parked in the Marina without decals.

Improvements - The Marina Committee continues to work the dredging issues. Design drawings for the new finger piers and the dock reconfiguration are being worked up.

Repairs and Projects Completed – A few loose planks on the finger piers around the marina have been reattached or replaced. A few 4x4 posts were installed to stabilize finger piers. The new boat stands were greased and safety chains are being ordered.

Edible Hibiscus

If a rose is the "King of Flowers," then hibiscus must be the Queen. Hibiscus can be found all over the Florida home landscape and for good reasons: they come in many sizes, shapes and colors, and provide flowers nearly year-round. But did you know many are also edible?

Hibiscus is a genus of plants in the mallow family, Malvaceae. The mallows consist of several hundred species that are native to warm areas throughout the world. The word "hibiscus" is derived from a Greek word meaning "sticky and slimy," which is quite evident if you crush any part of the plant. Edible species in the mallow family include okra: (Abelmoschus esculentus), aibika (A. manihot), the original marsh mallow (Althaea officinalis), false roselle (Hibiscus acetosella), kenaf (H. cannabinus), swamp hibiscus (H.diversifolius), native rosella (H. heterophyllus), cotton rose (H. mutabilis), Chinese hibiscus (H. rosa-sinensis) (most commonly sold), roselle (H. sabdariffa), Chinese rose of Sharon (H. sinosyriacus), rose of Sharon (H. syriacus), flower-of-an-hour (H. trionum), and swamp rose mallow (H. moscheutos). (Caesar's weed, Urena lobata, also an edible mallow family member.

All hibiscus flowers are edible and can be used as a garnish or as a colorful addition to salads. The flower petals really do not have much taste or smell, but the colors put a little zing in any salad presentation.

False roselle, also called cranberry hibiscus (H. acetosella) is a colorful plant with garnet-red leaves that resembles maple leaves The leaves are pleasantly tart and can be eaten raw in salads or used in stir fries, as they retain their color in cooking. Flowers and young leaves together can be used to make a very pleasant cranberry flavored hot or cold tea.

Abelmoschus esculentus, commonly known as okra, is either liked or disliked because of its sliminess. The flower of okra has white to yellow petals, often with a red or purple spot at the base of each petal. After flowering, a seedpod is developed which is used in cooking, either fried, pickled, or stewed as in gumbo.

Roselle (H. sabdariffa) is another striking plant with flowers of white, pink, or red. The green leaves are used like a spicy version of spinach. The red calyces at the base of the flower are used for food coloring and a delightfully tart tea.

Caution: when consuming any plant for the first time, always make sure you can positively identify it, do research on proper preparation, know positively that it has not been treated with chemicals, and try only small portions to make sure you do not have a negative reaction. Shrubs: To Prune or Not to Prune. "When?" is the Question

For homeowners, pruning shrubs is a method of removing plant parts to improve the looks of an ornamental plant or to improve its health. At the Master Gardener Plant Diagnostic Clinic we get frequent calls asking when a certain plant can be pruned and if an ornamental must be pruned.

If our landscaping was designed with the mature heights and widths of plants taken into consideration, we might never need to prune out anything but dead growth. But many of us did not plant our own landscaping, didn't know the mature height of a charming little plant we fell in love with at the nursery, or have never been in a nearly year round growing season as in Manatee County.

You can safely prune plants at almost any time during the year, especially if you are removing dead, broken, and diseased or problem limbs for the health of the plant. It's usually not recommended to cut shrubs back in late fall and early winter because new tender regrowth could be damaged in one of our infrequent cold spells. Dormant plants in the northerly states send nutrients to their roots during the cold. The nutrients move from the leaves to the roots then the leaves fall off. In the southern states, dormancy is not so obvious, except in true deciduous plants. (who drop all their leaves)

However, ornamental plants that flower have their own set of pruning rules to maintain their colorful appearance. Spring flowering shrubs bloom on last season's growth (also called old growth in gardening manuals) and should be pruned after they finish blooming. This allows for plenty of time in the summer to take up nutrients and use that sunshine to produce new vigorous growth that will result in many flower buds for the next year's flowers. So don't prune the azalea until the last bloom dries up and falls off.

Shrubs that bloom in the summer months are another story. They usually bloom from buds that form on shoots that grow that same spring (called new growth). So to get lots of new shoots for blooms, these plants should be pruned after the last cold spell.

This pruning schedule will make for strong shoot growth during the spring months that should produce abundant summer flowers.

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Best Burger Recipes

1 large shallot, finely chopped (1/4 cup)

Bacon Burgers on Brioche Buns

2 medium red onions, thinly sliced 6 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil

1/2 cup mayo

2 tbsp fresh lemon juice

Salt and freshly ground pepper

8 slices of thick-cut bacon (12 ounces)

3 lbs mixed ground chuck & ground sirloin 12 oz brie, sliced

8 brioche burger buns

Preheat the oven to 400°. On a rimmed baking sheet, toss the onions with 2 tbsp of the olive oil, roast until softened. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, whisk the mayo with the lemon juice. Gradually whisk in the remaining 1/4 cup of olive oil and season with salt and pepper. In a large skillet, cook the bacon until crisp. Drain on paper towels and break each strip in half. Light a grill or preheat a grill pan. Form the ground meat into eight patties. Season with salt & pepper, brush with olive oil. Grill over moderately high heat until well-browned. Flip the burgers, mound the brie on top and grill for 4 minutes longer, until the cheese is slightly melted and the burgers are medium-rare. Spread the lemon mayo on buns; set the burgers on the bottoms & top with the bacon & onions.

Black Bean Burgers

2 cans black beans, rinsed, drained, divided 3 tbsp mayo; 1/4 tsp cayenne 1/3 cup plain dry bread crumbs 2 tsp ground cumin; 3 tbsp vegetable oil 1 tsp dried oregano, crumbled

1/4 cup finely chopped cilantro

4 soft hamburger buns

Pulse 1 can beans in a food processor with mayo, bread crumbs, cumin, oregano, and cayenne until a coarse purée forms. Move to a bowl and stir in cilantro and remaining can beans. Form mixture into 4 patties. Heat oil in a 12-inch heavy skillet over medium-high heat. Cook burgers until outsides are crisp and lightly browned, turning once, about 5 minutes total. Serve on buns.

Turkey Cheddar Burgers

2 tbsp olive oil; 1/2 tsp salt 1/4 tsp black pepper; 1 1/2 lbs ground turkey 5 oz extra-sharp Cheddar, cut into 4 slices 4 hamburger or kaiser rolls For sun-dried tomato mayonnaise 1/4 cup sun-dried tomatoes, drained 1 tbsp water; 2 tsp cider vinegar 1/4 tsp salt; 1/4 cup mayo Cook shallot in oil with salt & pepper until golden, then transfer to a bowl. Add turkey and mix gently but thoroughly. Turn out turkey mixture onto wax paper and divide into 8 equal mounds. Pat 1 mound into a 4inch patty, top with 1 piece of cheese, then put a second mound on top, patting it onto other patty to enclose cheese. Pinch edges together to seal and shape into a single patty. Grill in oil, turning over once, until just cooked through. Heat rolls on a baking sheet until crusty, about 5 minutes. Make mayo and assemble burgers: Purée tomatoes with water, vinegar, and salt in a blender or mini food processor, scraping down sides as necessary, then blend in mayo. Spread buns

Chipotle Pork Cheeseburgers

with tomato mayo. Serve.

1 lb ground pork (not lean) 2 tsp chipotle in adobo + 1 tsp adobo sauce 2 garlic cloves, forced thru a garlic press 4 slices Muenster cheese; 1/4 cup mayo 4 hamburger buns, toasted 1 large tomatillo, husked, rinsed, sliced 1/2 small avocado; 1/2 cup cilantro sprigs Prepare a gas grill for direct-heat cooking over medium heat. Gently mix pork, chipotle, garlic, and a scant teaspoon salt until just combined. Form into 4 (1/2-inch-thick) patties. Oil grill rack, then grill patties, covered, 4 minutes. Flip patties and top with a slice of cheese. Grill, covered, until just cooked through, 1 to 2 minutes more. Spread buns with mayonnaise and assemble burgers with tomatillo, avocado, and

Edamame Burger

2 cups shelled and frozen edamame
1 15 oz can chickpeas, with liquid
8 oz sliced mushrooms; 4 cloves garlic
1/2 cup finely ground raw cashews
1/2 cup nutritional yeast; 1/2 tsp ground cumin
1/4 tsp liquid smoke (optional)
1 tsp Bragg's Liquid Aminos or soy sauce
3 1/2 cups chickpea flour

Place the frozen edamame and the can of chickpeas, including the liquid, in a pan and warm through. This will defrost the edamame; if you use fresh or precooked edamame, skip this step. Combine edamame, chickpeas and liquid, mushrooms, cashews, yeast, garlic, cumin, liquid smoke, liquid aminos, and salt and pepper in a food processor and process until smooth. Pour into a large bowl. Slowly add flour until a thicker consistency is formed. Place the entire bowl in the refrigerator for 20 to 30 minutes to stiffen up and make it easier to handle when forming the patties. Form into 16 patties. Heat the oil in a sauté pan and fry the patties for 4 to 5 minutes, or until golden brown on both sides.

Open-Face Chicken Burger

Olive oil; 1 cup mayo; 8 large basil leaves 1 1/4 cups chopped fresh basil 3 tbsp chopped drained cornichons or dill pickle plus 1 1/2 tbsp brine from jar 2 green onions, finely chopped 4 slices bread; 1 1/4 lbs ground chicken 4 slices from large heirloom tomato Brush grill with oil. Mix mayo, 1 cup chopped basil, cornichons, brine, and onions in small bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Mix chicken and 1/2 cup basil mayo in large bowl. Shape chicken mixture into four patties. Salt and pepper. Brush bread with oil; grill until crisp and golden. Grill burgers until firm to touch and cooked through. Spread bread thickly with basil mayo. Top bread w/ tomato, 2 basil leaves, burger, and basil mayo. Garnish with remaining chopped basil.


















Bayshore Gardener of the Month
